Today is the second day of the Feast of the Nativity of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Rejoicing continues over the birth of the Christ Child. The present Gospel directs attention to Herod's evil desire to destroy Him.

As the current celebration of Christ's birth occurs in the God's Holy Church, many children in today's world still suffer from evil. Christ offers direction and wisdom in addressing harm to today's children.

"Let us depart/go forth in peace! (Ἐν εἰρἡνῃ пροἑλθωμεν. С миром изыдем.)" (Priest's exclamation, end of Divine Liturgy) Yesterday I reflected on accompanying all our "entrances and exits" with prayer. Today I'm thinking about our "exits" in particular, including the one to which the above-quoted exclamation refers, the one at the end of Divine Liturgy. I am called to exit (the church-building) "in peace." And that means, "in peace" both with myself and the church-community with which I just had communion, and with the rest of my relations, relationships and responsibilities, to which I now "go forth."

Today let be mindful of all my daily little "exits," – like the moment I leave the house to go to work, or when I get up from the table after a meal, or when I leave the office to go home, or when I prepare for bed to leave this day. All these "little" exits can prepare me for the "big" one, my departure from this world, as I learn to accomplish them "in peace" with God, myself and others. And this means prayerful acceptance, forgiveness, and gratitude for people and things as they are. Let me embrace His "*peace from above*" today, also as I prepare to exit the Old Year and embrace the New one. "*Let us depart/go forth in peace!*"
