By God's mercy Archbishop of Constantinople-New Rome and Ecumenical Patriarch To the Plenitude of the Church May the Grace and Peace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ be with you together with our Prayer, Blessing and Forgiveness

With the grace of God, the giver of all gifts, we have once again arrived at Holy and Great Lent, the arena of ascetical struggle, in order to purify ourselves with the Lord's assistance through prayer, fasting and humility, as well as to prepare ourselves for a spiritual experience of the venerable Passion and the celebration of the splendid Resurrection of Christ the Savior.

In a world of manifold confusion, the ascetic experience of Orthodoxy constitutes an invaluable spiritual asset, an inexhaustible source of divine knowledge and human wisdom. The blessed phenomenon of ascesis, whose spirit pervades our entire way of life-for "asceticism is Christianity in its entirety"-is not the privilege of the few or chosen, but an "ecclesial event," a communal good, a shared blessing and the common vocation for all faithful without exception. The ascetical struggles, of course, are not an end in themselves; the principle that "ascesis exists for the sake of ascesis" is not valid. The purpose of ascesis is the transcendence of one's own will and the "mind of the flesh," the transferal of the center of life from individual desire and the "right," toward love that "does not seek its own," in accordance with the scriptural passage: "Let no one seek his own good, but the good of the other." (1 Cor. 10.24)

Such is the spirit that prevails throughout the long historical journey of Orthodoxy. In the *New Miterikon*, we encounter an excellent description of this ethos to renounce "our own" in the name of love: "Some hermits from Scetis once approached Amma Sarah, who offered them a container with basic provisions. The elders set aside the good food and consumed the bad. The righteous Sarah said to them: 'You are truly monks from Scetis'"^[1] This sensitivity and sacrificial use of freedom is foreign to the spirit of our age, which identifies freedom with individual assertions and claims for rights. Contemporary "autonomous" man would never have consumed the bad food, but only the good, convinced that in this way he expresses–while authentically and responsibly employing–individual freedom.

This is where the supreme value of the Orthodox concept of human freedom lies. It is a freedom that does not demand but shares, does not insist but sacrifices. The Orthodox believer knows that autonomy and selfsufficiency do not liberate humanity from the shackles of the ego, of selfrealization and self-justification. The freedom "for which Christ has set us free" (Gal. 5.1) mobilizes our creative capacity and is fulfilled as rejection of self-enclosure, as unconditional love and communion of life.

The Orthodox ascetical ethos does not know division and dualism; it does not reject life, but rather transforms it. The dualistic vision and denial of the world is not a Christian concept. Genuine asceticism is luminous and charitable. It is a characteristic of Orthodox self-conscience that the period of fasting is permeated by the joy of the Cross and the Resurrection. Moreover, the ascetic struggle of Orthodox Christians-much like our spirituality and liturgical life in general-communicates the fragrance and radiance of the Resurrection. The Cross is found at the heart of Orthodox piety, but it is not the final point of reference in the life of the Church. Instead, the essence of Orthodox spiritual life is the ineffable joy of the Resurrection, toward which the Cross constitutes the way. Accordingly, during the period of Great Lent, the quintessence of experience for Orthodox Christians is always the yearning for the "common resurrection."

Pray, then, precious brothers and sisters in the Lord, that we may be deemed worthy, with the grace and support from above, through the intercessions of the Theotokos, as first among the saints, and of all the saints, that we may run the race of Holy and Great Lent in a way that is fitting and joyous before Christ, joyfully exercising, in obedience to the rule of church tradition, the "common struggle" of fasting that extinguishes the passions, constantly praying, helping the suffering and needful, forgiving one another and "giving thanks for all things" (Thess. 5.18), in order that we might venerate with a devout heart the "Holy, Saving and Awesome Passion" as well as the life-giving Resurrection of our Lord, God and Savior Jesus Christ, to whom belong glory, power and thanksgiving to the endless ages. Amen.

SUNDAY OF THE LAST JUDGMENT



Glory to Jesus Christ! Glory forever!

This morning we continue with the Sundays of preparation for our beginning of the journey we all make during Great Lent. We began two Sundays ago with the time of preparation for the Great Fast with being reminded of the importance of humility for our journey as we heard the parable of the Publican and Pharisee. Then last Sunday with the parable of the Prodigal Son, we were reminded of how the Love of God is central to our making this journey. Now we come to the Sunday of the Last Judgment as we are now reminded the reason for this journey we soon will embark upon: that with humility and aware of the Love of God for us, we begin this journey of cleansing of soul and body not only to properly celebrate the coming Feast of Feasts but to prepare ourselves for the coming day of the Last Judgment. We prepare ourselves in this way so that on that terrible and awesome Day when our Lord Jesus Christ returns to judge the living and the dead, we may be found worthy to stand on the right hand with those who lived their lives responding to the Love of God by extending that Love to our fellow man.

Today in the hymns of this day and the readings we hear much about the fearsome nature of the Last Judgment and many look to this Day with fear and trembling. This is a necessary component of understanding what will transpire when our Lord Jesus Christ returns to judge the living and the dead the scrolls are opened and each person is judged before the Throne of Almighty God. It is necessary for us to understand and accept the finality which comes with the judgment that is passed as each person receives not only judgment on this day but their eternal reward on this Day. But there is something more that our commemoration of this Sunday of the Last Judgment brings to our minds this day.

Today in the Gospel Reading from Saint Matthew 25:31-46 we are all granted a glimpse into what will transpire at the Last Judgment when all mankind will stand before the Judgment Seat to give an account for how one lived their life. We hear very clearly in the Gospel this morning that it is how a person made the connection between the Love of God for all mankind and our care and love for our fellow man. We are reminded this day that it is not only belief in the Love of God for His creation that marks those that our Lord calls "the blessed of My Father" but it is those who have applied that faith in daily life in extending God's Love to those around us who are in need. We are reminded today that we must not only believe in God but we must put that faith into practice in sharing with and ministering to those who are in need around us. This is what makes the difference between those on the right hand and those on the left hand: for it is how we have responded to our faith in God and how we have put our faith into practice that we are judged. Have we extended the Love that God has for us in provided grace and salvation to others or have we – like the man given one talent who hid it in the ground from another of our Lord's parables- kept it hidden and in so doing not shared our faith in living that faith through daily practice.

In the words of our Lord in today's Gospel as He outlines how each person is judged we are reminded that those who are judged righteous and worthy to inherit the kingdom, are those who have not only believed but have lived as true disciples of Christ. The righteous are not only those who have given lip service to believing but rather have not only believed but have practiced that belief in extending the mercy and love of God to their fellow man. This is what it means to be a disciple of our Lord and this is what we all are called to do in our lives if we wish to be judged to be among the righteous.

This morning as we reflect on the awesome and fearsome coming Day of the Last Judgment, we are afforded yet another opportunity to examine our lives and to ask ourselves this basic question: Have we lived our lives by practicing our faith in extending the love and mercy of God to those around us in need? Or have we squandered those opportunities in our daily lives to practice our faith because we were too busy to help those in need? As we reflect upon our lives in light of the coming Day of the Last Judgment, let us all ask God for His Mercy and Grace so that He may give us the strength and the willingness to practice our faith in sharing that faith with others by ministering to them and meeting their needs. In this way we truly are able to show that we have understood the true meaning of our faith in Jesus Christ- allowing our faith to shape and define how we live our lives each day and led us to meet the needs of those around us- those for whom our Lord suffered, died, was buried, and rose from the dead. Amen! *Father Paisius McGrath* Our daily relationships determine the outcome of our lives. The goals we choose and the interests we pursue affect our relationships with each other. When Jesus Christ is central to our life, Christ governs our personal relationships.

When Christ is central to our life, we see Christ in the sick, the hungry, the stranger and the imprisoned. When Christ is central to our life, we look beyond the exterior of the person and see Christ in each person.

Each person lives and has life by the grace of God. Christian love has first place in the way we are to treat each person we meet. Christian love breaks down barriers in relationships.

Christian love warms the coldest of hearts. Christian love sets an example.

At Holy Baptism, each person "puts on Christ." Persons baptized into Christ are to live each day exhibiting the fullness of Christian love.

The sick, suffering, stranger and imprisoned benefit from Christ's love. Christ's love and identification with the sick, suffering, stranger and imprisoned are very clear in the present Gospel.

When the present Gospel is taken to heart, personal relationships change for the believer. The believer heeding this Gospel is very careful in daily relationships.

The serious believer wants always to adhere to Christ's teachings.

Personal relationships with the sick, suffering, the stranger and the imprisoned require careful thought. The great and final judgment for each person rests with the Lord Jesus Christ.

For believers adhering to the present Gospel, Christ is to be seen in each person. Believers benefit from constant self-examination. Prejudices and judging of others has no place in the Christian life.

Great Lent places great emphasis on repentance and increased conformity to the life in Christ. Joy increases in personal relationships when Christ is experienced in each person met in daily life.

Adherers to Christ's teachings are called to enter the kingdom prepared from the foundation of the world. Eternal punishment awaits individuals failing to see Christ in each person met in daily life.

Christ's constant love alleviates the misery of the sick, suffering, stranger and imprisoned. Christ's love heals hearts that are broken, makes the stranger feel welcomed and softens the hardest of prisoners.

Christ's love shines on the sick and radiates the soul in the body ravaged by terrible disease. Christ's love clothes the naked with garments that protect from the cold and the cold-hearted. Christ's love heals all. Christ's love applies to all. Christ's love is present to be discovered by each person seriously interested. Christ's love was made clear on the Cross.

Christ's love shines forth around the world and through the centuries from the Empty Tomb. With Great Lent immediately before us, may we resolutely love Christ as He has loved us.

May our love of Christ be clearly the basis for our daily relationships with the sick, suffering, stranger and the imprisoned. May we see Christ in every person. How to act toward those who offend us?

Some say, "I am ready to forgive that person, but only if he comes to me himself and asks for forgiveness." This is absolutely unchristian. No matter what we might encounter—insults, slander, or some kind of physical attack—we have an answer. And this answer was given to us by the Lord. He said, "If you are my disciples, do as I do. And the Lord ascends the cross and forgives His crucifiers. That is what Christ's disciples do. *Metropolit*
