You can thank this Eagle Scout for the wind chill (or at least its name) 29 January 2014 [Bryan on Scouting blog] OK, so maybe it's unfair to blame Paul Siple for the cold weather blanketing the country this week, including below-freezing temps from Washington State to the Florida Panhandle and all across the Northeast.

But Siple, who earned the Eagle Scout rank in 1923, is responsible for coining the term we use to describe just how cold it feels out there: "wind chill."

The Sea Scout, Silver Buffalo Award recipient, Vigil Honor member of the Order of the Arrow and Antarctic explorer died in 1968 at age 59. But his legacy lives on every time we check the weather apps on our phone before stepping outside.

As <u>this Order of the Arrow writeup</u> explains, Siple was chosen among 600,000 Scouts to join an Antarctic expedition in 1928. Siple's place on the expedition had to be publicly funded; "pennies, nickels and dimes" were raised by the *Weekly Reader* "to help send Paul to the Antarctic." His companion on the trip was none other than Admiral Richard Byrd.

Siple later wrote four books, appeared on the cover of *Time* magazine and became a hero to all Scouts.

But "wind chill" is his most lasting legacy. Siple did doctoral thesis research on the ways in which wind affects how humans feel outside. So the next time you check the weather to decide whether to add another layer, think of this great Eagle Scout.

Be angry and sin not: let not the sun go down upon your wrath. Neither give place to the devil. Ephesians 4:26-27

From my personal experience, from my experience as a spiritual father, and from my observations in society, I have found that one of the endemic sins of contemporary mankind is anger. This sin can be of a personal nature and also of a group nature. The first is individual anger and the other is the anger of a people which can lead to destructive war, for a short or a long time, but executed with a cruelty which the technology of past centuries could not carry out...

Personal anger transforms the heart of a man from a dwelling place of the Holy Spirit into a demonized house, because it changes the spiritual structure of the soul, orienting it toward the dark regions of the human being. History knows disastrous events brought about by anger and tragic incidents caused by impetuous anger, which created regrets and hopelessness in he who allowed himself to be seized by it.

The Holy Scripture is intensely preoccupied with the problem of anger. In comparison to ancient times, our times give greater occasion for anger to manifest. This is due to the great increase in the density of the population, which has reduced the personal security of the individual to a minimum. The appearance of anger presents a major temptation which the devil uses to lure us, knowing that anger darkens the mind and equips the tongue and hands with a violence which gravely wounds...

In chapter thirty-four of Genesis, there is a reason for the anger of Jacob's sons. The son of the prince of the country of Shalem dishonored Dinah, the daughter of Jacob and Leah. This deed provoked anger in

Jacob's sons who decided to avenge their sister, even though that youth asked Dinah to marry him.

The place where Jacob had settled, not far from Shalem, was very convenient for this family to live for many reasons. But his sons were roused to anger and the desire for revenge. When the youth from Shalem asked for the hand of Dinah, his brothers answered deceitfully—that it would be shameful for their sister to marry one who is uncircumcised. And they asked that all the males of the town be circumcised, and they accepted. After two days, when all the men were still in pain, Jacob's sons entered the city at night with their servants and slew the fiancé, his father and all the men with the sword. Then they robbed the city of all its wealth and took the women and children captive. Thus, under the impulse of anger, they used the token of Abraham's sacred covenant with God (circumcision) as a means of deception through which they carried out their revenge, disregarding the holy for their personal gratification. When Jacob found out, he said to his sons, Ye have troubled me to make me to stink among the inhabitants of the land, among the Canaanites and the Perizzites (Genesis 34:30).

And Jacob had to depart from that place with all who were with him and all his wealth, where he had desired to stay, because of the uncontrolled anger of his sons. Behind him he left a spoiled city and murdered men, and he was followed by the hate and anger of the inhabitants of that region.

This intervention of the devil in arousing the anger of the sons of Jacob and, as a result, the inhabitants of the region, was unto the fulfillment of the journey toward the Promised Land. The meaning of this story is like all that happens as part of God's will, through which He communicates something to us or drives us toward something which we must fulfill, but this does not mean that the sin of anger remains unpunished.

The Christian, however, must not get angry. He knows that God watches over him and that not a hair of his head falls without the Lord's knowledge. In relation to his neighbors, he must moderate his anger, because the Savior was not angered against those who mocked and crucified Him. Will we get angry with our neighbor, knowing that he is created in the image of God? Indeed, how can we utter words of anger

against him if he did something to us, knowing well that we have done the same thing to him or to another, and even worse?

Man today lives under such overwhelming pressure that his nerves are strained to the limit and even the slightest provocation arouses in him the sin of anger. Causes for anger could be the child who does not listen to us, or the husband or wife who contradicts us, or the driver who cuts us off with his car, or only seems to us to cut us off, giving a motive for us to be roused to anger. Even if, through self-restraint, our anger is not outwardly expressed or is not heard by the one who provoked it, it is still a sin, because it harms our soul and our heart. It is an action against ourself, under the temptation of the devil to anger. (to be continued)

Assembly Faces Temporary Withdrawal of Participation by Hierarchs of Patriarchate of Antioch

NEW YORK - Archbishop Demetrios of America, Chairman of the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of North and Central America, has issued the following statement in response to the temporary withdrawal of the Hierarchs of the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Archdiocese of North America from their participation in the Assembly of Canonical Orthodox Bishops of North and Central America. The Synod of the Patriarchate of Antioch, in October 2013, decided to temporarily withdraw from all Assemblies of Canonical Orthodox Bishops around the world because of a jurisdictional issue in the Middle East.

The statement of Archbishop Demetrios is as follows:

"We are deeply grieved that this temporary withdrawal has occurred, and we pray for a swift resolution. We hope that the Antiochian faithful who are participating in the many good works under the aegis of the Assembly the philanthropic activities of IOCC, the prison ministries of OCPM, the college work of OCF, the missionary efforts of OCMC and the work of other Assembly Agencies—will be encouraged to stay involved. While it is true that from time to time throughout the Church's history jurisdictional issues have caused unintended consequences, we pray that the particulars of this matter, which have nothing to do with the situation here in North and Central America or in other global regions with Assemblies of Bishops, will quickly be resolved. Until such time, the Assembly, as established by a unanimous consent of all the Autocephalous Churches, will continue to serve the faithful and its mission to foster the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace (Ephesians 4:3), and we continue to pray that the Holy Spirit, the Comforter, will guide the work of the Assembly and inspire unfeigned brotherly love among all Orthodox Christians."

As this action has precipitated the temporary absence of the Secretary, the Chairman of the Assembly has named an interim Secretary, the Very Rev. Archimandrite Nathanael Symeonides, to ensure that the work of the Assembly continues uninterrupted.

Bishop Daniel Announces Pilgrimage to the Holy Land and Constantinople

Jerusalem, the Holy City! Since the earliest days of Christianity, pilgrims have made their way to this place. In 2014, we will follow in the ancient and venerated footsteps of these faithful Christians.

With the blessing of His Eminence Metropolitan Antony, the Prime Hierarch of the UOC of the USA, His Grace Bishop Daniel of the Western Eparchy of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA will lead Sacred Pilgrimage to the Holy Land and Constantinople on November 10-22, 2014, the Consistory office announced today. The 13-day visit to the most significant sites of the New Testament is being coordinated by Bishop Daniel and clergy of the UOC of the USA.

"This pilgrimage, second in turn and hopefully another of many to the Holy Land for our Metropolia, will send down the blessing of God, not only on all of those participating, but on our entire Ukrainian Orthodox Church. The Council of Bishops of the Church has given a blessing and encourages all of our clergy and parishes to promote such pilgrimages, both to Holy Land and other holy sites, which facilitate our coming closer to God. By traveling to the Holy Land this time around, we will literally walk in the steps of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ. I sincerely pray that the Almighty One will bless us traveling, keep us safe and bring us all closer to Him during the time of the year that in the United States of America we offer gratitude to God for the blessing received," said His Grace Bishop Daniel.

During the course of the pilgrimage, the group from the Metropolia will have the opportunity to visit and pray at the Tomb of Lazarus, Cana, Mt. Tabor - the site of the Lord's Transfiguration, the River Jordan, the Mount of Olives, the Upper Room and Gethsemane, as well as the sites of the Lord's suffering on Holy Thursday and Good Friday. The pilgrimage will culminate with the group's participation in the Divine services and Hierarchical Divine Liturgy at the Church of the Holy Sepulcher.

"The sacred sites in the Holy Land are the place where the Bible comes to life for Christians," explained the bishop.

In addition, Bishop Daniel and the pilgrims, will be received by His Holiness Patriarch Theophilus III of Jerusalem. While in Constantinople the pilgrims of the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the USA in addition to various

historic sites, will visit the Hagia Sophia – St. Sophia (Holy Wisdom)
Cathedral and the Patriarchate of Constantinople, concluding with a private audience with his All-Holiness Ecumenical Patriarch Bartholomew I.

"As we travel together, we will worship and learn. We will visit sites where Christ the Savior walked, where He taught and prayed. We will discover the images that He used to illustrate His parables. We will come closer to understanding Him as we gain understanding of world in which He conducted His ministry..." said the bishop.


