#### On Commemorative Prosphora

Prosphoron is a Greek word which translates to an 'offering.' Prosphora (plural) can be eucharistic – that which is used for the performance of the

Liturgy, or commemorative – that which is brought to the Altar by the faithful "for health" or "for departed" loved ones.

Commemorative prosphora is only practiced in the Russian tradition. Usually, they are purchased at the candle stand and are brought to the Altar along with the names for Commemoration. During the Proskomedia, in the Altar, the priest removes a small piece from each prosphoron (singular) and places it on the Diskos. The removed piece represents the person (or persons) for whom the sacrifice of our Lord Jesus Christ is brought. The piece will be placed next to the Lamb – the bread which becomes the Body of Christ during the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and from which the faithful will receive Communion.

Then, after Communion, the pieces from the Commemorative Prosphora are put by the priest into the Chalice with the Blood of Christ, reciting the prayer, "Wash away, O Lord, the sins of all those remembered here, by Thy precious Blood, and through the prayers of all the saints." So, the sacrificial Blood of Christ cleanses the sins of those for whom the Commemorative Prosphora were offered and whose names were written on the lists for Commemoration. This is the most powerful prayer because it is not merely the prayer of one person, but of the whole Church, "the Church of God, which He hath purchased with His own Blood" (Acts 20:28). For this reason, only the names of baptized Orthodox Christians may be brought to the Altar during the Proskomedia; that is, members of the Orthodox Church. After the Liturgy, the Commemorative Prosphora are returned to the candle stand, from where the faithful may take them home. These prosphora are consecrated bread. During the week, at home after Morning Prayers, one may eat a piece of prosphoron and drink some Holy Water with the following prayer:

O Lord my God, may Thy holy gift and Thy holy water be for the enlightening of my mind, the strengthening of my soul and body, the conquering of my passions and weaknesses, by your boundless mercy, through the prayers of Thy Holy Mother and all Thy saints. Amen. Eat the prosphoron in the mornings on an empty stomach. Consecrated things must be treated reverently. When you return from church, divide the prosphoron into six parts (i.e. the number of days until the next Liturgy) and keep them with the Holy Water in your icon corner. If the prosphoron dries out, you can still consume it by softening it in Holy Water. However, if you store it in a plastic bag, then it could spoil and become moldy. Therefore, it's better to store it in a paper napkin. If it does happen that the prosphoron spoils, do not throw it away in the trash! Instead, you can burn

it or throw it into a river, or bring it to church to be burned. [Give it to the Priest.]

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Please remember and teach our children to handle holy things with reverence!
