Welcome HOME!

Greek for 'stewardship', OIKONOMIA--(oy-con-oh-me-ah) heralds humanity's homecoming by proclaiming uncommon wisdom for conscientious living through: simplicity, sustainability, stewardship...the foundation of Connecting Naturally for viable human Economy & Culture.

Humanity has increasingly become the prodigal son (as in the Christian parable of the same name), demanding its Divine inheritance only to squander it in "riotous living". Over the past several hundred years, western civilization has especially wandered far from its spiritual home, that place of union between created and Uncreated. Where else but in modern western civilization has there been such height of "riotous living", such pride in humanity and its technology by which all creation is subjugated to every human whim?

To deepen understanding of our human plight in the midst of uban industrial luxury, consider the word of recently glorified <u>Bishop Nikolai Velimirovic</u> of Serbia (now known as St. Nicholas of Zica), an Eastern Orthodox Christian who lived near to us in modern times. It is only fitting to turn to this Saint of ancient Christian tradition for spiritual wisdom, because his world view is the same as that of western civilization at a much earlier time period. Before journeying into the "far country" away from its "Father's Kingdom" and becoming virtually devoid of spiritual consciousness altogether, western

humanity possessed an anthropology and cosmology that were illumined by the same spiritual wisdom as St. Nicholas expounds.



St. Nicholas of Zica's interpretation of the inner meaning of the Parable of the Prodigal Son can be found in his <u>Homilies</u>, <u>Volume I</u>. He writes that when humanity fails to love (lacks spiritual vision) it is given over to the passions of its flesh (to gross materialism), and that for this reason there may be no real love outside of Divine love. Saint Nicholas goes on to state that humanity's Father in giving His son his portion, gave him more than his share; not just dust of a physical body which is all humanity can claim for its own, but a spark of Divine conscience and understanding. This something more is the veritable Divine Image in which humanity is believed to be created, the solid spiritual foundation upon which <u>Orthodox Christianity</u> rests, and the basis of its <u>ikonography</u>.

In the far country of the parable where a famine occurs, the Saint further says there is always famine, for the materiality of the land cannot satisfy the hunger of human passions. Material food increases this hunger for material goods which can only be quenched spiritually by Divine communion. When humanity chooses to go its own way apart from communion with Divinity for which it has been created, it loses spiritual vision and finds itself "...lost in a maze rushing one way and another." Mankind thereby "...takes an axe to the roots of...(its) own life, cutting away a root a day until the tree begins to wither."

Where there is no (spiritual) vision, people cast off restraint.~ Proverbs 29:18

Can there be a more truthful picture of what is really happening to humanity in the modern world? For example, in the western gold rush for the "good life" void of spiritual understanding of creation, cheap food has been produced by industrial methods. Some have fattened their purses on this "food", but side effects of poisonous compounds used as a means to this end have been grossly underestimated, in particular the effects of these on human nutrition and health. Today the Standard American Diet (S.A.D.) is one whereby most people are well-fed, but are malnourished and "advances" in obesity and disease are made despite western medical technology and industrial food production.

Oikonomia in the ancient Greek of early Christianity simply means "household management" and "household manager", "stewardship" and "steward" in English. Unfortunately, stewardship in western circles has come to mean little more than money management, or some utilitarian view of nature as "resource" or commodity. The root word of oikonomia in Greek is "oikos", meaning house, which is also the root of economy and ecology in English. But to truly have an ecological, much less a sacramental approach to stewardship, we must go beyond economic considerations to an understanding of relationship, of being family or one "house" with all creation.

But blessed are your eyes, for they see; and your ears, for they hear. Matthew 13:16

As <u>John Zizioulas</u> proclaims, an understanding of <u>priesthood</u> as the fundamental human relationship to creation enables us to overcome the utilitarian approach to nature, replacing it with one of unselfish love. As priest, mankind has the potential to unite all creation in relation to infinite, immortal Divinity and thereby save it from finitude in which it was created and wherein death has come to reign. If the Divine Image in humans is understood to include freedom expressed as creativity, then humanity either makes something new of nature that unifes all creation as a cosmos, or destroys nature through proprietorship, possessive ownership or division of spoils in which humanity tyrannizes nature by selfishly lording over that which it has not made and thereby doesn't rightfully "own".

But in order to become priests, we must journey on that spiritual path which brings us home to unity, to communion with the Divine Creator of all. Otherwise, we will be blind, will have no spiritual vision, will be unable to reshape nature with Wisdom from above, and will only continue to desacralize and desecrate it in human arrogance here below.

All creation even is waiting with earnest desire the unveiling of the vision of God's sons. Romans 8:19

Though that homecoming may seem a thousand miles away, it must be remembered that the journey begins, as all do, with a single step. To that end, this and related wisdom are explored here at OIKONOMIA™. The journey of our return home must begin daily ever anew in our relations with each other, and all Creation. Oh that all humanity would desire, as nature does, its return to Divine communion and to hear that blessed greeting upon arrival, "Welcome Home!" Until then, may each and everyone of us in this lifetime, amidst this "Valley of the Shadow of Death", truly have a...Bon Voyage!

+ B A R T H O L O M E W BY THE MERCY OF GOD ARCHBISHOP OF CONSTANTINOPLE, NEW ROME AND ECUMENICAL PATRIARCH

TO THE PLENITUDE OF THE CHURCH GRACE AND PEACE FROM THE CREATOR OF THE ENTIRE UNIVERSE OUR LORD, GOD AND SAVIOUR JESUS CHRIST

For creation was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who subjected it ... For we know that the whole creation groans and travails in pain together until now. (Rom. 8. 20,22)

Beloved Brothers and children in the Lord,

Once again, as the ecclesiastical year begins, we are called to reflect – with renewed spiritual intensity in Christ and especial sensitivity – on the state of our bountiful planet, and to offer particular prayers for the protection of the whole natural world.

Many things have changed since our predecessor, the late Patriarch Dimitrios decided, over two decades ago, that September 1st should be dedicated as a day of supplication for the preservation of God's beautiful creation. In assuming that initiative, the late Ecumenical Patriarch also issued a message of warning about the destructive consequences of abusing the environment. He noted that, in contrast with most other forms of human misuse and violation, environmental pollution has the potential to cause vast and irreversible damage, by destroying virtually all forms of life on the planet.

At the time, of course, this warning may have sounded exaggerated to certain sceptical ears; however, in the light of what we know now, it is abundantly clear that his words were prophetic. Today, environmental scientists expressly emphasize that the observed climate change has the potential to disrupt and destroy the entire ecosystem, which sustains not only the human species but also the entire wondrous world of animals and plants that is interdependent upon one another like a chain. The choices and actions of what is otherwise civilized modern man have led to this tragic situation, essentially comprising a moral and spiritual problem, which the divinely inspired Apostle Paul had articulated with colourful imagery in underlining its specifically ontological dimension in his Letter to the Romans nineteen centuries ago: "For creation was made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who subjected it ... For we know that the whole creation groans and travails in pain together until now." (Rom. 8. 20,22)

At this point, however, we are obligated to state that this spiritual and moral dimension of the environmental problem constitutes today, perhaps more so than ever before, the common conscience of all people, and especially young people, who are well aware of the fact that all of humanity has a common destiny. An increasing number of people comprehends that their overall consumption – namely, their personal involvement in the production of particular goods or their rejection of others – touches not only on ethical, but also on eschatological parameters. An increasing number of people understands that the irrational use of natural resources and the unchecked consumption of energy contribute to the reality of climate change, with consequences on the life and survival of humanity created in the image of God and is therefore tantamount to sin. An increasing number of people characterizes either virtuous or else vicious those who correspondingly treat created nature either reasonably or unreasonably.

Nevertheless, by the same token, even as people's awareness of the environmental crisis grows, unfortunately the image presented by our planet today is the opposite. Especially disturbing is the fact that the poorest and most vulnerable members of the human race are being affected by environmental problems which they did not create. From Australia to the Cape Horn of Africa, we learn of regions experiencing prolonged drought, which result in the desertification of formerly fertile and productive areas, where the local populations suffer from extreme hunger and thirst. From Latin America to the heart of Eurasia, we hear of melting glaciers, on which millions of people depend for water supply.

Our Holy and Great Church of Christ, following in the footsteps and example of the late Ecumenical Patriarch Dimitrios, is working tirelessly to raise awareness not only among public opinion but also among responsible world leaders. It achieves this by organizing Ecological Symposia that deal with climate change and the management of water. The ultimate purpose of this endeavor is to explore the interconnectedness of the world's ecosystems and to study the way in which the phenomena of global warming and its anthropogenic effects are manifested. Through these academic gatherings, attended by representatives of various Christian Churches and world religions as well as diverse scholarly disciplines, our Ecumenical Patriarchate is striving to establish a stable and innovative alliance between religion and science, based on the fundamental principle that – in order for the goal to be achieved and for the natural environment to be preserved – both sides must show a spirit of good will, mutual respect, and cooperation. The collaboration of science and religion at these Symposia organized in different regions of the planet, seeks to contribute to the development of an environmental ethic, which must underline that the use of the world and the enjoyment of material goods must be Eucharistic, accompanied by doxology toward God; by the same token, the abuse of the world and participation therein without reference to God is sinful both before the Creator and before humanity as creation.

Beloved Brothers and children in the Lord, we know that the creation participated in the fall of Adam from the original beauty; as a result, it groans and travails in pain together. Moreover, we know that the abuse, deviation, violation and arrogance of humanity contribute to the destruction of the travailing nature, which is subjected to the corruption of creation. Finally, we also know that this destruction actually comprises self-destruction. Therefore, we invite all of you, irrespective of position and profession, to remain faithful to a natural use of all God's creation, "offering thanks to the God, who created the world and granted everything to us."

For to Him is due all glory and power to the ages. Amen.

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I greet you in the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ following the inspiring and edifying 39th Biennial Clergy-Laity Congress of our Holy Archdiocese. WD-40

A man had bought a new pickup. His neighbor got up very early one Sunday morning and saw that someone had spray painted red a ll around the sides of this beige truck (for some unknown reason). The neighbor went over, woke the man up, and told him the bad news. He was very upset and was trying to figure out what to do. Probably nothing until Monday morning, since nothing was open.
