A GOOD WIFE

One of the glories of the Byzantine and other eastern churches is the married clergy. How glad I am that it is being restored in the States! Several of the Blesseds proclaimed by Pope John Paul II in Lviv a few years ago were married clergy. Having said this, I must say we often forget the other half of the married clergy—the pani, the priest's wife, the unsung heroine of the priestly couple. These wonderful women have a vocation of their own and their quiet, sometimes behind-the-scenes work is a blessing for their husbands and children, the parishioners whom they serve and even for us celibate priests.

Let's look at three of these valiant ladies. As a newly ordained priest in 1971, I was assigned to Holy Ghost Church, Northside Brooklyn, NY. Father Nicholas Wojakowsky was the pastor and Pani Anna, his wife. At that stage of his life Father Nicholas was ailing, and in fact was dying. Pani Anna took good care of Father and shielded him as much as possible from things that would upset or hurt him. Father died in the Spring of 1972, and Pani outlived him by many years, dying in Syracuse, NY. As I face my various maladies and health problems, I often wish I had a Pani Anna to care for me!

Father Myron and Pani Olga Sterniuk came to SS. Peter & Paul Ukrainian Greek Catholic Church in 1921, allegedly to cover the parish "for the summer" so the previous pastor could go home to Galicia for a vacation. Father was pastor in Plymouth until 1974—53 years! That's one long vacation! Plymouth was a "mixed" parish: Galicians, Lemkos, Transcarpathians, with a healthy admixture of independent tending Russophiles. After her death a few years after her husband's both the Ukrainian and Transcarpathian presses lauded Pani Olga for keeping the parish Catholic and from splitting, because she taught all the children all those years. (Fr. Myron was a close relative of the late Metropolitan Volodymyr Sterniuk, locum tenens of the see of Lviv between the death of Patriarch Joseph and the arrival of Patriarch Myroslav Ivan in Ukraine.)

Pani Sophia Klos was the wife of Father Basil Klos of St. Michael Church, Yonkers, NY. My spiritual director, Father Theodore Humanitzki, had his first assignment as a priest in Yonkers. Father Ted had intended to be a Roman Catholic priest and in fact was in his last year of studies for the New York Archdiocese when he found out he was Ukrainian Catholic. He was ordained for Stamford and when he got to Yonkers he was faced with a strange Liturgy, language and culture, not to mention the Old Calendar. He told me that there were many times he just wanted to leave and call it quits. Pani Sophia, however, would sit him down in the rectory kitchen with a cup of tea and console and counsel the young priest. She saved a great vocation for our church.

I am glad there are many wonderful *panis* in our church. I pray there will be many more!

PATRIARCH OF CONSTANTINOPLE ADDRESSES SYNOD OF BISHOPS

VATICAN CITY, 18 OCT 2008 (VIS) - In the Sistine Chapel at 5 p.m. today, the Holy Father presided at the celebration of first Vespers of the 29th Sunday of Ordinary Time, marking the participation of Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew I of Constantinople in the work of the current Twelfth Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops.

The ceremony, which was attended by more than 400 cardinals, bishops, priests, religious and lay people, began with a few brief words of introduction by Benedict XVI.

In his English-language talk, Bartholomew I highlighted how this "is the first time in history that an Ecumenical Patriarch is offered the opportunity to address a Synod of Bishops of the Roman Catholic Church, and thus be 'part of the life' of this sister Church at such a high level. We regard this as a manifestation of the work of the Holy Spirit leading our Churches to a closer and deeper relationship with each other, an important step towards the restoration of our full communion".

"It is well known that the Orthodox Church attaches to the synod system fundamental ecclesiological importance. Together with primacy, synodality constitutes the backbone of the Church's government and organization. ... Therefore, in having today the privilege to address your Synod our hopes are raised that the day will come when our two Churches will fully converge on the role of primacy and synodality in the Church's life, to which our joint theological commission is devoting its study at the present time".

"We have explored", he concluded, "the patristic teaching of the spiritual senses, discerning the power of hearing and speaking God's Word in Scripture, of seeing God's Word in icons and nature, as well as of touching and sharing God's Word in the saints and sacraments. Yet, in order to remain true to the life and mission of the Church, we must personally be changed by this Word. The Church must resemble the mother, who is both sustained by and nourishes through the food she eats. Anything that does not feed and nourish everyone cannot sustain us either. When the world does not share the joy of Christ's Resurrection, this is an indictment of our own integrity and commitment to the living Word of God".

Following the Patriarch's talk, the Pope thanked him for his words assuring him they would be studied and examined by the Synod. "This too was a joyful experience", he said, "an experience of unity, perhaps not perfect but real and profound. I thought to myself: your Fathers, whom you quoted widely, are also our Fathers and ours are also yours. And if we have shared Fathers how can we not be brothers?" *AC/VESPERS/BARTHOLOMEW I* VIS 081020 (460)
