Faithfulness to The Creed

Believers recite The Creed at Holy Baptism for the first time. The Creed is recited and reaffirmed at each Divine Liturgy. The Creed serves as

the basic summary of Christian beliefs and is a measurement of faith throughout life.

The Creed expresses belief in the Holy Trinity...The Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. The Creed addresses the Virgin Birth of Christ, Christ's death and Resurrection.

The Creed speaks about Christ's ascension and His return to judge the living and the dead. The Creed identifies the importance of the Holy Prophets and the speaking of the Holy Spirit through the Holy Prophets.

The validity of a single baptism is affirmed. The Creed shapes and influences the life of the believer from the time of Holy Baptism. The Creed intersects the life of the believer during the ensuing days of life.

The serious believer is attentive to the words of The Creed. The serious believer considers the process leading to the formulation of The Creed. Heartfelt thinking went into the crafting of every word of The Creed.

Putting together the words of The Creed involved an unshakeable understanding of God. The Creed would need to withstand the test of time.

With each recitation of The Creed believers have the opportunity to personally reflect on their Holy Baptism and measure their faithfulness to The Creed.

Individuals come to Holy Baptism with the purest of intentions. The Kingdom of God is the intended goal. By faithfulness to the beliefs expressed at Holy Baptism the believer experiences the Kingdom of God.

Believers attending the Divine Liturgy determine how well The Creed has been personally honored. Believers know very well if their lives are true to the Baptismal commitment.

The degree to which The Creed is fundamental to the constitution of the believer is manifested in personal relationships and in the fulfilling of daily responsibilities and duties.

The degree to which the believer's life is inseparable from the content of The Creed is known in the way the believer lives each day. The Lord Jesus Christ said: "You will know them by their fruits." (Mt.7:16)

Serious responsibilities accompany taking on the Christian identity. Holy Baptism defines and shapes the remaining days of a person's life. The Creed provides the most formidable structure to address each day of life.

Living The Creed transforms the believer. The whole person is dedicated to God at Holy Baptism. The whole person is expected to always live unto God.

The joy of Holy Baptism is renewed when daily life is faithful to The Creed.

Icon of the Most Holy Theotokos—"Three Hands"



The original of this icon, now located on Mount Athos at Hilandar Monastery, is from the 8th century and has quite an important and unusual history and significance. During the iconoclast controversy centered in Byzantium in this same century, the venerators of icons were severely persecuted by the icon smashers (iconoclasts) who left the continuous tradition of icon reverence of the Church from the very first days of Christianity, and destroyed or defaced the holy images which they mistakenly called idols. This was at least partly due to the unusual and surprising rise of Islam in the previous two centuries and their military success which greatly affected the entire Middle Eastern area at that time, and threatened to engulf all of the Roman Empire which had converted to Christianity.

St. John Damascene lived at that time in Damascus and fearlessly wrote the definitive defense of the use of icons for veneration for the faithful, and elucidated the difference between worship (which is only

reserved for God Himself) and veneration which extends to that which brings us in remembrance of God. Thus, through St. John's extensive writings, the icons were ably explained to this day. When the Emperor was unable to stop St. John from writing, as he was out of his political reach, he had him indirectly slandered as leaking state secrets, and the Sultan in a rage had St. John's right hand cut off. Not losing faith, St. John held his hand up before this icon of the Virgin, and it was miraculously restored whole, and he continued to write in defense of the icons. In gratitude for the miracle, St. John had a silver replica of his hand made and attached to the metal cover of the icon, which gives it its unusual name "of three hands". Later taken to the Holy Mountain of Athos, this icon still inspires the faithful to turn their hearts to God, and defend the truth of faith from mistaken ideas, even when unpopular.

After raging through almost a century and a quarter, the iconoclast controversy was resolved in favor of the continuance of icon veneration finally in 843, and these wonderful blessings to focus our minds and prayers to God have continued to be an integral and important part of the Church proclaiming Christ's Incarnation in material creation. The particularly lovely features of both Christ and the Virgin of this icon make the intensification of our prayers and the turning of our hearts a natural result of looking deeply at this window into the Heavenly World.

In time of religious peace, we take up our cross and follow Christ by putting our evil passions and desires to death through virtuous living. But when persecutions come, we must despise our own life, give up our soul for the sake of our Faith and therefore take up our cross and follow the Lord, so as to inherit eternal life. 'He that findeth his soul,' says the Scripture, 'shall lose it; and he that loseth his soul for My sake shall find it' (Matt. 10:39). *St. Gregory Palamas*

One of my [Presbytera Candace Schef] all-time favorite spiritual books is Wounded by Love, the Life and the Wisdom of Elder Porphyrios. The content of this book, I've found, is a balm for the soul. Most Orthodox Christian bookstores carry it; if you are looking for a copy and cannot find it, write to me and I'll help you source one, if desired. Here is an excerpt, starting on page 116, where you can read further if you have a copy at home:

We shouldn't blackmail God with our prayers. We shouldn't ask God to release us from something, from an illness, for example, or to solve our problems, but we should ask for strength and support from Him to bear

what we have to bear. Just as He knocks discretely at the door of our soul, so we should ask discretley for what we desire and if the Lord does not respond, we should cease to ask. When God does not give us something that we ask for insistently, then He has His reasons. God, too, has His 'secrets.' Since we believe in His good providence, since we believe that He knows everything about our lives and that He always desires what is good, why should we not trust Him? Let us pray naturally and gently, without forcing ourself and without passion. We know that past, present, and future are all known, open and laid bare before God. As St. Paul says, Before him no creature is hidden, but all are open and laid bare to His eyes. We should not insist; such persistence does harm instead of good. We shouldn't continue relentlessly in order to acquire what we want; rather we should leave things to the will of God. Because the more we pursue something, the more it runs away from us. So what is required is patience, faith and composure. And if we forget it, the Lord never forgets; and if it is for our good, He will give us what we require when we require it.

In our prayer we should ask only for the salvation of our soul. Didn't the Lord say, Seek first the Kingdom of God, and all these things will be added to you? Easily, without the slightest difficulty, Christ can give us what we want. And remember the secret. The secret is not to think about asking for the specific thing at all. The secret is to ask for your union with Christ with utter selflessness, without saying, 'give me this,' or 'give me that.' It suffices to say, "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me." God has no need to be informed by us about our various needs. He knows them all incomparably better than we do and He gives us His love. What is important is for us to respond to this love with prayer and with the keeping of His commandments. We should ask for the will of God to be done. That is what is in our best interest and the safest thing for us and for those for whom we pray. Christ will give us everything abundantly. When there is even a trace of egotism, nothing happens.

Fortunate is the man who has come to have God as his helper and to have his hopes in Him alone. Let the devil bear malice towards him, let all men persecute him and plot against him, let all his adversaries fight against him - he never fears anyone, because his has God as his helper. He remains always a victor, always glorified, always happy, always rich, always cheerful and joyful, even if he happens to fall into extreme poverty and into a great many adverse and grievous circumstances of this present life. For inasmuch as he hopes in Almighty God, he does not despair, he is not sorry, is not anxious, but expects help from Above. Fortunate, then, is such a man and worthy to be deemed happy, just as the Prophet-king David

regards such a man as happy, saying: "Blessed is he whose helper is the God of Jacob, whose hope is in the Lord his God." Such were all the Prophets, the Apostles, the Martyrs, the Holy Ascetics and all the Saints from the beginning of time. St. Nikiforos of Xios

Do you believe that the words of your Lord, "take up your cross," refer to you personally? If you believe this, then take it up. The Lord has laid it on your shoulders in this present grievous case. Do not say it is too heavy; God knows better the measure of your strength. To some God sends trials and sorrows, brought about by circumstances and in no way dependent on people, these are more easily borne. To others He sends those caused by people, and they are harder, especially when we have done some good to those people. The last case is the hardest to bear. If God sends you this, know that it is precisely what is most useful to you, and to this realization add the inspiring thought: God sees that you are strong enough to bear it and expects you to actually bear it with a good heart, without complaining. So, do not disappoint God's expectations. From Unseen Warfare (as edited by St. Nicodemus of the Holy Mountain and St. Theophan the Recluse)

You undertake different tasks, so you tell me, "in most cases unwillingly and without any eagerness—I have to force myself." But this, after all, is a basic principle in the spiritual life—to set yourself in opposition to what is bad and to force yourself to do what is good. This is the meaning of the Lord's words, The Kingdom of Heaven suffereth violence and the violent take it by force, (Matt 11:12). This is why following the Lord is a yoke. If all were done eagerly, where would be the yoke? Yet, in the end, it so comes about that everything is done easily and willingly. *St. Theophan the Recluse*
