# <u>A Deck of Cards</u>

It was quiet that day, the guns and the mortars, and land mines for some reason hadn't been heard.

The young soldier knew it was Sunday, the holiest day of the week.

As he was sitting there, he got out an old deck of cards and laid them out across his bunk.

Just then an army sergeant came in and said, 'Why aren't you with the rest of the platoon?'

The soldier replied, 'I thought I would stay behind and spend some time with the Lord.'

The sergeant said, 'Looks to me like you're going to play cards.'

The soldier said, 'No, sir. You see, since we are not allowed to have Bibles or other spiritual books in this country, I've decided to talk to the Lord by studying this deck of cards.'

The sergeant asked in disbelief, 'How will you do that?'

'You see the Ace, Sergeant? It reminds me that there is only one God.

The Two represents the two parts of the Bible, the Old and the New Testaments

The Three represents the Father, Son, and the Holy Ghost.

The Four stands for the Four Gospels: Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. The Five is for the five virgins there were ten but only five of them were glorified.

The Six is for the six days it took God to create the Heavens and Earth. The Seven is for the day God rested after making His Creation.

The Eight is for the family of Noah and his wife, their three sons and their wives—the eight people God spared from the flood that destroyed the Earth. The Nine is for the lepers that Jesus cleansed of leprosy He cleansed ten, but nine never thanked Him.

The Ten represents the Ten Commandments that God handed down to Moses on tablets made of stone.

The Jack is a reminder of Satan, one of God's first angels, but he got kicked out of heaven for his sly and wicked ways and is now the joker of eternal hell. The Queen stands for the Virgin Mary.

The King stands for Jesus, for he is the King of all kings.

When I count the dots on all the cards, I come up with 365 total, one for every day of the year.

There are a total of 52 cards in a deck; each is a week—52 weeks in a year. The four suits represent the four seasons: Spring, Summer, Fall, and Winter. Each suit has thirteen cards—there are exactly thirteen weeks in a quarter.

So when I want to talk to God and thank Him, I just pull out this old deck of cards and they remind me of all that I have to be thankful for.'

The sergeant just stood there. After a minute, with tears in his eyes and pain in his heart, he said, 'Soldier, can I borrow that deck of cards?'

Please let this be a reminder and take time to pray for all of our soldiers who are being sent away, putting their lives on the line fighting...

Toward the end of his life, Father Augustine the Russian (+ 1965) lived alone in a hermitage dependent on the monastery of Philotheou (on Mount Athos). He had a great love for every person, and every time he met anyone, whether monk or layman, he would make a deep bow to him. "He carries the grace of Holy Baptism," he would say whenever someone asked why he did this.

He overflowed with charity even for animals. Little by little, he transformed the enclosure of his hermitage into a hospice for elderly and ailing animals: asses and mules that were blind, lame, moribund, sick, or otherwise useless. The lay workers would open his gate and let such animals in without even asking him. The good old man would then take loving care of them. He used to go and cut fresh grass and store it for winter's provisions, for his "disciples," as he used to call them. When the fathers of the monastery saw how weak he had become, they suggested that they take him to the monastery infirmary. Father Augustine answered, "I can't leave my mules!" Finally, he accepted.

At night, he had no need of a kerosene lamp. "God gives me another light," he used to say, "and I can see more clearly than during the day." In his simplicity, he believed that everyone could see, just like he could, the uncreated light of God. One day, the eve of the Annunciation, the patronal feast of the monastery, monks and laymen were busy polishing the monastery's brass. Suddenly, Father Augustine appeared, radiant, quite transformed with the divine presence.

"Bless me, holy fathers!" he said, making his usual prostration. "Say, how are you, Father Augustine?"

"I want to confide a thought to you. You must tell me if I am experiencing an illusion. This night, all night, there was a lot of light. One could see clearly, just like daylight, from Caracallou to Stavronikita. I could pick out the least detail. Was this, maybe, an illusion?"

One of the lay workers, mocking the old man, replied, "But, dear father, it was a sputnik satellite. It fell from the sky into your cell and lit everything up."

Reassured, Father Augustine thanked him, and took his leave.

When he was bedridden in the infirmary, he used often to shout, "The holy angels are coming, there! there! Don't you see them?" And he would wake up the elderly monks sleeping next to him and shake them. Then, a little later, "The saints are here! The All Holy Mother of God!" And he would again awaken the other invalids. The infirmarian used to reprimand him severely, saying, "Won't you stop this? You're deluded. Who is someone like you that the saints should come visit you?" Every day it was like that. When Father Augustine finally passed away, his face suddenly lit up, blindingly, three times. The infirmarian then understood his error, and exclaimed, "Now I am sure that this one was a saint!"

SERMON: 9/6/09 "STAND UP FOR YOUR FAITH" 13<sup>TH</sup> Matthew I Cor. 16:13-24. Matt. 21:35-42)

BE WATCHFUL. STAND FIRM IN YOUR FAITH. BE COURAGEOUS. BE STRONG. LET ALL YOU DO BE DONE IN LOVE. (I Cor. 16:13-14)

Good spiritual advice from St. Paul as we begin a new Ecclesiastical Year. It comes from today's Epistle Reading.

Our contemporary society contains many elements that militate against faith and our Christian beliefs. A display of faith or religion in the public arena often meets vehement opposition. In some offices, Christians are told not to wear visible neck crosses anymore. On major Christian holy days Christmas, Christians are told not to greet others with a Christian greeting. Even MERRY CHRISTMAS has become offensive to some.

A college freshman gets paired up with a dorm partner who is a Satan worshiper with displays of devils and satanic images in her dorm room. The student and her parents, who are Christian believers, complain to the college administration and are told there is nothing they can do about it. They cannot change her roommate or room. Besides this is part of their daughter's college education!

These realities are happening not in Communist China or North Korea, but in America today. Some prophetic writers predict that an age of

persecution of Christians is coming to America, just as it happened in Communist Russia for 73 years. We used to think that this just talk of fanatics. But the signs of the times seem to confirm the possibility more and more.

Why the increase of private Christian schools today? Why are people sending their children to them at considerable sacrifice and expense? Why is the home schooling industry increasing so rapidly!? People of faith want to preserve their Christian values!

Whether or not you fear the opposition to Christian principles prevalent today, you need to be watchful. You and I and all Christian believers need to be vigilant. We must stand firm in our Christian faith, as the Bible advises believers.

People ask, Father, should we send our children to a Catholic, Mennonite or Christian School? They ask because they want their children to learn in an atmosphere where God and the Bible and our Christian heritage are still honored and respected.

Circumstances have changed radically in my lifetime. I well remember the public school teachers who read the Bible at the beginning of classes. One of my homeroom teachers in public school had us memorize verses from the Book of Psalms in the Old Testament.

I remember singing Christian hymns in public gatherings.

# "FAITH OF OUR FATHERS LIVING STILL" or

"HOLY, HOLY, HOLY, LORD GOD ALMIGHT, EARLY IN THE MORNING, OUR SONG SHALL RISE TO THEE" or

"We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing..." at Thanksgiving.

"Joy to the world! The Lord is come ... " at Christmas time, or

"God bless America" on patriotic days.

Admittedly these were well-known Protestant hymns. However, they did convey a Christian message of faith with which all Christians could identify.

Those days are gone. All the more reason today why we need to make our Church Schools and Sunday Schools vibrant and relevant. We need to keep Bible Studies and Orthodox Study Groups and Summer Orthodox Camp Programs, and GOYA and ORTHODOX COLLEGE FELLOWSHIPS as effective as possible. We need to teach and practice personal home devotions. If our youth and young adults don't receive Orthodox Christian education and nurturing from the Church and home, where will they get it? They definitely will not receive it from today's society where even the name of Jesus or a Christian Icon cannot be displayed in public places.

Thank God that the Orthodox Church today is trying to be more **vigilant**, more **watchful** and **courageous** by emphasizing religious training and awareness of the Gospel. Our own Fr. **Hector Firoglanis** is speaking this weekend at the Mission & Evangelism Conference at Antiochian Village to persons interested in strengthening their Orthodox faith.

Several years ago, Presvytera Pearl and I were attending an Orthodox Mission & Evangelism Conference in Colorado Springs, Colorado. We visited the **AGHIA SOPHIA Orthodox Coffee House located** in the city's down town. In this Coffee House, a group of dedicated Orthodox Christians and a priest carry on a steady powerful witness for the Orthodox Christian faith. The Coffee House consists of a 3-story house. It is open 7 days a week, all day. Anyone can walk in anytime for a cup of coffee and other nonalcoholic beverages and a sweet, sit down in an environment filled with Orthodox Christian books and icons attractively displayed. Volunteers roam the house and talk to anyone who wishes to talk, or read and learn more about Orthodoxy. Vsitors can simply sit in a comfortable chair and talk with friends. The whole idea of this Coffee House is to expose visitors to Orthodox Christianity.

Fr. **Stephen Vernak**, the dynamic young Pastor of Christ the Savior Orthodox Church in Harrisburg, visited this Coffee House in Colorado Springs this week. He and a committee of dedicated parishioners are in the process of buying a property in downtown Harrisburg to establish another **AGHIA SOPHIA ORTHODOX COFFEE HOUSE.** It will be their way to witness to Orthodoxy in Harrisburg.

# BE COURAGEOUS. BE STRONG. LET ALL YOU DO BE DONE IN LOVE.

Yes, it takes courage and vision to reach out of the box of our comfort zone and to let others know who we are as Orthodox Christians. We need to be **strong** in our faith to talk openly about Jesus Christ as Our Lord, God and Savior to those willing to listen. Some will challenge us when we stand up for Christ. Some will tell us all religions are the same and that we all worship the same God. Some may call us fanatics.

Yet if we keep feeding our inner life through daily Bible reading, through regular prayer and devotions, through repentance and through the sacrament of Holy Communion, we can strengthen our Christian witness. God will help us to be bold, courageous and ready to answer all who ask us about "the hope that is within" us, as St. Peter tells us.

Some years ago **Fr**. **Lazarus Moore**, a convert Australian Orthodox priest, visited our parish. He was an itinerant older priest, about 82 years old and very joyful. He wore sneakers with his monk's robe and knew the Bible very well. He read it in the original Greek and had a gift of teaching it in English. He conducted a Bible Study in our Church. Some will remember him. We hosted him in our home overnight and in the morning he put on his sneakers and jumped up and down doing his calisthenics and strechting his arms and legs and jogging up and down Springside Drive. He did everything with such CONTAGIOUS JOY. He made all around him **smile with joy as he related the Scriptures to everyday living**.

Before he left, we asked him to sign his name in our guest book. We wanted to remember his wonderful inspiring visit. He wrote this short verse above his name:

## "Let all you do be done in love."

The very verse quoted earlier from today's Epistle: I Cor. 16:14

Over the years, I have quoted and written that verse many times, always remembering **Fr. Lazarus Moore and his joyful, loving Christian** witness.

As we begin another Ecclesiastical Year this first week of September, let these words guide us, too, in our Christian life:

BE WATCHFUL. STAND FIRM IN YOUR FAITH. BE COURAGEOUS. BE STRONG. LET ALL YOU DO BE DONE IN LOVE. LET US PRAY:

Help us, Lord, with the grace of your Holy Spirit to be witnesses for Jesus Christ through our lives, our words and the opportunities you set before us each day. Amen.
