There is a story of St. Herman of Alaska that some Russian sailors were in Kodiak or Spruce Island where he lived, and he was not a priest, but he had a chapel. He was praying all the time, and he invited the sailors to come, to go into the chapel and pray with him. One of the sailors said, "Oh Abba, monk, father, we can't go, we're sinners." And St. Herman said to the sailor, "That's good. That's a qualification. You can't come to church unless you're a sinner. Unless you're a sinner, you can't come. The church is not for saints, for righteous people. There aren't any, except those who are saved because of faith, because of grace and any person who is holy and righteous because of faith and grace would never consider himself a saint, but would confess himself as a sinner." So St. Herman told the sailor, "Being a sinner is what qualifies you to be a member of the Church. You can't be a member of the Church if you are not a sinner."

The Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God Luke 10:38-42, 11:27-28

The Feast of the Dormition of the Mother is a reminder of earthly death and the unique and honored life of the Mother of God. The singularly chosen Mary's life and death deserve thorough consideration.

The Feast of the Dormition follows the Church's two week period of fasting with certain prescribed liturgical prayers. Jesus's words in the current Gospel of St. Matthew emphasize the value of prayer and fasting.

Each person faces earthly death. Each person benefits from learning of the model life of Mary the Mother of God. The Gospel for the Feast of the Dormition concludes with the value of hearing the word of God and keeping it. Each person decides whether to listen to the word of God and to keep it. Each person determines whether he or she will live a life of purity and obedience as did Mary the Mother of God.

The Feast of the Dormition inspires careful self-examination and honesty. Each believer is challenged to search his or her heart. Each person benefits by assessing if a life of purity and obedience to God are honored.

Mary the Mother of God inspires a life of sanity and purity. She is a standard of love for God and obedience to God. Mary is an example of the greatest possibility of unity with God.

Each person answers the question whether Christ is held singularly and primarily within the heart, mind and soul. Each person's life will reveal if full obedience to the word of God is the singular guide for daily living.

The Church celebrates the Feast of Dormition each year. The Church values the Feast of the Dormition and prescribes the annual period of fasting. Each person decides whether to be an informed and obedient Christian.

Each person makes decisions daily whether to learn about Christ, His Mother and the Christian way of life. Being an Orthodox Christian is a completely voluntary decision.

Mary the Mother of God's relationship with Christ is like no other person's. She experienced unity with Christ more than any other person. She revealed the possibility of life in Christ for the obedient and attentive.

Living the Christian life fully entails being immersed in the Church's experience each day. Adherence to the daily Church calendar of liturgical life, fasts and feasts brings a person closer to God.

The Church serves as the premier guide and instructor for the individual person. The individual Christian benefits from the learning opportunities possible in the Church. The Church offers the greatest Christian education.

Within God's Holy Church one hears and learns of the ways to live, how best to face daily challenges and the greatest possibilities for life. Within God's Holy Church one learns of eternal life and the path to take.

The Feast of the Dormition of the Mother of God is a reminder that each person's earthly life will ultimately come to an end. God's love was manifested throughout Mary's life and continues to be evident after her earthly death.

God's love and joy are present for each person choosing to love the ways of God and to be obedient to His teachings. God's love and joy are unending for those persons choosing the good part as did the Mary sitting at Jesus' feet and listening.

This icon of St. John the Baptist is an English or North American Icon painted in a style that arose in the 15th and 16th centuries in Greekspeaking countries. It is also found in some Balkan countries too (Bulgarian, Serbian, Macedonian), though this is probably due to the influence of the old Byzantine Empire upon these areas. St. John the Baptist is given wings to symbolize nothing more or less than John's status as a divine messenger.

The axe laying at the foot of a tree is an obvious reference to John's own prophetic warning recorded in Scripture: And even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees. Therefore every tree which does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire.

Over St. John's camel-skin clothing is invariably a green robe, which symbolizes "earthliness", and in this case it is because John grew up outside, in the wilderness. Later saints who also took up the Christian struggle in the wilderness can also be depicted in green for the same reason, and are sometimes known as "Green Martyrs". That is to say they are martyrs (literally meaning witness) to the Faith, not by the shedding of blood, but by their ascetic struggle. Of course, St John is a both a green martyr and a martyr who shed his blood, hence the presence of the green robe and the cross. (Iconreader)
