Many people recognize the physical benefits of stretching exercises. Christians ask about the practice of Yoga. The word "Yoga" means "to yoke with (or "have union with") a god." The chant, "Om," is a Hindu sound symbolizing "The Absolute." Subhas Tiwari, professor at the Hundu University of America, explains: "The effort to separate Yoga from Hinduism must be challenged because it runs counter to the fundamental principles upon which Yoga itself is premised, the yamas (restraints) and niyamas (observances). These ethical tenets and religious practices are the first two limbs of the eight-limbed ashtanga Yoga system. which also includes asana (postures), pranayama (breath control), pratyahara (sense withdrawal), dharana (concentration), dhyana (meditation) and Samadhi (contemplation/self-realization). Efforts to separate Yoga from its spiritual center reveal ignorance of the goal of Yoga...

Yoga is also much more, as it was intended by the Vedic Seers as an instrument which can lead one to apprehend the Absolute, Ultimate Reality, called the Brahaman Reality, or god." Dennis McGuire of Yoga.com admits, "The practice of Yoga was designed to unite the individual with The Infinite."

It is unwise to dabble in non-Orthodox religious activity and self-focused philosophy. It is our pride which arrogantly says "I won't be affected by it." Christian author Allen Palmeri writes, "Playing with a little fire is playing with fire. Fire is fire. It burns. Play with a little Yoga, play with fire. Yoga

is a little fire. Consider yourself warned." Does lying on the floor doing stretching exercises make you a Buddhist? Of course not. However, the practice of Yoga—particularly in organized sessions led by non-Orthodox Christians—is the practice of not just a physical exercise but a religious experience, whether one knows it or not. And its practice invokes a spirit in conflict with the Church of Jesus Christ. As author Ted Kluck states, "We don't need to 'find our center.' We need to find God."

Don't let anyone disregard it when he sins against a fellow Christian. But when you sin so against the brethren, and wound their weak conscience, you sin against Christ. Because we have been all made members of Christ. How can you not sin against Christ if your sin against a member of Christ? Blessed Augustine

It is a great thing to cultivate this respect for our brethren so that we fear to harm ourselves and one another, that we honor one another and that we keep a careful check on our gestures and on our countenance towards one another. For these later, as one of the elders points out, can come under the heading of 'taking liberties.' Should it happen that you see a brother doing wrong, don't despise him and wipe your hands of him and keep silence and let him be destroyed, nor again curse him or speak ill of him. But with sympathy and the fear of God speak to someone who is able to set him up again, or you yourself speak to him with love and humility, saying, 'Pardon me, brother, but I consider - being careless myself - we probably do not act rightly in doing so-and-so. *St. Dorotheos of Gaza*

An old man said: For nine years a brother was tempted in thought to the point of despairing of his salvation, and being scrupulous, he condemned himself, saying, "I have lost my soul, and since I am lost, I shall go back to the world." But while he was on the way, a voice came to him on the road, which said, "These nine years during which you have been tempted have been crowns for you; go back to your place, and I will allay these thoughts." Understand that it is not good for someone to despair of himself because of his temptations; rather temptations procure crowns for us if we use them well

...if evil thoughts have not been uprooted from the heart, they are bound to manifest themselves in evil actions. *St. Philotheos of Sinai*

Question to the Geronta: 'If someone keeps company with virtuous people, will he be helped?' "Of course he'll be helped. If you enter a monastic cell, where incense is burned on a regular basis, you will come out smelling of incense. If you enter a stable, you will pick up the smell of the stable. If you visit a worldly home, you will smell of secular perfumes when you leave."

Whoever is at peace in the material world and is not concerned about the salvation of his soul is like the senseless birds who don't make a noise from within the egg, so as to break the shell and come out to enjoy the sun—the heavenly flight in the life of Paradise—but instead remain unmoving and die inside the egg shell. *Elder Paisios* +1994
