The Kingdom of God

Matthew 6:33-But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. (KJV)

Christ calls each person to seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. True desire within the person is necessary in moving toward God's Kingdom. The seeking of the ultimate in life is necessary for a person to seek the Kingdom. Dissatisfaction with the present inspires the person to look to God for direction. God's love offers the Kingdom for the fulfillment of each true seeking believer.

Matthew 12:28-But if I cast out devils by the Spirit of God, then the kingdom of God is come unto you. (KJV)

God's action and love are necessary for the believer to experience the Kingdom. The Kingdom entails the presence of God and the absence of all that is not of God. Angels Unawares

I've been asked to repost this story from the past
While sitting in Murchie's Tea and Coffee sidewalk cafe in Victoria,
B.C., with my friend Archpriest Basil Rhodes, having a cup of coffee and a
lemon scone, a homeless man stopped behind me. The man was staring at
our food, so Father Basil asked him if he was hungry. He answered with an
enthusiastic "yes," and when Father asked what he'd like to eat, he said
"sausages and eggs." Father Basil told him they didn't have such a
breakfast here, but passed a Canadian five-dollar bill for me to give the
man, telling him to find just what he wanted, elsewhere.

Another man, around thirty years of age, was standing nearby, listening to every word. As the homeless man walked away, the younger man walked up and confronted us with the question, "how could you give money to a junky? You are not doing him any good by giving him money. Aren't you men of God?"

I responded by saying that it was not our place to judge anyone, to which he replied, in a confrontational manner, "he's just going to buy drugs with that money. You don't seem to be very intuitive". I told him I'd worked with the homeless before, and that the man was hungry and deserving of our charity. The man said "cheers" and dismissively walked away.

A woman seated at a nearby table called over with the words, "good response." She then came over to our table, knelt down beside me, and with tears in her eyes, identified herself as a social worker, and told us she'd been going through a particularly difficult time, and that the interaction she'd just witnessed had helped her immensely.

I then told this woman the story of the time I was walking with an elderly bishop of the Russian Church, and how I had spotted a filthy homeless man walking towards us. This man's hair was disheveled, filthy with years of dirt, and was wearing torn clothing. He had no soles on his shoes, so with each step we could see the bottom of his feet. Instinctively, I took the elbow of the bishop, and attempted to get him to cross in the middle of the street. The bishop asked why, and I said, "Look at the crazy man coming towards us". The bishop told me we were not crossing, but would continue.

When directly in front of the man, the bishop stopped, reached out, taking the man's filthy right hand into his own, and placed a twenty-dollar bill into the man's hand, covering the bill with the man's left hand. At that moment the man looked up into our eyes, saying nothing. But looking back were the bluest, clearest eyes I had ever seen. They were not the eyes of a homeless man, nor the eyes of a deranged man, but eyes filled with wisdom and holiness.

As we walked away, I remarked about the man's eyes, to which the bishop responded by saying, "We just encountered an angel unaware, and we were being tested," recalling the words of Scripture, "Be not forgetful to entertain strangers: for thereby some have entertained angels unawares" (Hebrews 13:2).

After the social worker left, a man seated at a nearby table remarked, "that was a remarkable story, and you made my wife cry". This other couple had witnessed the whole of these encounters.

A moment later, the young man who'd judged us so harshly after the original encounter, returned. He came to our table, asked forgiveness for having judged us, and said he'd followed the homeless man, witnessing him "buying yogurt and fruit" with the money we'd given him. I stood up, told the young man that we'd forgiven him the moment we'd heard the words come out of his mouth, and I gave him a hug.

Only then did Father Basil and I finally taste our, by now, cold cappuccinos and lemon scones.

The saint's authority extended not only over the earthly realm, but even over the very abysses of hell. Once Fr. Seraphim related the following about himself: "Two nuns, both former abbesses, were dying. The Lord revealed to me their lot beyond the grave: how their souls were led past the aerial toll-houses; how at the toll-houses they were tortured and then judged. For three whole days I, the poor one, prayed, appealing to the Mother of God. The Lord, in His graciousness, by the prayers of the Mother of God, had mercy upon them. They passed through all of the aerial toll-houses and received forgiveness from the merciful God."

Here is another incident. One day two merchant brothers came to St. Seraphim. Their father had drunk too much wine and died without repentance. They had not yet been able to tell the Saint, but he himself came to them and placed a prosphora in each of their mouths. He told them, however, not to chew them, but to swallow them slowly as they dissolved. Leaving them alone, he went to his cell to pray. When he came back out, both brothers' countenances had darkened and tears streamed down their faces.

"Was it difficult for you?" asked the God-pleaser. They said, "It was so difficult that we almost lost our breath." "Well, it was just as hard, Fr. Seraphim added, "to tear the soul of your drunken father from the arms of Satan; and the Holy Church does not accept prayers for those who have died in drunkenness." Then Fr. Seraphim ordered the brothers to have a bell made in remembrance of their father and to donate it to some church. It so happened that they had come to him specifically to ask a blessing for just such a donation.

For such boldness in prayer, the enemy was vengeful against Fr. Seraphim, sometimes obviously. The Diveyevo sister Anna Alexeevna recalls: "One sister was vouchsafed to pray with St. Seraphim in his cell. Suddenly there came such a darkness that she fell to the floor from fear... When she came to her senses, the Saint asked her to arise, and explained to her the reason for this occurrence:

"Do you know, my joy, why such a clear day suddenly became so horribly dark? It is because I prayed for a deceased sinful soul and tore it from the arms of satan himself. He therefore was furious with me and flew here, causing that darkness.'

"That is how his prayer was on the earth. Now, with the Lord in heaven he can ask for anything and receive it."

HOW TO PRAY FOR THOSE WHO REQUESTS YOU TO PRAY FOR THEM?

- Geronda, when they ask us, for example: "Pray for my child who is taking the exams", or "Pray for such and such—he will have an operation, "then do you need to ask how everything went?
- Why ask how it went? To say, "Glory to Thee, O God, that my prayer worked"? Prayed? Did your job? Nothing else is required of you.
- Geronda, how do you pray for the people for whom you are being asked to pray?
- Before the operation, the notes that they gave me, I read standing up, making prostrations from time to time. When I returned from the hospital, I began reading while lying on my side. But as soon as I came to myself, I again began to read the notes while standing.
- Geronda, when some pilgrims leave us notes for commemoration, and we do not know their needs, then how do we pray for them?
- Say: "Lord, have mercy on Your servants, whose needs You yourself know."
- And when, Geronda, we pray for people and don't know if they are alive or dead?
 - Say: "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on Your servants."
- Geronda, sometimes I forget to pray for those who asked to pray for a particular case on a certain day and time.
- Begin your prayer for them and say: "Remember, O Lord, Your servants who commanded us unworthy to pray for them." Remember the names of them two or three times, and then pray for the whole world, saying: "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on Your servants."
- Sometimes, Geronda, I do not remember the names of people who ask for prayers.
- If you do not remember the names that are given to you, then pray in general: for the sick, for the young, those who have gone astray, etc. At the beginning say: "Help, my God, first to those who need help more", and then continue: "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on Your servants."
- Geronda, I write down the names of people who ask for prayers, according to their needs for health, for enlightenment, etc. But the names are getting bigger and bigger. How long do you need to keep these names and pray for these people?
- First, commemorate the new names, and then say: "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on Your servants and all Your world," this is so that your train does not go half empty.

- Geronda, when I am asked to pray for some need, how long should I pray?
- Depends on the needs of the person and how much you sympathize with him. He may not have any serious need, but by compassion for him you can pray for him for years.
 - What is, Geronda, the criterion that I prayed enough?
- Pray until it bothers you. And in terms of quantity, it depends on how much time you have. But the main thing is not how many times you pray for people, but how you pray. You can pray for a long time and think that you are praying, but in reality you are not praying because you do not have compassion in prayer. And someone may not be praying for long, but his prayer is real, because it is created with contrition and humility. But if there is both quantity and quality, then a pious soul receives a double grace from God.
- -Geronda, when people come to the monastery with some grief and leave their names for me to pray, I sympathize with them, but sometimes I don't have enough time to pray for their needs, and the thought confuses me.
- A person shares his pain with you, you listen to him and deeply sympathize. Then, even if you do not have time to pray for him, this compassion is worth hours of prayer; it is a heartfelt prayer and it has beneficial results. Or you read the names that are given to you, and you worry that you have no time to do something more. One heartfelt sighing when pronouncing names is recorded in Heaven, goes straight to the throne of God! Saint Paisios the Athonite

ON THE HOLY SPIRIT IN YOUR LIFE:

"The grace of the Holy Spirit which is given mystically to every Christian when he is baptized acts and is manifested in proportion to our obedience to the commandments of the Lord.

That is, if a Christian obeys the commandments of the Lord more, grace acts with him more, while if he obeys them less, grace acts within him less. Just as a spark, when covered in the ashes of fire becomes increasingly manifest as one removes the ashes, and the more fire wood you put the more the fire burns, so the grace that has been given to every Christian through Holy Baptism is hidden in the heart and covered up by the passions and sins, and the more a man acts in accordance with the commandments of Christ, the more he is cleansed of the passions and the more the fire of Divine grace lights in his heart, illumines and deifies him."
