Healing

Matthew 4:24-And his fame went throughout all Syria: and they brought unto him all sick people that were taken with divers diseases and torments, and those which were possessed with devils, and those which were lunatic, and those that had the palsy; and he healed them. (KJV)

The Holy Gospel teaches the Lord heals those turning to Him in faith and hope. Healing has different dimensions which are not always visible to the seeing eye. Internal healing bringing peace to mind, heart and soul can occur within a believer. A believer may outwardly suffer from afflictions and inwardly be fully healed. Compelling testimonies exist from sufferers filled with great joy in the Lord Jesus. Present sufferers wisely turn completely to the Lord Jesus in search of healing.

Mark 3:10- For he had healed many; insomuch that they pressed upon him for to touch him, as many as had plagues. (KJV)

The Holy Gospel confirms and serves as written proof of the Lord's healing power. Strength and hope are derived from Jesus' healings detailed in the Holy Gospel. Believers seeking healing for the body and soul find nourishment in the Gospel. Internal peace becomes achievable as the believer immerses the self in the Gospel. Hope is strengthened when the Gospel accounts of healing are carefully studied. The Church's documented history of healings will erase believers' personal doubts.

Luke 9:11- And the people, when they knew it, followed him: and he received them, and spake unto them of the kingdom of God, and healed them that had need of healing. (KJV)

Healings from afflictions, illnesses and diseases bring abundant joy to believers. The passing of time adds to the continuing record of Jesus' dramatic healings. The Lord Jesus Christ's healing power is ever-present and is never diminished. Time, geography, and ethnicity do not limit or weaken the Lord's healing powers. Lord Jesus Christ performs miraculous healings known and unknown every day. Serious believers readily learn of the Lord Jesus Christ's miraculous healings.

John 5:13- And he that was healed wist not who it was: for Jesus had conveyed himself away, a multitude being in that place. (KJV)

God's Church is the best place to learn about Jesus' healing power and ability. The Church offers the Divine services and best teachings for continued learning. Believers turning to the Church in search of healing will not be disappointed. Steadfastness of faith and hope are necessary to experience complete healing. Repentance, prayer and fasting facilitate healing by the Lord Jesus Christ. The Lord is the ultimate determiner of the nature of the healing that will occur.

Jawn, pronounced \ˈjān\, is the Philadelphia all-purpose noun. It can refer to a single thing, or a collection or class of things, or a situation, or a person.

Where were you one year ago today? What were you doing? Who were you with?

Allow me to take some liberties with the exact date, but I can remember March 12th, when the county I live in was ordered to shut down for two weeks. Two weeks, now, seems like a drop in the bucket in COVID-time.

When I went to pick my daughter up from daycare, her teacher told me that school was going to shut down for two weeks.

Two weeks? With a 3-year-old? At home? Well, that may just be an eternity.

The next week, had it not been for a stay-at-home order, would have seemed uneventful. But along the way, there were these weird little quirks that began to enter our daily lives. I remember taking my daughter to a state park where we liked to play. When we pulled into the parking lot, the playground was closed. Then, on the way home, we had to make a stop to use the potty...and that was closed.

When I went to go pick up a pizza, there were chairs on top of the tables. No seating allowed. My daughter loves the trampoline park. It was closed. We ended up at a bird sanctuary, which was fun in a simplistic, nothing-to-do-for-a-three-year-old sort of way. We would end up spending a lot of time at that bird sanctuary because, well, it was either that or a parking lot for her to ride her scooter.

Things seemed quieter. There was far less traffic on the roads. I saw my neighbors more than I ever had before. I started using these things called "Zoom" and "Teams" that I was sure I'd never *really* have to learn all that well. It was the last week I would see a few groups of friends for months.

Basketball players walked off the court before games, college basketball tournaments were cancelled mid-tournament, Spring Training for baseball was delayed, Wrestlemania was put on without fans, and the NFL draft was held at the Commissioner's home office.

Sports, social events, worship services, and school; all cancelled.

I think back and I wonder what kept me going, what kept my friends, family, and the rest of the world going. Amid fear, or lockdown, of confusion and the unknown, we persevered through sickness, through loss, and through times of overwhelming anxiety. Some of our families, like mine, dealt with COVID first-hand.

I came back to one feeling, and that is faith. Faith, whether it be in the form of faith in science, a higher power, in humanity itself, or whatever it is that gets us through day by day.

Faith in people wearing masks and social distancing. Faith in our health experts giving us prudent advice and guidelines. Faith in our local businesses staying afloat during a reduction of commerce. Faith in just keeping it together. Faith in staying alive.

Faith that your family, friends, neighbors, and community had faith, too.

That faith has carried over into 2021, and it's increasing throughout our country. A recent Axios poll found that 48% of Americans are now "hopeful" about the direction of the pandemic. While that is not a majority, it is up 20% from last year. Faith in vaccines, treatments, and a return to some semblance of normalcy.

I remember one night, in the thick of the initial lockdown, when my daughter was asking me why she wasn't going to school tomorrow. What about the day after that? Or the day after that? Why couldn't she see her friends? Her teachers? She was bored, emotional, and confused. I told her because people were getting sick, and we all had to stay home from work and school so people could get better.


I felt my fists balling up and my eyes welling up. Ever perceptive, she said to me "Don't be sad Daddy. Let me read you a book." She "read" me a story, where her, mommy, and daddy went to the beach. Mimicking me, she said, "It's OK. It's OK. We'll go to the beach soon."

And, sure enough, she kept her faith. By the time we went to the beach in June, the restaurants, boardwalk, and ice cream shops were all open for business...the very week we went.

Faith isn't always easy to find. It's fleeting and, at times, unattainable. But we are at a point in this pandemic where we can turn things around and put it behind us. Wear your mask, socially distance, get your vaccine, and continue to make smart choices.

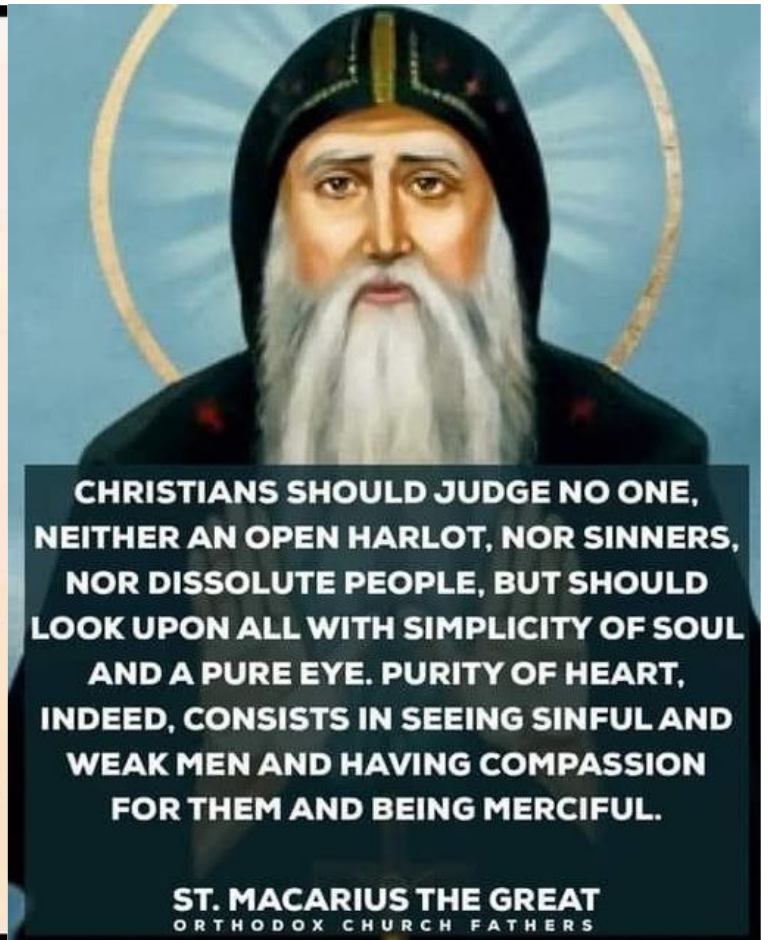
