**The Sunday of the Last Judgment** Matthew 25:31-46 When the Son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory: And before him shall be gathered all nations: and he shall separate them one from another, as a shepherd divideth his sheep from the goats: And he shall set the sheep on his right hand, but the goats on the left. Then shall the King say unto them on his right hand, Come, ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world: For I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me in: Naked, and ye clothed me: I was sick, and ye visited me: I was in prison, and ye came unto me. Then shall the righteous answer him, saying, Lord, when saw we thee an hungred, and fed thee? or thirsty, and gave thee drink? When saw we thee a stranger, and took thee in? or naked, and clothed thee? Or when saw we thee sick, or in prison, and came unto thee? And the King shall answer and say unto them, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me. Then shall he say also unto them on the left hand, Depart from me, ye cursed, into everlasting fire, prepared for the devil and his angels: For I was an hungred, and ye gave me no meat: I was thirsty, and ye gave me no drink: I was a stranger, and ye took me not in: naked, and ye clothed me not: sick, and in prison, and ye visited me not. Then shall they also answer him, saying, Lord, when saw we thee an hungred, or athirst, or a stranger, or naked, or sick, or in prison, and did not minister unto thee? Then shall he answer them, saying, Verily I say unto you, Inasmuch as ye did it not to one of the least of these, ve did it not to me. And these shall go away into everlasting punishment: but the righteous into life eternal. (KJV)

The present Gospel is a firm reminder to be fully conscious of daily life experiences with persons in need. Today's Gospel makes perfectly clear that Jesus Christ is present in the stranger, the sick, the suffering and the imprisoned. Jesus Christ is present in the beggar on the street or the person in need of clothing or a place to stay. Jesus is present in the stranger showing up at the parish church seeking to be warmly welcomed.

Jesus is identified with the man or woman at the intersection having a sign seeking donations because of being homeless or hungry. Jesus is in the boy or girl coming to school with tattered clothing and having no food to eat at home.

Jesus is present in the neighbor, family member or friend with a lifethreatening illness. Jesus is in the son or daughter arrested for drug, alcohol or other criminal offenses.

Jesus is in the man or woman in the cell at the local jail or prison or on a locked ward of the mental hospital. Jesus is in the elderly person living alone with no surviving relatives and without any friends.

Jesus is in the person that shows up at church in poor clothing because he or she is without income. Jesus is in the person who stays home suffering silently because he or she has no means of transportation.

Jesus is in the wife or husband suffering from mental or physical abuse and afraid to ask for help. Jesus is in the co-worker coming to work with minimal food to eat. Jesus identifies with the suffering veterans in longterm care hospitals.

Today the Church wants believers to look with eyes to see the suffering in our midst and to help. The Church wants believers to realize the way we treat the person hurting, hungry or a stranger is our actual treatment of Jesus.

Today's Gospel asks believers to honestly examine the self. Believers are asked to think very carefully about the people they meet and know in daily life.

Taking action to help the needy is a step toward God's Heavenly Kingdom.

The present Gospel makes very clear that Jesus Christ is fully aware of believers' personal experiences with persons in need. Each person will face Jesus Christ at the Great and Final Judgment.

Jesus Christ knows the believers that reach out to help the sick, the suffering and the imprisoned. Jesus Christ knows the believers that welcome the stranger, that clothe the needy and feed the hungry.

Today is an opportunity to commit to be more welcoming of strangers at work, in the community, or in the parish church. Today is an opportunity to comfort someone you know is suffering.

Today ask God for open eyes to see suffering. Ask God for the vision to see Jesus Christ in each person in need. Ask God for help in beginning anew in the journey to God's Heavenly Kingdom.

Persons in need and suffering appreciate the active love of believers. Parents with a son and daughter having personal difficulties or in prison are strengthened by support and prayers from their parish church.

Families with a member having mental illness are grateful when believers show compassion. Individuals recovering from an accident, surgery or undergoing cancer treatment draw strength from prayers in their parish.

The present Gospel inspires action. The present Gospel defines a pathway to the Heavenly Kingdom. Jesus Christ will return. The Great and Final Judgement will take place. Now is the time to act. God is merciful and loving. God is patient.

Repentance is possible for believers desiring to live in ways pleasing to Jesus Christ. Today's Gospel is a firm reminder to see Jesus Christ in each person in need and to act with compassion.

# CHRIST IS AMONGST US! IS AND ALWAYS SHALL BE!

As we embark on the sacred journey of Eastern Orthodox Great Lent, let us fast not only from food but from sin and everything that leads us into sinful behavior, belief and deeds; let us fast with love and humility as a means to an end and not an end in itself; let us reflect on the purpose of fasting, as a foundation of our spiritual growth and the desire to become one with God. Drawing inspiration from the Holy Fathers, who remind us of the transformative power of repentance, and Holy Scripture, which guides us on the path of humility, may this Lenten season be a time of profound self-reflection, prayer, and adherence to the teachings of our Holy Orthodox Tradition.

In the words of Saint John Chrysostom, "Lent is a healing therapy for the soul," urging us to purify our hearts and draw nearer to the Divine. Let us heed the call of Saint Isaac the Syrian, who implores us to "make space for God within us." Through fasting, prayer, and almsgiving, we strive to emulate Christ's humility and seek a deeper connection with our Creator. The second Secretary General, Dag Hammarskjold, of the newly created United Nations once expressed a profound thought–"The longest journey is the journey inwards, of him (or her) who has started upon a quest for the source of his (her) being." As Orthodox Christians we are blessed daily in knowing the "Source of our being" through the Scriptural exposition of creation and God's unending efforts to express His Love for us, even allowing the sacrifice of His Only-Begotten Son as a ransom for our salvation.

May the wisdom of the Holy Fathers and the guidance of Holy Scripture illuminate our Lenten journey, fostering spiritual renewal, repentance, and a profound sense of gratitude for that sacrifice of our Lord. As we walk this path together, let our collective prayers and endeavors strengthen our faith, bringing us closer to the Resurrection and the eternal joy that awaits. Each of us must enter Great Lent with the intention to begin the journey inwards with more intensity than ever before in our lives.

Yes, let us honestly fast from food with the goal of physical, mental and emotional effect as the first step in this journey inward. The effect should be hunger and comprehension of just how much our Loving God has provided for us. Then the fast must expand to include change of behavior– reading Holy Scripture, worshipping at all the Lenten liturgical services, and putting aside the things that will, without doubt, distract us from the inward journey: our mobile phones, tablets, all forms of social media, all forms of visual entertainment that will not deepen our journey inwards to unity with the Divine.

Is the Lenten journey inwards easy? NO! Our salvation, however, demands that we embark upon it to have any hope at all to experience God's energies. We cannot experience His Essence, but we can, having become one with Him at the core of our being, experience His uncreated and eternal energies or manifestations of His Divinity–as the Apostles Peter, James, and John experienced His Divine Light–uncreated and pure–at the Transfiguration. May we all understand completely that the experience of the Apostles on Mt. Tabor is possible for each of us if our journey inwards is real, sincere, and filled with love for God and for each other.

We shall be praying fervently for all of you throughout this Great Lenten Fast-Journey and we beseech your prayers for us, your Spiritual Fathers...

# <u>Throne of Glory</u>

# (I Kingdoms) I Samuel 2:8- He raiseth up the poor out of the dust, and lifteth up the beggar from the dunghill, to set them among princes, and to make them inherit the throne of glory: for the pillars of the earth are the LORD's, and he hath set the world upon them. (KJV)

Each person is created in the image and likeness of God including beggars. (Ge. 1:26) Believers preparing for the Great and Final Judgment are mindful of beggars. Misfortune can fall upon anyone and create a dramatic change in earthly life. Beggars are worthy of Christian compassion, acts of kindness and prayers of love. Judging beggars has no place in lives of Christians seeking God's Kingdom. (Mt.7:1) Each person has sufficient sins to address in preparing for Jesus Christ's Return.

# Jeremiah 14:21-Do not abhor us, for thy name's sake, do not disgrace the throne of thy glory: remember, break not thy covenant with us. (KJV)

Each person has sins that need remediated to be completely reconciled with Christ. The Church provides Great Lent as a time of increased encouragement to repent. Repenting of sins requires personal honesty and desire to change before God. The believer is expected to look deep within the self to acknowledge all sins. Believers longing for unity with the Lord God take the necessary steps to repent. Being separated from God by sins is a heavy burden on the heart, mind and soul.

# Zechariah 6:13-Even he shall build the temple of the LORD; and he shall bear the glory, and shall sit and rule upon his throne; and he shall be a priest upon his throne: and the counsel of peace shall be between them both. (KJV)

The Holy Prophets are points of reference for believers seeking unity with God. Wisdom from the Prophets open pathways to God's Kingdom and Eternal Life. The Prophets shine the Light of Christ in the darkest moments of earthly life. Nourishment for the hungry soul is readily found in the Holy Prophets of God. Believers benefit greatly when taking time to consider the Prophets' wisdom. Considering the Prophets is a wise investment in preparing for eternal life. (Luke 16:1-31)

## Matthew 25:31-When the Son of man shall come in his glory, and all the holy angels with him, then shall he sit upon the throne of his glory: (KJV)

The Scriptures are clear about the Lord returning for the Great and Final Judgment. Every day and every relationship are opportunities to prepare for Judgment Day. Every person will appear before the Lord and relationships will be scrutinized. Believers do well to repent of careless acts and cruel thoughts, words and deeds.
