5 Facts About Prison and Religion That May Surprise You

- For those of us living in freedom, it is all too easy to forget the more than two million men and women imprisoned in the US. Out of sight, out of mind. And yet, the United States has the highest prison population in the world. Chances are, you or someone you know has been touched by someone who has spent time behind bars.
- Prisoners have spiritual needs like any individual. Chaplains and trained volunteers are contracted through each prison facility to provide spiritual care to the incarcerated. But there is no standardized system across America's labyrinth of federal, state, and county correctional systems for how prisoners should be allowed to practice their religion.
- Here are five facts about prison and religion that may surprise you.
- The Orthodox faith is not automatically recognized as a religious denomination by every correctional system across the United States. Federal and State correctional systems typically have a list of recognized religions. When a religion is recognized, it affords prisoners of that faith certain rights. This recognition is crucial because without it, a priest may not be allowed to enter a facility in order to administer the Sacraments and the Services. Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry actively advocates for correctional facilities around the country to recognize Orthodoxy so that prisoners can practice their Faith.
- There are 2.3 million incarcerated men and women in the United States (698 per 100,000 residents per capita), more than any other nation in the world. While prisoners are often forgotten, odds are you or someone in your church community will have a relative who has spent time in prison. For families of those in prison, things are often kept quiet because of shame. OCPM ministers not only to the incarcerated but to the families of those in prison. We also assist churches that are trying to reintegrate a released prisoner into parish life.
- have been prohibited from entering prisons across the country. According to the Marshall Project, "By Aprils, 20, at least 395,915 people in prison had tested positive for the illness, an increase of less than 1 percent from the week before." For nearly a year, almost all prisons were in lockdown in order to prevent outbreaks. This meant that prisoners were stuck in their cells and could not receive spiritual care except through Zoom meetings or through correspondence. OCPM has a correspondence database of over 3,600 prisoners. On average, we send mail to a prisoner 120 times per year. That includes shipments of books, Bibles, icons, catechism courses, and letters written by our staff that personally speak to

a prisoner's situation. Never was OCPM's Correspondence Ministry more crucial than during this pandemic.

- Not all mail can enter a prison facility due to the risk of contraband. Most of that contraband is street drugs that can be soaked or hidden into paper. On average, OCPM processes 92,000 pieces of mail in and out of prisons each year. But not just any mail can enter a jail or prison. There are stringent rules, unique to each facility that must be followed in order to gain and maintain access to those who are incarcerated. The books, icons, study courses, and Bible studies that OCPM publishes are specifically designed to adhere to strict prison guidelines.
- Most men in prison are young and have the majority of their lives ahead of them. An estimated 47% of sentenced prisoners are aged 25-39. Experts have found that it is those prisoners who make the most of their time in incarceration who are most likely to succeed on the outside. That can include taking courses, working towards a degree, and being involved with faith groups. Orthodox Christian Prison Ministry brings the unique teachings and traditions of the Orthodox Faith. Religion brings exposure to a value system compatible with success in reintegration. Orthodoxy is different in that it deals with life in the world as it is, not the ideal world of some other faiths or denominations.

Ears to Hear!

Psalm 43/44:1-We have heard with our ears, O God, our fathers have told us, what work thou didst in their days, in the times of old. (KJV)

Each word addressed to the Lord reveals the believer's depth of interest and faith. The heart, mind and soul do well to be in full concert when speaking to the Lord. Purity of heart, mind and soul require the Lord God's goodness, mercy, and grace. Repentance of sins and seeking the Lord's forgiveness result in unity with Christ.

Proverbs 23:12-Apply thine heart unto instruction, and thine ears to the words of knowledge. (KJV)

Repudiation of sin and rejection of temptations are necessary to follow the Lord. Learning from the Lord is possible and expected for believers all the days of life. Growth in Christ is always possible and is limited only by the believer's interest. The believer interested in greater unity with Christ will reach out in sincere faith. Careful listeners to the Lord are very attentive for the directions to grow in Christ. God does not disappoint believers opening their ears to instructions for the soul.

An old farmer writes letter to his son in prison: Dear son, this year I won't be able to plant potatoes because I can't dig the field by myself, I know if you were here, you would help me.



There is a good chance you have seen it before. It is iconic and indicative of the feelings those who have served felt when they returned home, but their friends did not. It is a harrowing, almost haunting image that tells the hardest story of all when it comes to war: the guilt, pain, and eternal suffering of knowing you will never see your friends again, that they made the ultimate sacrifice to defend not only their country, but you.

I have never served in the military, therefore, I will never fully understand the question of why "they" fight, they being the American servicemember who willingly put themselves into harm's way on a battlefield in a faraway land, but I suspect that their reasoning changes as they serve over time.

Perhaps one serves due to patriotic duty, the need to defend one's country when called upon. This country needs members of the armed services to defend it and, without them, we would not enjoy the freedoms we enjoy. Perhaps one serves due to family tradition, where their brother, sister, mother, father, or a grandparent served, and they feel an obligation to do so themselves.

Some do it for a better life promised when they return home. College tuition and professional skills gained. Some do it as an opportunity to travel, see new lands, and meet new people. Others may serve because it's the life for them, the technology is interesting, and the thrill is unmatchable.

No matter a servicemember's personal reason for serving, the bonds of war can cause one's reason to change from why they *fight* to why they *fought*.

Reflections tells the story of why young men and women fought the wars they did. The man, his hand outstretched onto the Vietnam War Memorial and open palmed to its granite surface, his fingers running across one of the 140 horizontal panels, is desperately grasping for something that physically no longer exists: His friends, the men he did everything he could to save from memorialization.

The men in the memorial, understanding he did everything he could, embrace him with hands of their own, coming through the same granite as he is. The man's head, sulked, in sadness, grief, and loss. The painting itself is a beautiful reminder of what those who have fought for this country, both the living and dead, battle every Memorial Day, and the days that follow.

The Memorials on our National Mall have the capability to bring those who have served, those who have not, and those who have lost, to their knees. If you allow yourself to let the Memorials embrace you, you will be able to feel at least a pound of the weight those men and women have felt when they died in battle, or the weight those who have come home feel for those who have not.

For those of us who can enjoy Memorial Day in this country, and the freedoms it gives us, it is our American duty to offer our own reflections. While it may not look like Teter's *Reflections*, it is inherently important for all of us to remember why we can, every day, live in a country of freedom, opportunity, liberty, and compromise.

As imperfect as the idea may be, remember that we can fix it because of those palms, outstretched, grasping to a rock of granite, wishing for things to be different. That is something worth reflecting and memorializing.

In the meantime, please have a safe and relaxing Memorial Day, and please take a moment to remember those who have served and made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of this great country.



Instead of "Vechnaya Pam'yat" at the end of a Parastas or during a funeral service *until Ascension Thursday*, we sing "Christ is Risen!" Also, we do not say the prayer to the Holy Spirit "O Heavenly King" until Pentecost Sunday.
