ENCOUNTERING ORTHODOXY

Encountering the holiness and peace of the Ancient Church

The very first time I entered an Orthodox church, I felt drawn to Her. There was a tangible, inner tug, and an overwhelming sense of peace, holiness, and awe, emanating from the very walls of the temple. The serving clergy were not the focus of the service, as I'd experienced in my protestant upbringing, but seemed to be moving within the walls of their temple, as if servants, or, given the beauty of their vestments, courtiers to an emperor. The focus was not on men, but on the holiness of God. I felt an overwhelming desire to be a part of this religion, but, at the time, allowed the ethnic, and language, differences to keep me from returning.

Eventually, as is evidenced by my present vocation, I did return, and can not even imagine how I could have stayed away, for some twenty years, after having tasted "the heavenly realm." Orthodoxy is like that, for it seems almost familiar to many first timers, as though we've known this faith from our very conception.

I remember seeing my very first hand painted icon. It was an icon of Christ, and I felt drawn into it, wanting to embrace it (or, perhaps more


correctly, being embraced by it.) This first encounter was in 1968, and in the small, private chapel of a friend. This encounter came about a month after I'd driven through Northern California's Redwood National Forest, beholding the thousand year old, towering trees. Both the icon, and the Redwoods, had an enormous impact on my young soul. They both seemed to offer me sanctuary, and a sense of peace. Both made me feel I'd encountered something precious, ageless, and sacred. I still feel the same, as an aging monk.

We humans are material beings, having been given bodies by our Creator. This Creator God has placed us in a material world, surrounded by things we can touch, see, smell, taste, and hear. Orthodox temples, by their very nature, allow us to commune with this very God, Who has given each of us the ability to touch, see, smell, taste, and hear. It is through the material world that God has chosen to unite Himself to us, His creatures. The Logos (The Word), Christ Himself, by Whom everything that is, came into being, has come down from heaven, and embraced us, as His own.

My last trip through the Redwoods, brought back memories of my first encounter with an icon of Christ. How could they not, for it is the very Christ, depicted in the icon, Who created the Redwoods, and all that is beautiful, and sacred.



As we repeatedly catch ourselves descending to the level of thought (the realm of action in time), we can call ourselves back to the level of the spirit (the realm of stillness in eternity). Later, through continual practice, we will be able to watch the thoughts coming, trying to gain admittance into our minds by stealing our attention. <u>Labor</u>

Psalm 90:10-The days of our years are threescore years and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labour and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away.

(KJV)

Earthly life is limited for each Christian and God's Kingdom is the desired goal. Each person is given gifts and talents to be used in ways pleasing to the Lord. Daily decisions determine whether the believer enters the Kingdom of God. Personal choices reflect whether the believer labors for the glory of the Lord. Laboring for the Lord takes many forms and reveals the contents of the heart. The multitude of saints and their diversity witnesses to laboring for the Lord.

Psalm 104:23-Man goeth forth unto his work and to his labour until the evening. (KJV)

Believers are expected to be conscientious in the use of talents from the Lord. Relationships developed while laboring are to be consistent with Divine teachings. Greed, unsafe environments, and abuse are foreign to healthy labor conditions. Work at all levels is to be done conscientiously and with fundamental integrity. Workplace safety is a primary concern for laborers going about their daily work. Laborers are created and are to be treated as the image and likeness of God. (Gen. 1:26) The way a workplace operates determines if it conforms to the Lord's standards.

Psalm 127:1-Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it: except the Lord keep the city, the watchman waketh but in vain. (KJV)


The principles and standards of employers affect the quality of the workplace. Laborers in the workplace know whether they are treated as God's creations. Work performed in God-pleasing conditions reaches highest levels of perfection. The atmosphere in God-pleasing workplaces fosters healthy worker performance. Labors and those employing laborers do well to look to the Lord for direction. Work outcomes are affected by the agreed views of laborers and employers.

Psalm 128:2-For thou shalt eat the labour of thine hands: happy shalt thou be, and it shall be well with thee. (KJV)

The worker experiences personal satisfaction and fruits from a good day's labor. Doing work pleasing to the Lord results in a sense of healthy accomplishment. Laborers are grateful to the Lord when the workday goes well and ends well. Giving thanks to the Lord has a consistent place in the grateful laborer's life. Joy results when employers and employees work together in God-pleasing ways. Great understanding is needed for work conditions to be joyful for the laborer.

The Twelfth Sunday after Pentecost Matthew 19:16-26

And, behold, one came and said unto him, Good Master, what good thing shall I do, that I may have eternal life? And he said unto him, Why callest thou me good? there is none good but one, that is, God: but if thou wilt enter into life, keep the commandments. He saith unto him, Which? Jesus said, Thou shalt do no murder, Thou shalt not commit adultery, Thou shalt not steal, Thou shalt not bear false witness, Honour thy father and thy mother: and, Thou shalt love thy neighbour as thyself. The young man saith unto him, All these things have I kept from my youth up: what lack I yet? Jesus said unto him, If thou wilt be perfect, go and sell that thou hast, and give to the poor, and thou shalt have treasure in heaven: and come and follow me. But when the young man heard that saying, he went away sorrowful: for he had great possessions. Then said Jesus unto his disciples, Verily I say unto you, That a rich man shall hardly enter into the kingdom of heaven. And again I say unto you, It is easier for a camel to go through the eye of a needle, than for a rich man to enter into the kingdom of God. When his disciples heard it, they were exceedingly amazed, saying, Who

then can be saved? But Jesus beheld them, and said unto them, With men this is impossible; but with God all things are possible. (KJV)

We are dependent on the Lord God for each moment of life. Each breath, each step, each word uttered are due to the blessings of God. God determines how long we live earthly life and whether we experience eternal life.

The rich man in the current Gospel expressed interest in eternal life. The man asked Jesus what was required of him for eternal life. Each person baptized into Christ has the Kingdom of God and eternal life as primary goals.

The way daily life is lived determines whether the believer will experience the Kingdom and eternal life. Our daily relationships, personal interests and goals will affect and determine life's outcome.

Whether the Lord God is primary in our heart, mind, and soul shapes and guides each day of our lives. The rich man held his personal possessions first in his heart. He was unwilling to listen to the Lord Jesus in disposing of his possessions.

Jesus told the disciples everything is possible with God. Had the rich man heeded the words of Jesus, the rich man would have eternal life. The rich man greatly treasured his earthly possessions and denied himself eternal life.

Each day believers choose whether to listen and be guided by the word of God. At each Divine Liturgy believers hear the Gospel and sermon to guide them. The word of God is present each day to guide believers.

Choosing to heed the words of Jesus Christ enables believers to stay on the path to the Kingdom and eternal life. Too often, individuals maintain primary goals that have nothing to do with God's Kingdom and eternal life.

Many people work at jobs to gain riches and maintain possessions far more than they will ever need. In today's world, the homes of the wealthy are getting bigger while homelessness seems to increase with each passing day.

Something is wrong with the fundamental beliefs in our society. Mass shootings have become commonplace. Children are too often abused and misused. Anxiety and fear are too commonplace.

An unsettledness and uncertainty are present. Certainty for the believer is the Lord God and the way of the Lord. Listening carefully to the Lord and pleasing the Lord in daily actions keep the believer on the path to the Kingdom and eternal life.

God is ever-present and within reach to keep believers on the narrow path necessary. Believers attentive to the Lord's teachings will find life's challenges to be manageable. Joy comes from being attentive to the Lord and embracing the way of the Lord. Believers face each day with confidence when united with the Lord. Repentance and communion keep the Lord first in the heart, mind, and soul.

When the Lord is life's Guide and Goal, all else is in proper perspective. The believer's view of life will guide him or her to their ultimate destination. The rich man was blinded by his possessions. His possessions guided his decision-making.

When God's Kingdom and eternal life are primary goals for the believer, each decision will conform to these goals. Wise believers periodically assess and reassess whether they are living true to the Lord's teachings.

Repentance and new beginnings in the Lord are always possible. The Lord encourages believers to repent, confess, and begin anew. Reorienting life to the narrow path of the Kingdom is always possible.

Choosing to repent may momentarily feel painful, but in the end, the result is newness in Christ. God is loving and merciful. God desires for believers to travel the narrow path to the Kingdom and eternal life.

The Church proclaims the Gospel at each Divine Liturgy to guide believers. Open hearts, minds and souls work to put the teachings into practice. Believers need not feel overwhelmed by life's challenges.

Believers are never alone. God is always near and present. The Church is welcoming and protective. God's presence and love heal the hurting and anxious believer. God removes fear from daily life. God provides assurance.

God is the Certainty in uncertain times. God is the Haven for mourners and the homeless. God is the Kingdom and Eternal Life for the seekers and travelers in life. Treasures in heaven exceed the value of earthly possessions.
