The Universal Exaltation of The Precious and Life-Giving Cross

Exalted today, the Cross sanctifies the ends of the earth, and the Church is renewed in the Resurrection. (Hymn of Vespers)

To the Most Reverend Hierarchs, the Reverend Priests and Deacons, the Monks and Nuns, the Presidents and Members of the Parish Councils of the Greek Orthodox Communities, the Distinguished Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the Day, Afternoon, and Church Schools, the Philoptochos Sisterhoods, the Youth, the Hellenic Organizations, and the entire Greek Orthodox Family in America Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Feast of the Universal Exaltation of the Precious and Life-Giving Cross is a blessed day and celebration of the tremendous power of the Cross of our Lord. Through the Cross the power and wisdom of God have been revealed. By the Cross we are reconciled to Him, and we can find true and enduring peace. It is the Cross that directs us to Christ and to the way of salvation and eternal life.

As the Apostle Paul recognized in his first Epistle to the Corinthians some see this as foolishness or contrary to the wisdom of the age (I Corinthians 1:17-23). How can wisdom be found in great humility, suffering, and sacrifice? Where is peace and reconciliation through an instrument of torture and punishment? How can this cruel means of death show us the way to life?

First, our Exaltation of the Cross affirms that God has revealed His great might and wisdom through what is low and despised in the world (1:28) and what is foolish and weak (1:27). He did this so that no human being might boast in the presence of God (1:29). He chose a means for our redemption that did not conform to worldly standards of wisdom and power, showing that our source of life, our wisdom, our righteousness and sanctification (1:30) are found in Jesus Christ alone.

Second, as we exalt the Precious and Life-Giving Cross, we commemorate the tremendous offering of our Lord. We acknowledge that He alone was able to reconcile us to God by His death, ending our estrangement due to the power of evil. By *making peace through the blood of His Cross* and through our faith in Him, we can be presented before God as holy, blameless, and irreproachable. (Colossians 1:19-23)

Finally, we proclaim the power of the Cross on this Feast, for through it Christ has shown us the way to life. Through the Cross and His humility

and obedience unto death, He has been exalted so that *every tongue should* confess that He is Lord (Philippians 2:11). By *emptying himself, taking the* form of a servant, and being born in the likeness of humankind (Philippians 2:7), Jesus has received a name above every name. Christ has shown that through the His Cross He is leading us to overcoming sin and evil and death and to reach eternal life.

As we celebrate the Cross and its transforming power for our lives and for all the created order, we also offer our support for our beloved Holy Cross School of Theology. In the life of our Schole, this feast always marks the beginning of a new academic year. It also is the beginning and continuation of the journey of our students who are preparing for service to God and His Church. During this time at Holy Cross they are strengthened and nurtured for a lifetime of ministry, and through the Cross they will be connected to the wisdom of God, will guide others to reconciliation and peace, and will show the way to salvation and eternal life through Christ. May we offer our prayers and gifts of support for our seminarians and our beloved Holy Cross.

Through our worship and celebration let us call all people to come to the Cross of our Lord so that they might know His grace and compassion. Certainly, the power of the Cross will change their lives forever!

Miraculous Icons of the Mother of God

Believers coming to the St. George Serbian Orthodox Church in Carmichaels, Pennsylvania on October 6, 2011 were blessed to venerate the Hawaiian Myrrh-Streaming Iveron Icon of the Mother of God.

Miraculous icons of the Mother of God appear in the Holy Orthodox Church. They exist in different parts of the world. Some are myhrrstreaming, some are weeping, and others are miraculous because of prayers before them.

Miracles are attributed to these icons. The myhrr-streaming and weeping icons are miracles in themselves. Individuals tell of healings or being different after having venerated the icons or being anointed.

Akathists have been written to icons of the Mother of God describing healings or the occurrence of other miracles. Miraculous icons strongly affect the mind and confirm belief among the faithful.

Believers are willing to travel long distances to venerate myhrr-flowing and weeping icons. Miraculous icons stir hopes among believers suffering from particular illnesses.

The fragrancy emanating from these icons is often distinct and identifiable. The soul hungers for healing. Miraculous icons address the hunger of the soul. Thanks to God for the presence of miraculous icons.

Thanks to the Mother of God for miraculous icons bearing her image.. When an icon of the Mother of God streams or tears begin to flow, wonderment takes place. The meaning is not always clear. The impact is profound and far-reaching.

Believers become different after personally experiencing a weeping or myhrr-flowing icon. The memory is imprinted and lasting. Believers sharing the experience verify with each other the impact that has taken place.

Parish churches are often eager to welcome a visit from a myhrrstreaming or weeping icon. Parishes are enriched by the hosting experience. The faith of parish believers is strengthened when a miraculous icon visits.

The mysteries of God are beyond full human comprehension. Believers experience God at work on a daily basis. Miraculous icons are an example of God at work in daily life. Miraculous icons lift the heart and mind to new levels.

Love for God and the Mother of God increases when miraculous icons make a difference in personal life. Testimonies of believers whose lives have changed by miraculous icons are convincing.

Miraculous icons are a source of joy. Healings and miraculous outcomes due to prayers to certain icons of the Mother of God change the course of personal lives. Skepticism is not sufficiently powerful to have believers think otherwise.

PASTORAL PATIENCE

The good pastor does not demand conformity before healing has taken place
It deeply troubles me when I encounter clergy who want to push their parishioners into total conformity and compliance with the teachings of the Orthodox Church, without first helping them seek the healing that takes place within the Hospital of the Soul. My spiritual father, Archimandrite Dimitry of blessed memory, counseled against storming at people, before using the tools found within the Church, to bring about the transformation of the soul, and the healing of the nous. Demanding conformity in regards abortion, same sex marriage, homosexuality, and a host of other issues that separate our modern society from the Gospel teachings of the Church, drives people away from the very place that can bring about the transformation we all so desperately need. The pastor must first help those who have come into the Church to enter into an encounter with the Living God, and allow Christ to empower them for change, both morally and spiritually.

Just as a child needs the patience of a good parent to grow into adulthood, so too is there the need for pastors to patiently guide the seeker into an encounter with the Living God, and bring about the purification of the nous (the eye of the soul). Pressuring parishioners into conformity does nothing to help the person mature in the faith, for only the Holy Spirit can transform the heart, and bring the believer into conformity with the Gospel teachings. Everyone needs the Church's transformational power to make them holy. Demanding holiness before healing has taken place, only serves to drive the seeker from the hospital before they can be made whole.

We need to revisit our conceptions of time to consciously enter a deeper relationship with Christ, Who as God is the Existent above and beyond all time, and yet in His Incarnation was also within time. It is, however, more than this, because the Liturgical Cycle of the Church also begins each year on this day, September 1st. We are at the beginning now of the New Year of blessings from God as He consciously renews time for our repentance. He not only renews it, but encompasses it and encloses it with a crown of goodness of life and love. He will bless us as we move through time if we will only turn to Him consciously, lovingly, and thankfully with humble hearts and gladsome minds. May the Lord of Life and Time bless us this coming New Year.
