#### Sister Vassa [Larin] (Monday, August 29 [September 11]) WHAT DOES "MEMORY ETERNAL" (ВЕЧНАЯ ПАМЯТЬ/VECHNAYA PAM'YAT) MEAN?

"The righteous shall be in eternal memory. He shall not fear evil tidings." (Είς μνημόσυνον αίώνιον ἕσται δίκαιος, ἀπὸ ἀκοῆς πονηρᾶς οὐ φοβηθήσεται. /В память вечную будет праведник, от слуха зла не убоится, Ps 111:6)

When we sing or say "Memory eternal!" when somebody dies in our church, we mean that we pray that they be counted among the "righteous"; the sort of people who, according to the above-quoted Psalm-verse, remain in "eternal memory," or memorable also in timeless eternity, (although "memory" in "eternity" is a mystery impossible to grasp), and who did "not fear evil tidings." Even if they were poor and seemingly defeated in this life, like St. John the Baptist.

That's why the above-quoted Psalm-verse is chanted as the "Communion Verse" on today's (New Calendar) feast of the Beheading of St. John the Baptist. It affirms the Church's perspective on the seemingly undignified death of the Forerunner and Baptist of the Lord, ordered by Herod Antipas at the behest of a young woman, who pleased him with her dancing at his birthday party. It would seem that on this occasion, drunken mindlessness triumphed over righteousness; that evil triumphed over good. But—no. The holy and great John, Forerunner of the Lord, is cherished in "eternal memory" as the righteous and fearless "voice crying out in the wilderness," speaking truth to power, while Herod Antipas, who acted out of merely-human fear, remains in our memory but a pathetic side note to John's story. Most of us today don't even distinguish this Herod (Antipas or "the Tetrarch") from the other Herod ("the Great" or the king), Herod Antipas's father, who had the infants killed in Bethlehem.

While Herod Antipas feared losing face before his friends, after he promised with an oath to give the young woman whatever she asked, St. John the Baptist did not fear losing his head, for telling Herod that he should not be with Herodias, Herod's sister-in-law. I'll remind us that this was the woman who demanded John's head on a plate, literally, so I think that John's concerns for Herod in this relationship were not just of the canonical/legalistic kind, but of the this-woman-might-want-your-head-ona-plate kind. Thus, in this story the righteous fear-less-ness of John the Baptist is manifested in stark contrast to the wicked fear-ful-ness of Herod. And yet, the good guy in this story lost his head, while the bad guy remained alive and in power, in this world anyway. Many people back then probably thought that John lost, and Herod won. But the Church affirms, both in the Psalms and today, that "The righteous shall be in eternal memory. He shall not fear evil tidings." John the Baptist did not fear the "evil tidings" about Herod being angry with him, when Herod had John arrested. According to tradition, he continued to chastise Herod for his relationship with Herodias, even in prison.

How is this story relevant for us today? The message for us today, from this whole story, is that our participation in "the righteous" and righteousness liberates us from "the fear of evil tidings;" the fear that comes from all the negative news that we imbibe in our 24/7 news cycle. This does not mean that we are perfect, because "there is not one righteous" (Rom 3:10). But we participate in God's "rightness" and "righteousness," when we choose His truth and side with His truth, participating in it in faith, (that is, choosing to believe in Him, and to have communion with Him and with the Communion of the Saints), amidst all the false idols of this world. By "false idols" I mean the kind of success, celebrity, strength, power, and wealth that seem to have the upper hand in our world, and the ups-and-downs of which we might tend to focus on, if we get drawn into its system of values. Today we also see a rise in authoritarian regimes in many countries, which stifle the voices of truth-tellers and silence the truth-thinkers.

We may not all be called to lose our heads in this situation, as was St. John the Baptist, because not everyone is called to "martyrdom" (or "witness") in the same way. But let us not fear the "evil tidings" of this world, I am thinking, by keeping our focus on the presence of God in our lives, and cherishing the "eternal memory" of His righteous ones, both from the past and those who suffer for raising up their voices today. Holy and Great John, Forerunner of the Lord, pray to God for us!



**The Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost** Matthew 19:16-26 And, behold, one came and said unto him, Good Master, what good thing shall I do, that I may have eternal life? And he said unto him, Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is, God: but if thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments. He saith unto him, Which? Jesus said, Thou shalt do no murder, Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Honour thy father and thy mother: and, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. The young man saith unto him, All these things have I kept from my youth up: what lack I yet? Jesus said unto him, If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow me. But when the young man heard that saying, he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions. Then said Jesus unto his disciples, Verily I say unto you, That a rich man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven. And again I say unto you, It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God. When his disciples heard it, they were exceedingly amazed, saying, Who then can be saved? But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible. (KJV)

The present Gospel focuses on growth and change for the life in the Lord Jesus Christ. Growth in Christ involves following and trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ. The heart, mind, and soul are required to be open to change. Acting on the interest in growth in Christ is necessary. The rich man in the present Gospel was only willing to adhere to the commandment to a certain degree.

He had reached the limit of what he was willing to do.

How many believers feel they do enough for the church, for their family, their friends, or their employers? Growth requires a willingness to change and put aside all that inhibits growth.

Jesus told the rich man to dispose of his possessions to enter into life. The rich man expressed an interest in eternal life but his attachment to his possessions held him back from the change required.

Believers exist in every century who deny themselves the fulness of the life in Christ. The unwillingness to change and give up inhibiting possessions in the current life prevents living fully in Christ.

Possessions can include material possessions but also other nonmaterial aspects such as unwillingness to give up an office or position held to move forward. Certain attitudes can prevent growth in Christ and need to be set aside.

Eternal life is the intended goal of each Christian. Growth in Jesus Christ is to occur throughout life. The believer must be conscious and active in following Christ in order to grow.

The Holy Gospel, the Church's Divine services, and teachings nourish and guide the believer from Holy Baptism until departure from this life. Attentive believers are active in following Christ in the Church.

Participating in the Holy Mysteries enable the believer to be transformed and remain united with Christ. Embracing change includes opening the heart, mind, and soul to Christ and welcoming the newness Jesus Christ constantly provides.

The love, mercy, and goodness of Christ await the believer opening the heart, mind, and soul to newness in Christ. Eternal life is the ultimate goal. The path to eternal life is set forth at the time of Holy Baptism.

God reveals the steps to take from Baptism until departure from this life. God's revelations become known to the believer through participating in the life of the Church.

Constant repentance, fasting, and prayer open the believer's heart, mind, and soul to attentiveness to God's teachings and revelations. The attentive believer comes to know the steps God desires for the believer to take.

Just as Jesus told the rich man in the current Gospel, attentive believers will understand each day Jesus' expectations for eternal life. The decision rests with the believer whether to give up the inhibitors in life to gain eternal life. The rich man went away sorrowful. The rich man's possessions ruled his heart, mind, and soul to a greater degree than his desire for eternal life. This Gospel is a challenge for believers each year to examine the heart, mind, and soul.

Hearing the present Gospel enables each believer is to look carefully at the heart, mind, and soul. Each believer hearing the Gospel answers the question of whether to give up possessions inhibiting growth to gain eternal life.

Jesus Christ makes clear eternal life is possible. God makes eternal life possible. With God, difficulties can be overcome that stand in the road of attaining eternal life.

By reaching into the depths of the heart, mind, and soul, the believer truly desiring eternal life, will find a way to seek God's help to make the changes necessary.

Childbirth is a painful experience for the mother but giving birth brings joy.

Giving up old ways of life can be painful for believers. The joy offered in Jesus

Christ makes the change worth making.

The soul is worth more than the whole world. The Gospel of St. Mark states "For what shall it profit a man, if he shall gain the whole world, and lose his own soul?" (Mk.8:36) Today is the day to embrace Jesus Christ and seek eternal life.

#### <u>Work</u>

#### Psalm 27/28:4- Give them according to their deeds, and according to the wickedness of their endeavours: give them after the work of their hands; render to them their desert. (KJV)

The Psalms offer a treasury of wisdom to learn more about the work of human beings. Believers interested in doing work pleasing to God benefit by considering the Psalms. The hunger in the soul is satisfied when the believer is united with God in daily work. Believers find completeness in daily life when doing work that is pleasing to the Lord. Turning to the Lord at the beginning of work in prayer and for guidance is most wise.

# Psalm 32/33:15- He fashioneth their hearts alike; he considereth all their works. (KJV)

Using the talents and gifts given by God in ways pleasing to God leads to satisfaction. Each person has the opportunity to choose the nature of work for the course of life. Wise individuals turn to the Lord for valuable

guidance in undertaking daily work. God is ever-present and answers prayers for guidance as believers go about their work. Work is done within a community and the impact on others merits great consideration.

#### Psalm 61:13/62:12-Also unto thee, O Lord, belongeth mercy: for thou renderest to every man according to his work. (KJV)

Personal talents and gifts from God are best developed in accord with God's teachings. The Holy Gospel offers fundamental lessons for human relationships in the workplace. The believer's work creates a record that will be utilized at the Lord's Second Coming. The ultimate fruits of the believer's work become known over the course of time. #### Psalm 89/90:17-And let the beauty of the Lord our God be upon us: and establish thou the work of our hands upon us; yea, the work of our hands establish thou it. (KJV)

#### **Confession Has Deep Roots**

## Leviticus 5:5-And it shall be, when he shall be guilty in one of these things, that he shall confess that he hath sinned in that thing: (KJV)

Regular Confession is necessary and beneficial in the serious believer's life. Confession enables the believer to put sin behind and to begin anew in Christ. Confessing sins in God's Holy Church lifts weight from the believer's conscience. Stress is alleviated when the Lord God is merciful and forgives the believer's sins. Peace is restored to the believer when heartfelt confession is made before God.

#### Numbers 5:7- Then they shall confess their sin which they have done: and he shall recompense his trespass with the principal thereof, and add unto it the fifth part thereof, and give it unto him against whom he hath trespassed. (KJV)

The desire to repent motivates believers to seriously confess sins inhibiting life. Making things right with others when possible is part of the act of repentance. Repentance and confession work together as the believer begins anew in Christ. New beginnings in Jesus Christ are always possible when repentance occurs. Forgiving others having been offended is part of repentance and confession

#### Psalm 31/32:5- I acknowledge my sin unto thee, and mine iniquity have I not hid. I said, I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord; and thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin. Selah. (KJV)

Honesty with the Lord God leads to the greatest benefits when confessing sins. The act of confession is a personal encounter with the Lord God in the Church. The Church provides the love and support necessary for trusted confessions. The priest witnesses and guides the believer through the confession experience. God's goodness and mercy prevail when confessions are heartfelt and complete.

# Proverbs 28:13/14- He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy. (KJV)

Life's full possibilities are limited when sins are buried deep within the believer. God can absolutely be trusted to be merciful when true repentance is desired. The believer seriously desiring to begin anew in Christ will value confession. Putting past sins behind and beginning life anew in Christ is always possible. Joy arises in the believer's life when repentance and confession are heartfelt.

#### Daniel 9:4- And I prayed unto the Lord my God, and made my confession, and said, O Lord, the great and dreadful God, keeping the covenant and mercy to them that love him, and to them that keep his commandments; (KJV)

Love and gratitude for God are experienced when the believer confesses sins. God knows the believer's sins before confession and welcomes the confession. Serious repentance and confession bring joy to the Lord God and the believer. As a believer matures in Christ, the opportunity to confess become more valued. Serious believers are conscious of personal sins and seek to confess them.

If we allow ourselves to belittle anyone, either because of their appearance or because of their state in life, we dismiss the truth that God can, in His Divine Providence, transform anyone into a saint.
