GREEK practice of vestments - two colors - Light for feasts and Dark for lenten seasons

From the RUSSIANS Church's Nastol'naya Kniga Sviashchenno-sluzhitelia
The most important Feasts of the Orthodox Church and the sacred
events for which specific colors of vestments have been established, can be
united into six basic groups.

- 1. The group of Feasts and days commemorating Our Lord Jesus Christ, the Prophets, the Apostles, and the Holy Hierarchs. Vestment color: Gold (yellow) of all shades.
- 2. The group of Feasts and days commemorating the Most Holy Mother of God, the Bodiless Powers and Virgins. Vestment color: Light Blue and White.
- 3. The group of Feasts and days commemorating the Cross of Our Lord. Vestment color: Purple or Dark Red.
- 4. The group of Feasts and days commemorating Martyrs. Vestment color: Red. [On Great and Holy Thursday, Dark Red vestments are worn, even though the church is still covered with black, and the Holy (Altar) Table is covered with a white cloth.]
- 5. The group of Feasts and days commemorating Monastic Saints, Ascetics and Fools for Christ. Vestment color: Green. The Entrance of Our Lord into Jerusalem (Palm Sunday), Holy Trinity Day(Pentecost) and Holy Spirit Day (Monday after Pentecost) are, as a rule, celebrated in Green vestments of all shades.
- 6. During the Lenten periods, the vestment colors are: Dark Blue, Purple, Dark Green, Dark Red and Black. This last color is used essentially for the days of Great Lent. During the first week of that Lent and on the weekdays of the following weeks, the vestment color is Black. On Sundays and Feast days of this period, the vestments are of a dark color with Gold or colored ornaments.

FUNERALS, as a rule, are done in WHITE vestments.

In earlier times, there were no Black vestments in the Orthodox Church, although the everyday clothing of the clergy, especially the Monastics, was Black. In ancient times, both in the Greek and in the Russian Churches, the clergy wore, according to the Typicon, "Crimson Vestments": Dark (Blood) Red vestments. In Russia, it was first proposed to the clergy of Saint Petersburg to wear Black Vestments, if possible, to participate in the Funeral of Emperor Peter II [1821]. From that time on, Black Vestments became customary for Funerals and the Services of Great Lent.

White is worn for the feasts and post-feasts of Epiphany, Transfiguration, and Pascha. In antiquity, Christmas and Epiphany were celebrated as one feast, Theophany of the Lord, so, in some places, White is worn on Christmas day, but Gold is worn from the second day of Christmas until Epiphany

In RUSSIA, at Liturgy on Holy Thursday, a white altar cover is used to represent the linen tablecloth of the Last Supper [the priest wears dark red, and the church remains in black until after Liturgy, when the priest's vestments return to black].

The Church and the vestments of the priest are changed to WHITE at the Prokeimenon of Holy Saturday Liturgy. (In Muscovite custom, white is worn for Paschal Matins, bright red is worn at Pascha Liturgy.) In the UKRAINIAN practice white is worn to Pentecost.

In Carpatho-Russian, UKRAINIAN custom, WHITE, exclusively, is worn in the PASKAL season.

WHITE is, the color of Resurrection, is worn at FUNERALS and memorial services. –Lazarus Saturday

GREEN is worn for Pentecost and its post-feast, feasts of prophets, and angels. In some places, green is worn for the Elevation of the Cross in September.

In Carpatho-Russian, UKRAINIAN practice, GREEN is worn from Pentecost until Saints Peter and Paul Lent. Green is often worn for Palm Sunday.

GOLD is worn from Christmas, till Dormition fast and in some places, during Advent Sundays. Gold is worn when no other color is specified. In one tradition, gold is worn on all Sundays until (except when white is worn), including even the Sundays in all the fasting periods.

RED is worn for SS Peter and Paul lent, SS Peter and Paul feast, for ADVENT, for the Angels, Elevation of the Cross (Sept 15), and for feasts of Martyrs. (In Moscow style, and on Mount Athos and at Jerusalem, bright red is worn on Pascha [after Matins] and on the Nativity.)

BLUE is worn for all feasts of the Virgin, Presentation of the Lord, Annunciation, and sometimes on the fifth Friday of Lent (Akathist). In Carpatho-Russian, UKRAINIAN parishes, BLUE is worn for DORMITION fast and feast, and is worn until Advent.

PURPLE is worn on weekends of Lent. In some places, PURPLE is worn on weekdays of Lent as well—at times (gold on weekends).

BLACK is worn especially in Holy Week. Red or purple for Holy Thursday, white for the Holy Saturday transition

In Carpatho-Russian, formerly Uniat parishes, black is worn on weekdays for funerals and memorial services and liturgies, as is done in the Roman Church, though this is not universally true anymore.

Orange or rust is worn in some places for SS Peter and Paul fast, and in other places for SS Peter and Paul feast through Transfiguration.

Please note that when we say 'feast', we include the period from the vigil of the feast until it's apodosis, or 'putting away,' usually called the 'post-feast'. The length of these post-feasts vary, and are given in the Liturgical Calendar and Rubrics. Generally speaking, there is a post- feast of about a week for each of the twelve major feasts. As you can see, there is great variety in ways of doing things.

In the Western Church, six colors are used: white, red, rose, green, purple and black. Blue and gold are not used. Black is worn on Good Friday, and at requiem Masses

From Father Milorad Orlic:

Today [12 December] We Commemorate: St. Mardarije of Libertyville (1889-1935)

Born in village of Kornet, Ljesani County, in Montenegro, on November 2, 1889, to pious parents Petar and Jela Uskokovic, he was baptized in his village church dedicated to St. George and received his baptismal name Ivan. His mother was from the well-known Bozovic family. Both of his parents were well respected in their community holding the office of leadership and particularly his father was a captain of their clan.

Considering his parents' status, young Ivan was sent to further his education, first in Rijeka Crnojevic, Cetinje, and then in Belgrade, Serbia. While in Belgrade, young Ivan advanced his childhood desire to serve God and the Church, and so from there he headed to monastery Studenica where after a short period of novice life he gets tonsured to monasticism having received the name Mardarije. With the decision of the Holy Synod of the Serbian Orthodox Church, now young hierodeacon Mardarije is sent to Russia where he spent twelve years (1905-1917) furthering his theological education and growing in wisdom. From there, the Holy Synod of the Russian Orthodox Church sent him to the United States of America to organize the Serbian Orthodox Church. On December 1, 1923, now archimandrite Mardarije is appointed as administrator of the Serbian American-Canadian diocese with the see in Chicago and that same year he purchased around ten acres of land in Libertyville, Illinois, where later St. Sava monastery was built. He was elected by the Holy Assembly of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church as the first bishop for the newly established diocese in America on December 7, 1925, and his consecration took place on Palm Sunday, the Feast of the Entrance of Our Lord Jesus Christ into Jerusalem, on April 25, 1926.

From then on His Grace Bishop Mardarije, the first bishop of the Serbian Orthodox Church in North and South America, labored tirelessly in

building churches, St. Sava monastery in Libertyville, sowing Christian love, spread peace, preached and witnessed the Gospel of Christ throughout his diocese. In spite of inescapable wordly trends, he lived spontaneity of truth and a provision of grace, just because Life has dawned from the Tomb, and is dawning still. Having labored as bishop for a little over nine years he died peacefully on December 12, 1935, hospitalized in Ann Arbor, Michigan, while writing his last Nativity Encyclical to his beloved flock. His earthly remains were laid to rest at St. Sava monastery in Libertyville. The Holy Assembly of Bishops of the Serbian Orthodox Church during its regular session held from May 14-29, 2015, brought forth a decision that his name be added to the Diptych of saints of the Holy Orthodox Church.

From the Holy Hierarch Mardarije, we see how the grace of God reaches the heart of our cities, bringing to the confusion of the world the breeze of the Spirit and the serenity of the Age to come.

Vladika Lazar Puhalo:

One of the things that makes right wing Evangelicals so dangerous is their focus on "God's punishment." They really are riveted on the delusion that justice is a synonym for punishment and that God's main interaction with mankind is His desire to "get even with man" for having offended Him. They actually believe that they have to coerce external behaviour in order to prevent "God's punishment" on America. For them, the only solution is an authoritarian system of government. That is one of the dangers that we face: this dystopian fantasy of an autocratic theocracy as the solution to the frightening fantasies that haunt their souls. There is a tendency on part to relegate actual and proven dangers to the level of conspiracy theories. We have already heard some of their demagogue preachers denying climate change but asserting that the already occurring results of climate change are only God's punishment for this or that imagined "sin." Somehow, they

have left no space for God's love and mercy and appear to feel that only coerced external behaviour can resolve the problems facing the Western world today. As a result, they have espoused the most destructive and corrupt form of politics and a theology that actually promotes atheism. We can see elements of this within the Orthodox Church today also, and we need to urgently resist it.

The role of Christians in the world is to filter the atmosphere of the earth so that the atmosphere of God's reign can gain ground.
