You should venerate not only the icon of Christ, but also the similitude of His cross. For the cross is Christ's great sign and trophy of victory over the devil and all his hostile hosts; for this reason they tremble and flee when they see the figuration of the cross.

This figure, even prior to the crucifixion, was greatly glorified by the prophets and wrought great wonders; and when He who was hung upon it, our Lord Jesus Christ, comes again to judge the living and the dead, this His great and terrible sign will precede Him, full of power and glory (cf. Matt. 24:30).

So glorify the cross now, so that you may boldly look upon it then and be glorified with it. And you should venerate icons of the saints, for the saints have been crucified with the Lord; and you should make the sign of the cross upon your person before doing so, bringing to mind their communion in the sufferings of Christ.

In the same way you should venerate their holy shrines and any relic of their bones; for God's grace is not sundered from these things, even as the divinity was not sundered from Christ's venerable body at the time of His life-quickening death.

By doing this and by glorifying those who glorified God—for through their actions they showed themselves to be perfect in their love for God you too will be glorified together with them by God, and with David you will chant: 'I have held Thy friends in high honor, O Lord' (Ps. 159:17. Fr. George L. Livanos via listserv.goarch.org Sun, Jun 9, 9:30 PM When you feel the results of spiritual reading, you'll say, "Blessed be the Name of the Lord!" (Job 1:21; Psalms 112:2) Truly, God bestows great gifts upon us! Do you know what power is hidden within the word of God? And spiritual study, spiritual books, are the word of God. It falls like a seed into our souls and bursts open sending forth its shoots.

The word of God conceals within itself the power of God, the power of Christ. And when you immerse your mind and heart in a spiritual book, you will always be filled when you come forth from your reading. And the jar will never empty, but will always give and give. Spiritual study will always open new horizons for you. It is the best set of tools you have in your home, a supply of weapons for the spiritual life.

What, then, do spiritual books give us? They give us, first of all a foundation in God. The power of the word of God conquers our sins and defeats the devil, as Saint John Chrysostom says. The word of God, spiritual study, is like an instrument that punctures the hardness of our heart. It is like a charge of dynamite which blasts our passions... It purges our heart and fills it with virtues.

And this is what it means to have a foundation in God. We lay the foundation stones for the spiritual structure of our life. We acquire love for those around us, repentance, compunction, illumination. In studying spiritual books, we feel like Christ feels; we think like Christ thinks; we hear like Christ hears; we acquire the mind of Christ and feel Him close to us. And if we're sad, if we have some problem, if we're upset, if a storm is passing through our life...[we'll] see Christ...and in the shelter of His wings, we'll continue to move forward.

Spiritual study gives us divine knowledge and desire for God. In reading such books, by the grace of God, you learn, you understand, you acquire divine knowledge. God becomes active and starts to work within you. You learn the teaching of your Faith. You learn Who God is, what He did for you, and what you should do at every moment of your life. The word of God is a sharp knife, the sword of the Spirit (Ephesians 6:17). It cuts out and removes all that is false and vain within us, and enthrones the truth in its place. And the truth sets us free (John 8:32). This is why it is said of Holy Scripture that, "It is your true life" (Deuteronomy 32:46-47). Your true life is the Holy Scripture, along with every spiritual book. This knowledge is a source of power which becomes active within us and gives us the love of Christ, divine love.

In time, little by little, you feel a change within yourself, and the desire for Christ is imprinted in your heart like the stamp of a seal. Just as the martyrs longed for Christ, and wanted to throw themselves into the flames in order to be with Him, so too will you feel the love of Christ being ignited within you... This is why [Saint Sisoes], when he was invited somewhere, said, "I am not at leisure to come." Why not? Because he did not want to be deprived of his spiritual study, which was his means of acquiring divine knowledge and love...

Spiritual books, and especially Holy Scripture, provide us with spiritual experiences. How? The spiritual book you read is the word of God, it is what God has said... Where God's voice is, there is God, hidden within the voice. The spiritual book, in other words, is a mystery, a sacrament, a sign which conceals the presence of God Himself... The words and lines of Holy Scripture are the garments of Christ... T he pages of spiritual books cover Christ Himself.

I open the New Testament and I read, "The Epistle of Paul to the Romans." Is it Paul who speaks here? No. It is Christ Who speaks. [Or], "The First Epistle of Peter." Is it Peter who speaks? No. Here we find Christ, and it is He Who speaks. Just as in Holy Communion...through the bread and the wine, you're receiving Christ...Christ is present in it mystically. The same thing happens here. By means of letters and words, through the paragraphs and the pages, you commune mystically with Christ...

It follows, then, that when you're reading a spiritual book, Christ is present behind the lines. When you open such a book...Christ...is now mystically present with you. And I emphasize that "mystically present" means truly present. Because Christ is present behind every line of every spiritual book, it's as if He's calling you and saying, "Come, my child." And if you have the desire to understand what He is telling you, you'll respond and say, "I'm coming, Lord." ...And thus we have a dialogue between two persons, face to face. Christ and I are conversing by means of the book... The reading of a spiritual book is a revelation, a theophany. It is the presence of Christ. It is an encounter with Christ, a mystical union with Christ. Christ and I are united. And Christ, moreover...is always in the company of His saints and His Angels. This means that your union with Christ is also a mystical union with all the saints. If you have spiritual eyes and spiritual senses, you'll feel what such a union with Christ means. When we have the word of God in our heart, and in our mouth, we'll feel what [Saint Pachomios] once said, "Though we live on earth, we celebrate a feast in heaven."

...I want you to live like Saint Seraphim of Sarov, who, every week, read the entire Gospel... The saint awaited Christ like the wise virgins (Matthew 25:1-13). He lit his lamps in order to show Christ that he was waiting for Him. He sat up all night... He never slept at night... [When] his soul had taken flight...[he was found] kneeling at prayer with his eyes closed... In front of the saint was an open Gospel book... All around him were his spiritual books... Did he die? No. He was born into the other life. My beloved friends, we too should live like this, with our hearts longing for Christ, and with our lamps lit, and our spiritual books open before us. *+Archimandrite Aimilianos of Simonopetra, The Church at Prayer, p. 111-114.*

How Angels Serve Priests in the Holy Altar - December 7, 2015

This incident was narrated to the author by the blessed departed Gerondas Gabriel, who for a great period of time was the abbot at the Holy Monastery of Dionysios on Mount Athos.

"There once lived a most devout Priest. Even though he barely knew how to read and write, he was a Priest, a clergyman of strong faith, great virtue and of many spiritual struggles. He used to stand up-right for hours during the Proskomedia, despite the fact that the veins of his feet had been affected and were hemorrhaging. There were times when one could see the blood running down since he was standing up-right commemorating the names of numerous people. He was a man of sacrifice to his last breath, in fact, his soul departed just after the Divine Liturgy.

As he barely knew how to read and write, by some misunderstanding, he did not place the portions on the Holy Diskos properly. When we place the portion of the All-Holy Theotokos on top of the Holy Diskos, we say; The Queen stood at thy right hand..." The Gerondas (Elder) Priest was under the impression that, since he said, "at thy right hand", the portion of the All-Holy Mother of God must be placed on the right side of the Lamb (as he was looking at the Holy Diskos). In other words, he was placing the portions backwards.

Once a Hierarch [Bishop] visited the Holy Monastery for the Ordination of a Deacon. During the Psalms of Praise, when the Bishop enters the Holy Altar, he vests, then later goes to the Proskomedia, which has already been prepared up to a certain point. From then on, he alone is the one to continue commemorating.

Thus, the Bishop noticed that the portions had been placed backwards by the priest: "You did not place the pieces properly, father," he told him.

"Father, come here for a minute. The All Holy Theotokos is placed over here and the Orders are placed over there. Hasn't anyone told you; hasn't anyone seen how you do the Proskomedia?"

"Certainly, Your Eminence," replied the Geronda Priest. "Everyday, when I celebrate (for a day did not go by unless he celebrated the Divine Liturgy), the Angel who serves me sees what I am doing but does not tell me anything at all. I apologize, illiterate as I am, for making such a mistake; I will be careful from now on."

"Who did you say? Who did you say serves you here?" asked the Bishop, "Isn't he a monk who serves you?"

"No", answered the Priest, "an Angel of the Lord."

The Bishop fell silent, what could he have said, anyway? He was astonished and had certainly realized that a holy priest was standing before him.

At noon, following the meal in the trapeza, the Bishop said goodbye to the Abbot as well as the rest of the monks, and departed. The following day, as it was still night, when the Geronda Priest went to the Holy Altar in order to hold the Proskomedia.

The Angel of the Lord came down. During the act of breaking the Lamb, the Angel noticed that the Priest had placed the portions properly.

"Fine father!" he told the Priest. "Now you have placed them properly!"

"Yes, you knew the mistake I have been making for so many years! And why didn't you tell me anything; why didn't you correct me?", he asked.

"I could see it, but I do not have the right to tell you anything. I am not worthy to correct a Priest. "God," the Angel continued, "commands me to serve the Priest. Only a Bishop has the right to correct you!"

Beloved in Christ,

The twin feasts of the Ascension of the Lord and Pentecost are truly a summation of the entire Christian life. In the Ascension, we are reminded that this life on earth is not our final destiny. Our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ ascended 40 days after His resurrection to prepare a place for us with His Father. That is our ultimate destination and should be the object of our thoughts, words, and deeds on a daily basis.

Pentecost or Trinity Sunday reminds us of what our daily lives should be like. Holy Apostle Peter's words to the multitude on that first Pentecost provide us with the key to the Christian life. Peter boldly proclaims "Repent, and let every one of you be baptized in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins; and you shall receive the gift of the Holy Spirit." (Acts 2:38-39)

Furthermore, on Pentecost, in the Vesper service following Divine Liturgy, Orthodox Christians kneel for the first time after Pascha. The kneeling prayers of Pentecost are a profound expression of repentance and provide us with the proper roadmap concerning how we are to live the rest of the year.

Our merciful and loving God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit—has appointed to us repentance as the path to union with Him. Let us humbly beseech Him to grant us this great gift.

So, on this feast of Pentecost we are emboldened to cry out, "O Heavenly King, Comforter, Spirit of Truth, Who art everywhere present, and fillest all things, Treasury of good gifts, and giver of life, come and abide in us, and cleanse us of all impurity, and save our souls, O Good One." Amen.

And if we are filled with the Spirit, if we are inspired, that means the mission of the redemption of Jesus Christ is at work in us. Every part of us is being bought back from exile, set free from slavery.

To be filled with the Spirit is eminently practical, because it means that we are motivated by something different than what motivates the world. We are motivated by re-creation. We are being created anew by Christ. We are growing in love. We are growing in humility. We are growing in courage, in strength, in boldness for Christ. These are all things that are visible and knowable in ourselves and in others.

Pentecost for us is now. Right now, we are receiving the lifegiving breath of God, the creative Spirit, sent forth to re-create us and to renew all of mankind and indeed the whole creation.
