Archbishop's Encyclical for the Feast of the Annunciation AND THE DAY OF GREEK INDEPENDENCE (2019)

Feast of the Annunciation & Day of Greek Independence

To the Most Reverend Hierarchs, the Reverend Priests and Deacons, the Monks and Nuns, the Presidents and Members of the Parish Councils of the Greek Orthodox Communities, the Distinguished Archons of the Ecumenical Patriarchate, the Day, Afternoon, and Church Schools, the Philoptochos Sisterhoods, the Youth, the Hellenic Organizations, and the entire Greek Orthodox Family in America

Beloved Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Today is "the revelation of the mystery planned from eternity." (Apolytikion of the Feast) It is the Feast of the Annunciation, and we celebrate God's revelation of His grace to the Virgin Mary. It is a new day as the Archangel Gabriel announced the Incarnation of Christ, saying to the Theotokos, you will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus. (Luke 1:31) Today we commemorate a sacred event, when the love and will of God was made known to humankind.

This day and this holy Feast is a day of joy. We sing the exclamation of the Virgin Mary, *My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior*! (Luke 1:46-47). We offer thanksgiving and praise to God for His marvelous works and His glorious revelation. Through the message of the Gospel, we affirm that joy greeted the Incarnation of our Lord; joy filled the hearts of the multitudes who received Him in faith and those who found hope; and joy compelled many to go forth to the ends of the world and proclaim the blessed and eternal life that comes through Christ and the Gospel.

With joy in our hearts we sing that this day is the "crown of our salvation." This is the day when the path of reconciliation and union with God was made known. Through the Incarnation He showed His abundant love so that our communion with Him could be restored. It is the day that led to the Cross and the Resurrection, showing that the power of death was defeated and that eternal life is bestowed on those who come to Christ in faith.

Today is a day of liberty. The grace of God has been revealed. Christ is incarnate so that as He said, He has come to preach the good news to the poor, to heal those of a broken heart and to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to set at liberty those who are oppressed. (Luke 4:18) With the announcement of the angel to the Virgin Mary, the promises of God are fulfilled and our hope is renewed. Through the truth of His revelation we are set free from our burdens to be redeemed into the glorious life and light of His love.

It is this day and the joy and hope of the Feast of the Annunciation that inspired our forbearers to begin their struggle for liberty. After centuries of oppression, the people of Greece could no longer bear the yoke of captivity and the burdens of occupation. In 1821 they found strength in unity, hope in faith, and determination in their goal to be free. They knew that the reestablishment of the Greek nation was the only course toward securing freedom for generations to come. Today we remember their bravery and sacrifice in solemnity and gratitude, affirming that we are the blessed heirs of the independence gained through their struggles.

The celebration of the Annunciation of the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary and of the Incarnation of our Lord, is a celebration of the revelation of God's love and God's gift. It is a feast of joy. It is a feast of joy and liberty, as we commemorate our Greek fathers and mothers who offered their lives in order to establish freedom for themselves and for us, their children.

Repentance

Matthew 3:8- Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance:

Language and bodily actions will reveal the contents of a person's heart. Whether a person follows the Lord Jesus Christ soon becomes obvious. Love of Christ is ultimately revealed by a person's daily relationships. Love for Christ is the constant guide for the person devoted to Christ. The Gospel lives in the heart, mind, and soul of Christ's true followers.

Matthew 3:11- I indeed baptize you with water unto repentance. but he that cometh after me is mightier than I, whose shoes I am not worthy to bear: he shall baptize you with the Holy Ghost, and with fire:

Christ changes the heart, mind and soul of the person drawing near to Him. Drawing near to Christ burns away the desire for engaging in personal sin. Jesus Christ replaces the desire for sin and enables the believer to be faithful. Christ gives His followers needed daily strength, guidance, and protection. Serious followers of Jesus Christ cling to Him for the soul's nourishment.

Matthew 4:1- From that time Jesus began to preach, and to say, Repent: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

The Gospel provides immediate and constant contact with Jesus Christ. Attentive readers and hearers of the Gospel begin to benefit immediately. The Gospel penetrates the furthest depths of the fully attentive believer. Believers seeking Jesus Christ's nourishment find it in the Holy Gospel. Jesus Christ nourishes believers throughout the world and in every century. Matthew 9:13- But go ye and learn what that meaneth, I will have mercy, and not sacrifice: for I am not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance.

A person deciding to repent will place trust, hope and faith in Jesus Christ. Desire for the life in Christ and the rejection of sin leads a person to repent. Personal misery in life awakens a person to Christ's forgiveness and love. Christ's mercy and forgiveness washes away the remnants of personal sin. Christ's healing love restores health and wholeness to the person repenting.

Matthew 11:20- Then began he to upbraid the cities wherein most of his mighty works were done, because they repented not:

Jesus Christ offers the opportunity for repentance to all throughout the year. Sin's attractions will infect countless lives and prevents their repentance. Every moment of life informed individuals decide whether to follow Christ. Christ's faithful followers will fervently seek first the Kingdom of God. Persons yielding to the temptations to personally sin put their souls in peril.

The Third Sunday of Great Lent Veneration of the Holy Cross

Mark 8:34-38, 9:1

And when he had called the people unto him with his disciples also, he said unto them, Whosoever will come after me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me. For whosoever will save his life shall lose it; but whosoever shall lose his life for my sake and the gospel's, the same shall save it. For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul? Or what shall a man give in exchange for his soul? Whosoever therefore shall be ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation; of him also shall the Son of man be

ashamed, when he cometh in the glory of his Father with the holy angels. And he said unto them, Verily I say unto you, That there be some of them that stand here, which shall not taste of death, till they have seen the kingdom of God come with power.(KJV)

Care of the soul deserves primary attention during all the days of our life. The Holy Gospel reveals the value of the soul. The Lord Jesus Christ makes clear the value of the soul is greater than gaining the whole world.

Momentary carelessness can endanger the soul. A slip of the tongue, a hasty decision or a foolish action can place the soul in jeopardy. The Lord God is a good and loving God and is aware of believers' personal sins.

Forgiveness is possible if the believer repents and turns to the Lord Jesus Christ with desire in the heart. Beginning anew in Christ is possible if a person has a willing mind.

The present Gospel emphasizes the importance of denying the self for the benefit of the life in Christ. Believers are to take up personal crosses as Christ took up His Cross,

Christians have the personal responsibility to live in ways pleasing to Christ.

The responsibility to follow Christ is accepted freely and willingly at Holy Baptism.

Every moment of every day following Baptism, the believer is expected to continue to live in conformity with the ways of Jesus Christ. The whole person enters and exits the Baptismal font.

The whole person is dedicated to Christ at Baptism. The mind, heart and soul belong to Christ. Believers will sin and have failures in following Christ. The Church encourages believers to always repent..

During Great Lent, the importance of repentance and beginning anew in Christ is greatly emphasized. The Church teaches that sin takes place in human lives and repentance is beneficial.

The Church services during Great Lent are rich in content about the goodness and mercy of God. The Church services reveal the far-reaching possibilities of repentance.

Personal growth in Christ becomes possible and is intended during Great Lent. The power and value of taking up personal crosses in life is realized when the Gospel is taken seriously.

Christ strengthens believers in dealing with personal crosses. Christ established the example and the value of taking up the Cross. Christ resurrected following death on the Cross,

Resurrection joy followed Christ's death on the Cross. Believers dying to sin in this life find new life in Christ. Saying "no" to sin firmly and permanently is possible with Christ's help.

Great Lent encourages believers to reject sinful thoughts and actions. Great Lent is a time to control personal behavior and avoid sinful environments and temptations.

Dying to sin and living in Christ brings joy. Great Lent offers daily joy as believers recommit to Christ and reject sin. As athletes endure difficult training in anticipation of competition, believers endure personal crosses to live in Christ.

Christ's love was revealed when He ascended the Cross. Christ's love endures and is all encompassing to this very moment. Hearts and minds open to Christ experience His love.

Hearts and minds open to Christ rejoice and are grateful. Every moment is the opportunity to thank Christ for ascending the Cross. Every moment is the time to remember and behold Christ's all enduring and encompassing love.

Great Lent feels arduous when undertaken with great zeal. Battling and repenting of sin has a deep effect. Serious believers welcome Great Lent for the known benefits.

Serious believers embrace Great Lent for the love of Christ. Completeness in life occurs during Great Lent and the journey to Pascha. The Good and Loving God is very apparent during Great Lent and the journey to Pascha.

Believers increase their experiences with God with each successive Great Lent and Holy Week. Understanding deepens of the personal crosses in daily life and the meaning of Christ's Cross

Growth in Christ is expected from the time of Holy Baptism until departure from this life. Growth in Christ is possible while the body lives and the mind functions well.

Rejecting sin and embracing Christ is a life-long journey. The pain of taking up personal crosses is minimized by the joy of being in Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ proved the lasting value of taking up the Cross for the joy lying ahead. (Heb.12:2)
