The Presbytera: A Ministry of Support

This is my Presbytera, Jennifer. I call her PJ.

The other day I was talking with a good friend of mine about some particular difficulties we encounter in ministry. Along the way we got onto the subjects of ministering to our wives, who we in the Greek Orthodox tradition call the Presbytera (generally pronounced *presvytera*). He said something that struck me. You know, I know our wives love us, but I don't think they'll ever truly understand how difficult our ministry can be.

My friend

I told him that's an interesting (read: frustrating) statement, because I honestly believe the ministry of the Presbytera is quite difficult for a number of reasons. I sincerely think that the ministry of our wives, both to the parish and to we priests, is indelible, and requires a great deal of grace and savvy to navigate. And to that, my dearest sisters in Christ, I would use my tiny platform to brag on you, the women who out of love for their husbands and parishes, willingly take on the mantle of presbytera-hood, and provide a firm support for us. Here's a purposely effusive telling of all the things I know, or have learned, about being a Presbytera.

Your ministry begins before ordination even happens. Some of you followed us all the way to seminary (in our Archdiocese, ours is in Boston), disrupting your entire life to support us. Some of you were newlyweds, and your very first years of marriage were spent under the eyes of 30 other families. (Some of you met in school and then got married right before ordination—another unique challenge.) You might had not seen us meaningfully for a couple of days at a time, depending on the season. This can be particularly difficult for those of us who have children, because parenting duties fell on your shoulders. For most of you, seminary was a beautiful time, where you forged very deep relationships with other families. But it can be excruciatingly difficult sometimes to live in a large community and not see your husband. It's important to note: you didn't do it because you were pining for an upheaval in your life, but because you love us, saw something in us when we talk about God's pull in our lives, and decided to support us in this call. Heck, you even made a statement that you support us and will follow us to wherever we're assigned.

Fast-forward to the parish life where your ministry changes. Although your husband serves the parish, it's *your* home parish. It's your primary

source of other Orthodox Christians, it's where you, an Orthodox Christian, encounter Christ in the sacraments. And yet, because you are a Presbytera people look to you as an example of Christian living. If you have children people are going watch you parenting your children. Even on Sundays! I can't imagine how stressful that is. Because while most people aren't scrutinizing, they still see what's going on when your kids are being kids. I know you've heard post-Liturgy commentary about the kids, good and bad. But even we priests can move behind the iconostasis for a moment. We don't feel like we have to answer for our children's behavior in the service.

Even knowing the parish is your home parish it can be hard to plug in as a "regular" member, because you know you aren't precisely a "regular" member. Even as a young woman you will find yourself, in some ways, feeling like a mother to the community. People trust you and sometimes will tell you something they might not tell the priest. As a woman, other women may feel more comfortable around you. Everyone will feel comfortable around you. And why wouldn't they? You're pretty incredible. You're great listeners, and have a compassionate ear. If there's friction among members you have to be impartial. You may have also practiced the phrase, "...have you talked to Father about that?" or something similar to it, because you're mortified at the thought of contradicting your husband, or in some other way undermining his ministry. You're left trying to hold that balance, and that requires a lot of strength.

While I'm on the subject of husbands, I'd be remiss if I didn't mention your ministry to us. Church work can be stressful, it's true. It's not always bad stress; just the busy-ness of things can wear on a person. But we do come home from maybe working all day and/or a long evening of meetings, and we still don't shut off. We're always noodling around some ministry idea, thinking about how to teach stewardship, or any number of other things related to parish administration. We don't want to bother you with it, but you try to let us bounce ideas off of you, give your observations, and even offer to lead a ministry that we really want to start but don't have the time or brain space for. I couldn't tell you how many priest wives I've met who are the choir director at the parish, or the chanter. If we're beat down you endeavor to raise us up.

So from where I see it, you live a life where not only do you strive to be an holy Orthodox Christian woman, but also live a life as an example of that striving to an entire parish community. You concern yourself not only with your family in the flesh, but you're aware of your place in the immortal spiritual family that is in all of our parishes. You don't just worry about yourself and your children but the wholeness of your husband. The Presbytera juggles a lot of different roles in the parish. I know most of us appreciate you but it probably sometimes feels thankless.

And so I'd tell my friend that I could never understand how hard *your* ministry is. Thank you for your love, your support, and for your example that you set for all of us in the parish. And **thank you** to all the parishes who love their Presbyteres.

Epilogue: Hilarious to me, PJ's response to me when I told her what I wrote about the important ministry of the Presbytera.

Jeesh. It's really not that hard.

Ok, love. Ok.
