BSA Chief visits Newtown, presents Spirit of the Eagle Award to Tiger Cubs' parents

In a touching gesture, the two <u>Tiger Cubs killed in last week's</u> <u>shootings</u> at Sandy Hook Elementary School have been awarded the Spirit of the Eagle Award.

BSA Chief Scout Executive Wayne Brock and other top professionals presented the families of Chase Kowalski and Benjamin Wheeler with the award, "an honorary, posthumous special recognition for a registered youth member who has lost his or her life in an accident or through illness."

Wayne shared with the BSA family some details from his emotional visit. I can't imagine the overwhelming heartache he witnessed as he attended three wakes and a funeral for Tiger Cubs Chase and Benjamin, as well as for two girls who were sisters of Cub Scouts in Newtown's Pack 170.

The photo above, <u>shared by CBS Reporter Paula Reid</u>, shows Scouts saluting 6-year-old Benjamin at one of those events. What a powerful image. (*Note:* Paula tells me the Scouts will likely be featured in her story on <u>The CBS Evening News with Scott Pelley</u> at 6:30 p.m. Eastern today, Thursday.)

Take a moment to read Wayne's heartfelt letter below. In it, you'll find details on the outpouring of support that's already been felt in Newtown — phone calls, e-mails, and letters from Scouting families from all over the world.

And Wayne shares info on how to send supportive cards and letters or make a donation to a memorial fund established by the Connecticut Yankee Council.

Here's the letter:

Wayne Brock's Letter

To: National Board, Advisory Council, and our BSA family:

As I write this message, I am on an airplane returning from Newtown, Connecticut, where along with Scouters from the Connecticut Yankee Council, I attended three wakes and a funeral for the two Cub Scouts and two sisters of Cub Scouts who lost their lives at Sandy Hook Elementary School. We were all overcome with emotion. The outpouring of support was wonderful. People waited in line for hours in the cold to express their condolences and support for the families of all the children lost on that tragic day.

The council president, Doug Machin, shared with families that the council established a memorial fund in the names of their loved ones and that the council has received phone calls, emails, and letters from Scouting families from all over the world.

The council director of field service, Jon Pleva, presented an American flag to the families of Cub Scouts Chase Kowalski and Benjamin Wheeler, and I presented each boy's family the Spirit of the Eagle Award on behalf of the Boy Scouts of America. I can tell you, the families were very touched and appreciative.

During times like this, we all want to do something. We feel helpless. The Scouters of Newtown understand this and asked me to express their appreciation to you. Right now, what they need most is time to heal as a community. In the weeks ahead, the Scouts and Scouters of Newtown will convene to determine if there is anything more our Scouting family can do for them. For now, our thoughts, prayers, and contributions to the memorial fund are important. I believe we can take comfort in knowing that even during the sad and disturbing times we experience in the face of national tragedies, the Boy Scouts of America is among the constants that young people and their families can look to for guidance and support. We need strong shoulders, to be sure, to bear such a burden, but it is a load that we have carried honorably and well for more than a century. Our nation's young people depend on the values we teach, and we will never let them down. I am so proud to be working shoulder to shoulder with each of you in service to the youth of America.

Who can tell how often we offend? O, cleanse me of my hidden faults (Ps 19:12):

Lord Jesus Christ, deliver me from pride and give me self-knowledge.

Lord Jesus Christ, forgive me and deliver me from self-importance.

Lord Jesus Christ, deliver me from the pride of self-importance and thinking I know best and give me self-knowledge.

Sunday Sermon--11th Luke—Sunday of the Forefathers--"Excuses Sunday" (Delivered by Fr. Demetri Tsigas @ St. Katherine on the 16th of December, 2012)

In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, Amen.

You are invited. You are invited to the greatest party ever thrown—at any time, in any place, for any occasion. It is the wedding feast of God for His bride, the Church. Each of us makes up that Church. Therefore, we are not only honored guests but collectively the very bride of God. We are the whole reason for this incredible feast.

Let me provide a little background for today's gospel reading. In antiquity, preparations for a feast were an inexact science. There were no

well-stocked supermarkets, microwave ovens or commercial kitchens like we have today. The feast was ready when all the supplies could be found and when the cooking and preparations were completed. Therefore, two invitations were sent out. The first was to invite guests to the party and to get a head count. The second went out when all was finally ready.

In today's gospel reading, at the first invitation, all the invited guests responded that they would attend. However, when the servants went out with the second invitation, all these honored guests had an excuse, something more pressing that prevented them from joining in the feast.

Can you imagine being the host of such a party? You invite all your friends, they all tell you they wouldn't miss it for the world, then nobody shows up on the day of the event. Think about how sad and angry you would be, totally dejected at being so rejected. All the time, money and work you put into this event gone to waste.

The surface and first meaning of today's gospel lesson is about how the Jews were called by God through Moses and the prophets—this is the first invitation. However, when God sends His Son, Jesus Christ, with the second invitation, they all find some excuse not to accept it. So instead of the intended honored guests, God's "chosen people", attending the eternal divine banquet, the final call goes out to all the rest of the world.

The second meaning goes out to each of us. We all know the fourth commandment, to remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy. We all know that there's no fine print with all kinds of exceptions to this rule. The fine print actually makes a case against all exceptions, a case against all excuses. Yet, we so easily find so many excuses, reasons and rationalizations not to attend.

We have accepted God's first invitation, to believe in Him, and to be baptized in His holy name, that of the Holy Trinity. Yet so often we allow the cares of this life to crowd Him out. Think how this must make Him feel. Think also what the eternal implications are for each us.

In the Orthodox Church, this Sunday before Christmas is referred to as Sunday of the Forefathers. In other churches, the Sunday with today's gospel reading is referred to as "Excuses Sunday" or more accurately "No Excuses Sunday". The sermon often goes something like this.

In order to make it possible for all to attend church next Sunday, we are going to have a special "No Excuse Sunday". Cots and pillows will be placed in the Narthex for those who say, "Sunday is my only day to sleep in." Visine will be made available for those with tired eyes from staying up too late watching television or being out too late on Saturday night. For those who think, "The roof would cave in if ever I came to church", heavy duty steel construction hard hats will be provided. For those who think the church is too cold, blankets will be provided, as well as fans for those who think the church is too hot. Hearing aids will be provided for those who think the priest speaks too softly, and cotton for those who think he speaks too loudly. Score cards will be provided for those who wish to list how many hypocrites are present, to judge the sermon, the chanter or the choir. Of course the score cards have already been marked once with an "X" for you.

We will make arrangements for relatives and friends to be present for all those who like to go visiting on Sunday mornings. Lattes will be provided at coffee hour for those who prefer to do their Sunday morning "devotionals" at Starbucks or Dunkin Donuts. Takeout dinners will be provided for those who say they cannot go to church and cook dinner too. Treadmills will be provided for those who like to go for a run or a walk on Sunday mornings. A putting and driving range will be set up for those who may prefer to go for a round of golf. Two other nature sections will be set up, one with a wooded scene, the other with sand and a beach scene along wave sounds for those who prefer to seek God in nature. Finally, the sanctuary will be decorated with poinsettias, palm leaves and Easter lilies for those who have never seen the church without them – Christmas, Palm & Easter Sunday Christians. Greek Festival signs will be put up for those who only ever come then.

As you can see the excuses can come quite easily if we let them. There's always something we can come up with not to be in God's Holy Temple and worship Him on a Sunday morning.

What if God were only there for us as much as we were there for Him?...what a lonely and hopeless existence that would be. Some Church Fathers have written that our eternal relationship with God is based proportionally on our earthly one. Thus in the afterlife, there is nothing but God. None of the other distractions of this life are present. If we only spend a few minutes a week or for that matter a few seconds a year in God's presence in this life, likewise for all eternity we only get a few second or minutes a week or a year with God. The rest of the time is just empty, hopeless, endless emptiness.

Brothers and sisters, we have all received an incredible invitation. Our loving Lord has sacrificially prepared the most sumptuous banquet ever in the history of the universe. We have all been notified of our invitation by His servants—all is now ready. The table is set with the Flesh and Blood of the Lamb, a divine, mystical and eternal banquet. Do you honestly have the gall to offer an excuse?

Some years ago the Cincinnati Enquirer ran a cartoon for Christmas. In it, Joseph is standing in the manger with Mary and the Christ child. He's holding a telephone. The caption reads, "First the shepherds, now the kings...they'd love to come visit but their cards aren't mailed yet, they're still getting their Christmas lights up, they spent all morning getting the house cleaned for relatives and they still have a lot of shopping yet to finish up..."

As we near this most joyful celebration, let's be careful not to crowd Christ out of it. He is the ultimate reason not just for the season, but for all things. Take the time to invite Him into your life everyday, to visit and speak with Him. Don't end up excusing yourself from His eternal banquet because of some dumb, petty excuse you'll later regret. Keep Christ firmly at the center of your Christmas celebration.
