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ECUMENICAL PATRIARCHATE'S RIGHTS VINDICATED BY EUROPEAN COURT OF HUMAN RIGHTS

New York, NY-- The European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg, France unanimously ruled yesterday July 8, in favor of the rights of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, specifically as to its historic Orphanage on the island of *Pringepos*. The Court ruled that the Ecumenical Patriarchate, which had purchased the property with its own funds in 1902, was the rightful owner of the property, which ownership was not affected by subsequent legislation and actions involving charitable foundations. In November of 2007, His Eminence Archbishop Demetrios of America was part of the delegation that appeared before the Court in Strasbourg. Commenting on the ruling today, the Archbishop said:

"This is a very positive step in the right direction for the protection of a basic human right. Although the ruling affects only the narrow area of property rights, by extension, we see a recognition of the rule of law as it affects the Ecumenical Patriarchate within the state of Turkey. Such recognition would serve all parties."

Prayers indeed heal diseases, scientists say

People indeed can recover in church when they touch holy relics or sanctuaries. St. Petersburg scientists have proved it and discovered the "material" mechanism of divine phenomena.

"A prayer is a powerful remedy, said Valery Slezin, Head of the laboratory of neuropsychophysiology of St Petersburg Research and development Psychoneurological Institute n.a. Bekhterev. "It does not only regulate all the processes in the human organism, but it also restores the damaged structure of consciousness."

Professor Slezin did something unbelievable – he measured the power of prayer. He recorded electroencephalograms of praying monks and fixed an unusual phenomenon – the complete "switch-off" of their cerebral cortex. This state can be observed only with babies aged three months when they are near their mother in complete safety. As a person grows up, the feeling of safety disappears, brain activity increases and the rhythm of cerebral biocurrents become rarer only during deep sleep and during a prayer, as the scientist proved. Valery Slezin called this unknown state slow, or praying, wakefulness and proved that it is vital for any person.

It is a known fact that diseases are mostly caused by negative situations and offenses that stick in our mind. However, during a prayer worries move to the background or even disappear at all. Thus, both moral and physical healing is possible.

Even church services help to improve health. Engineer and electrophysicist Angelina Malakhovskaya from the laboratory of medical and biological technologies carried out above thousand research to find out clinical health characteristics of parishioners before and after the service. It turned out that a service in a temple normalizes the blood pressure and blood values.

Prayers may neutralize even radiation. It is known that after the Chernobyl explosion radiation instruments returned an off-scale reading. However, radiation background was normal near The Archistratigus Michael church that is four kilometers away from reactors. St. Petersburg scientists confirmed by experiments that the holy water, the sign of the cross and ringing of church bells may be healing as well. That is why, in Russia the bells were constantly ringing during epidemics.

The ultrasound range of bell ringing kills viruses of flue, jaundice and typhus: proteins of viruses curl and carry no infection, said Angelina Malakhovskaya. The sign of cross is even more effective, it kills pathogenic microbes (colon bacillus and staphylococci) not only in tap water, but also in rivers and lakes. It is even more efficient than modern disinfecting devices of electromagnetic radiation.

The scientific laboratory of Industrial and Naval Medicine Institute researched water before and after consecration. It turned out that if the Lord's Prayer is read over water and the water is crossed then, the number of malignant bacteria will be one hundred times lower. Electromagnetic radiation gives much worse results. Thus, Orthodox Christian recommendations to consecrate any food and drink is not just of spiritual and also of preventive character.

The holy water is not just purified; it changes its structure, become harmless and healing. Special devices can prove that.

Spectrographs suggest that consecrated water has greater optical density, as if it understood the sense of prayers and kept it. That is the reason for its unique healing quality.

The only limitation is that it heals only pious people.

"Water differentiates the level of people's belief," Angelina Malakhovskaya said. "When a priest consecrates water, the optical density is 2.5 times more, when it is done by a religious layman, it is only 1.5 times more, but with a christened and unbelieving man without a cross on his neck, the changes were insignificant."

If we say, "Why do we meet again at an All American Council?" it means that we have forgotten the purpose of council. We can speak of agendas and problems, budgets and departments, reports and reviews; but the primary reason is to be together in Christ. We may occupy an entire continent and scatter over three nations our parishes, monasteries and institutions, but we are basically the same Church who gathered that traumatic day of the resurrection in the Upper Room. Like the apostles, we too yearn

to experience the same Christ alive now among all who are baptized in His name.

The tragedy of forgetting that we belong to one another in Him deprives us of the *sobornost*, which we explain to western Christians as an earmark of our communion. It may be that as Wordsworth wrote, "The world is too much with us," and we have lost the awareness of having partaken of the same sacred Host and chalice several years ago. It's in our nature as humans to adapt and adjust to whatever conditions we find ourselves; nevertheless we ought to bear in mind the ideal condition – at least on this side of the Kingdom – and that is to become that same "little flock" that our Lord Jesus so loved and for which He sacrificed His life on earth.

We know all this theoretically, and we even practice its implications. All our hierarchs remember one another in their sacred prayers, those diptychs that are on their and our tables of oblation. Every priest stands at his preparation table an hour before the Divine Liturgy recalling by name the ordained and lay persons in his deanery and diocese, removing small particles from the bread of offering so that not only by word but by matter all are united on the sacred paten to be lifted up to the Lord of love. More, the priests call to mind the invisible yet actually present Church, those who have gone before us to their rest in the bosom of Abraham.

We come to Him, and we do so many times alone in our prayers and contemplation. In our "closets," we close out the cacophony of society and descend from our minds into the depths of our hearts to be with Him one on One. Nourished and energized with spiritual food, we expand our awareness of all others who have given themselves totally and irrevocably to Christ Jesus.

We pray for those with the Elijah syndrome, tempted to believe that they are one of a pitiful few left with a remnant of faith in a world having left the Orthodox Church behind. We pray for the nun considering whether her choice of a lifetime commitment to Christ was the right decision. We pray for the layman struggling to establish a mission with so little cooperation and so many obstacles to conquer. We pray for the young priest in an old parish, and for the old priest who senses that he may be out of touch with his flock.

We are the Orthodox Church in America, but we are not all Americans. Many of us come with Old World attitudes, convictions and mindsets that can never be altered. Others are trying to look as little American as possible, hoping to pass themselves as immigrants. Children and grandchildren of early pioneers whose native tongues and ways have long been forgotten share the same Christ with those with a record of having passed through a variety of cults, sects and life styles. The One Who proclaimed that "Whoever loses his life for My sake will find it" (Matthew 16:25), stretches His arms out from the Cross and calls us all to gather with love for one

another despite our disparities and find consolation, energy, confidence and renewal of our commitment in Him, with Him and for Him in the assembly we call the All-American.

What's An Orthodox Priest To Do?

When the Rev. John Parker was asked to say the benediction at the graduation rite for the Medical School of South Carolina, he did what any Eastern Orthodox priest would do.

He went straight to "The Great Book of Needs," a four-volume set of prayers collected over two millennia for use during every imaginable kind of ritual.

Then he received a letter from the president's office offering guidelines for prayers at this public school in Charleston, S.C. It required inclusive language such as "Holy God, Holy One, Creator, Sustainer" rather than prayers mentioning Jesus, Allah, the Trinity or other specific divine references.

"Steer clear of parochial, exclusively defining religious names, concepts, practices, and metaphors," it said. "A good rule of thumb to remember is that you come representing the entire faith community, not just your own group. The prayer should therefore not be offensive to anyone, whether Catholic, Baptist, Jewish, Muslim, etc."

Parker had a problem. He knew that centuries of Orthodox tradition forbad this approach. He decided that the policy was so inclusive that ancient Christian prayers would be excluded.

"As an Orthodox priest, I was invited to pray on behalf of all and for all," he said. "The question was, once I was there, would I be allowed to pray as an Orthodox Christian? According to that memo, they wanted me to pray in somebody else's words and, if you stop and think about it, to pray to somebody else's God.

"I knew that my archbishop would not allow me to do that. We cannot pray the way they wanted me to pray."

"... Nevertheless, Parker sent school officials the text of the Orthodox benediction. His invitation to pray was immediately revoked and the May graduation slot filled by a Southern Baptist pastor, one linked with the progressive Cooperative Baptist Fellowship. Another member of the same church serves as the medical school's chaplain...."
