## HIS HOLINESS ARAM I EFFECTS A RECONCILIATION BETWEEN THE COPTIC AND ETHIOPIAN CHURCHES

"You have made history". This is how a Coptic Metropolitan described the reconciliation brought about by His Holiness Aram I between the Coptic Orthodox and the Ethiopian Orthodox Churches. "This is a historical day", said an Ethiopian Archbishop. These words were pronounced after the signing of a Common Declaration, marking the end of more than two decades of tension between the Coptic Orthodox Church and the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. The Common Declaration was signed on Friday 13 July 2007 at the Cathedral of the Coptic Church in Cairo, with the signing of a Common Declaration by the three spiritual heads: His Holiness Shenouda III, Pope of Alexandria and Patriarch of the See of St. Mark, His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia, and His Holiness Abba Paulos, Patriarch of the Ethiopian Orthodox Church.

Emphasizing "the importance of this historical meeting", the spiritual heads reaffirmed their unity of faith which is "deeply rooted in the Holy Scriptures, the Apostolic faith and Tradition, the three Ecumenical Councils (Nicea 325, Constantinople 381, and Ephesus 431) and the teachings of church fathers, specially St. Athanasius the Great, St. Cyril of Alexandria and St. Gregory the Illuminator."

After expressing their "deep thanks to Catholicos Aram I for his fraternal efforts to bring this historic meeting into reality", Pope Shenouda and Patriarch Paulos committed themselves to deepen and expand their bilateral collaboration. Greeting this historic event, Aram I said: "We can not ignore or change the past; we can change the future with renewed faith, hope and vision."

The meeting in Cairo was preceded by another meeting in Addis Ababa between Catholicos Aram I and Patriarch Paulos. In their Joint Declaration they stressed the need to strengthen the cooperation between the Oriental Orthodox Churches in the area of Christian education, theological formation, justice and peace. They called for "the recognition of the Armenian Genocide by the International Community as the first genocide of the 20th Century just as they recognized the Rwandan Genocide as the last genocide of the 20th Century".

Commenting on the role of the Oriental Orthodox Churches His Holiness Aram I, the former Moderator of the World Council of Churches said: "Unity must be translated into a quality of life undergirded by close collaboration, joint action and common vision. The churches are the limbs of the one body of Christ; they can not live in isolation; they are interrelated".

He then continued "The Oriental Orthodox Churches with their theology, spirituality and long history of martyrdom and witness have a unique contribution to make to the Christian self-understanding and mission in a new world context" and to the ecumenical movement".

The Oriental Orthodox Family is composed of the Syrian, Coptic, Armenian, Ethiopian, Indian and Eritrean Churches. These Churches have world-wide Diaspora and are active in the ecumenical movement.

The Armenian Catholicosate of Cilicia is one of the two Catholicosates of the Armenian Orthodox Church. Via Father Joshua

There was a presbyter from Kellis who was discerning. While coming into the church to complete the synaxis, he saw a number of demons outside the cell of one of the brothers. Some had taken the form of women who were speaking indecently, and others of blasphemous youths; others were dancing while still others were trying on different outfits.

The old man sighed and said, "The brother persists in negligence in every way, and because of it the wicked spirits surround his cell in this disorderly manner." Therefore, when he had completed the synaxis, he returned and entered the cell of the brother, and said to him, "I am suffering, brother. I have faith in you, and if you pray for me, God will completely relieve my heart from suffering." The disciple was ashamed, and said, "Father, I am not worthy to pray for you." The old man persisted, pleading and saying, "I will not leave unless you promise me that you will say one prayer for me every night." The brother obeyed the old man's command. The old man did this because he wanted a new way to ensure that the brother would pray at night.

Therefore, when the brother rose in the night, he said the prayer for the old man. After finishing the prayer, he was struck with contrition, and said to himself, "Wretched soul, you pray for the old man, but you do not pray for yourself." Therefore he offered one prayer for himself. He did this for a week, offering two prayers each night, one for the old man and one for himself.

On Sunday, while the old man was going to the church, he saw the demons once again standing outside the brother's cell, looking glum, and the old man knew that the demons were grieved because the brother prayed. He was filled with joy and went to the brother, saying, "Have charity and offer another prayer for me each night." After saying the two prayers for the old man, he was struck again with contrition, and said to himself. "O miserable one, offer another prayer for yourself."

He did this for a whole week, offering four prayers each night. When the old man came again, he saw the demons glum and silent, and gave thanks to God, and went in again to the brother and urged him to offer another prayer for him. The brother also offered one for himself, and said six prayers at

night. When the old man came again to the brother, the demons were angry with the old man, furious about the salvation of the brother. The old man gave glory to God and after

entering his cell and exhorting him not to be negligent but the pray unceasingly, let him alone. The demons, seeing the brother's perseverance in the prayers and in soberness, by the grace of God left him.

#### Via Father Joshua

There was an old man named Hierax in the region of the Thebaid who lived for about ninety years. The demons wanted for some time to cast him into the despondency of boredom, and so they beset him one day saying, "What will you do, old man, for you have another fifty years to live?" In reply, he said to them, "You have indeed distressed me greatly, for I had been prepared to live for at least two hundred years." And with great cries, they left him.

"Saints are people who live on earth by holy, eternal Divine truths. That is why the Lives of the Saints are actually applied dogmatics, for in them all the holy eternal dogmatic truths are experienced in all their life-creating and creative energies. Charges against Bartholomew I for calling himself Ecumenical Patriarch



Patriarch Bartholomew I has come under attack by Bujidar Cipof, an ex-Church member of the Bulgarian exarchate of Constantinople for using the title "Ecumenical." A desire to influence how Christian minorities will vote is behind the charges filed by a former member of the Bulgarian exarchate. It shows how secular fundamentalism uses Islam.

Istanbul (AsiaNews) – Two weeks after a Turkish court denied the Patriarchate of Constantinople the right to call himself ecumenical, Bartholomew I has come under attack once again by Bujidar Cipof, an ex-Church member of the Bulgarian exarchate of Constantinople which comes under the jurisdiction of the Ecumenical Patriarchate.

Cipof has now filed charges against Patriarch Bartholomew, whose 'crime' is to have used in his latest speeches—during the successful July 11-15 Second Orthodox Youth Conference—the much deprecated historical expression "Ecumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople."

Many in local diplomatic and media circles believe that behind the tug-of-war started by various ex-members of the Bulgarian exarchate, stand the guardians of the Turkish state who are sending signals to the country's various Christian minorities, whom they suspect of favouring the party of outgoing Prime Minister Erdogan.

These elements within the Turkish state see themselves as the true protectors of the Kemalist legacy, which has however lost much of the founder's initial élan, turning instead into a secular form of fundamentalism that has not refrained from using Islam in moments of political tensions, as suggested by David Shankland in his book Islam and Society Turke, (1999).

As much as it may seem strange in Western Europe, Christian minorities have never experienced the degree of tolerance that they have in the last 20 years under the governments of Ozal and Erdogan, both conservative and reformers, this according to a Turkish-born Orthodox prelate living in Berlin. Yet he did acknowledge Turkish education lacks elements from Greco-Roman culture that are useful in preparing a truly European ruling class.

Finally, Baskin Oran, a well-respected scholar and independent candidate in the upcoming elections, in an interview with the newspaper Radikal demolished piece by piece the recent court decision against the patriarch. And it is not without a certain ironic tone that he pointed that he would have never believed that courts in Turkey had become so well-versed in Orthodox ecclesiology, because after all the whole issue essentially revolves around Orthodox religious canons. At noon, lunch will be served. Pilgrims are invited to enjoy the monastery grounds, and to shop in the store.

The Service of Holy Unction will be celebrated at 2:30 p.m., with anointing of pilgrims.

The nuns welcome everyone to join them in marking these important milestones.
