The Tragedy of Our Uniate Brothers

by Hieromonk [now Bishop] Auxentios (The contrived schism) among Orthodox came about (about four centuries ago) through the so-called Unia, in which Eastern Orthodox Christians were joined with Rome, a good deal of the time—in fact, more times than we wish to admit, in this ecumenically blinded and historically uncareful age—by force and political compromise, not by "treaty" and with free will. These poor brothers find themselves today neither wholly Orthodox nor fully Roman, having no real recognition by the Orthodox and being separated from Rome by their Liturgical customs, which, to varying degrees, despite the erosion of such under the effects of Latinization (and in some practices, these poor people have succumbed to total abandonment of Orthodox customs), they preserve from their Orthodox past. These Uniates are organized under various exarchates (as they would be properly termed in Orthodoxy), with their surviving Byzantine organizational structures variously tolerated according to the whim of their largely Latin Bishops. Some of these Uniates have been nothing short of "Jesuitical" betrayers of the East, deceptively taking simple Orthodox Faithful away from their past. But great numbers of them are suffering, sincere people who are the victims of a terrible history and who would wish to find some place in which their hearts and consciences might be restored. To this number of the Uniates (or Greek [Byzantine] Catholics, as they sometimes

call themselves), something must be said about the effects of the contemporary irresponsibility among Orthodox Prelates who are playing with souls by embracing un-Orthodox standards.

What about non-Orthodox Christians?

Saint Silouan the Athonite was once traveling by train with an archimandrite who was a zealot quick to correct others about the True Faith. Coming upon a group of traveling Roman Catholics, Saint Silouan's traveling companion proceeded to tell them that they must become Orthodox because their faith was without grace.

The saint asked him if it were indeed a fact that the Roman Catholics believed that Christ was true God, and that He was present in the Eucharist. The saint asked was it not true that these Catholics believed in the Trinity, and venerated the Holy Virgin and the relics of the saints. The archimandrite answered yes to all the questions. Saint Silouan responded that of all humanity's faiths we must know that we have perhaps more, but not to judge those who are not Orthodox. We must rejoice in the knowledge of what they do have. The saint told him that we should not be filled with such pride as to think we have the right to judge, correct or teach others.

This does not mean that we see the Church as divided, or that the Orthodox Church is anything less than the Church Christ founded. What it does mean is that we do not allow ourselves to think we have the right to correct or teach anyone. We must honor other peoples beliefs and not give in to the prideful stand that we have the right to teach or correct them. The truth that is found within Orthodoxy must be shared by living our faith in love, not in judging or correcting others. Truth, where ever it is found, is Orthodox Truth. If other religions embrace some of these truths that are Orthodox, we must rejoice and give thanks for what they do have.

People who love God and are trying to live holy lives pleasing to Him, according to the knowledge they have been given, are to be respected. They may not have the fullness of Apostolic Truth, but if they are believers in God and are trying to live a life pleasing to God, we must give thanks to Christ for what they do have. They have God as their Father, just as do we. They can have the Church as their Mother only if they see in us difference that Orthodoxy has made in our lives. Being arrogant in our evangelism does nothing to express the truth of Orthodoxy and makes us nothing more than a pushy salesman at the door.

That arrogant archimandrite would better have shared the beauty of Orthodoxy had he embraced those Roman Catholics as fellow disciples of Christ. Then they would have seen Christ in him and known that Orthodoxy was a faith centered in love.

Pre-Lenten and Lenten Fasting: A Tool for Spiritual Growth

Shamelessly stolen from the bulletin of Holy Trinity G.O. Church! With the start of Lent, the "Season of Repentance" and a time for prayer, fasting and almsgiving, please take note that according to the holy canons of the Church, today is the last day of consuming meat and meat products. These week is Cheesefare week, the last week of consuming fish and dairy products before Lent. On Pure Monday (February 23 this year), we enter into the strict fast (no meat, dairy, fish, etc.). It is important to remember that fasting is a tool and a discipline for spiritual growth provided by the Church, not the goal of the Lenten season and that those under special dietary or health conditions must take care to observe those special needs. It is also important to remember, however, that fasting is not the ends, but a means, given to us all as part of our spiritual toolkit in preparation for the celebration of the Resurrection here and for eternal life in the Resurrected Christ! (A special note to our seniors: any kind of fasting must take into consideration medications and doctor's instructions so your fasting does not create medical issues - it is intended to bless, not make us weak or sick. *Please see Fr. Bob with any questions.*)
