ELDER THADDEUS: 111 YEARS SINCE HIS BIRTH

October 6/19 marks the 111th birthday of Archimandrite Thaddeus of Vitovnica, a great Serbian ascetic, confessor, and spiritual guide of the 20th century.

He was granted abundant spiritual gifts: unceasing prayer, profound humility, divine love, discernment, and foresight. Thousands sought his wisdom, and his teachings spread far and wide—shared among the faithful as a living testament to grace.

"God's grace always assists those who struggle, but this does not mean that a struggler is always in the position of a victor. Sometimes in the arena the wild animals did not touch the righteous ones, but by no means were they all preserved untouched.

What is important is not victory or the position of a victor, but rather the labor of striving towards God and devotion to Him.

Though a man may be found in a weak state, that does not at all mean that he has been abandoned by God. On the cross, the Lord Jesus Christ was in trouble, as the world sees things. But when the sinful world considered Him to be completely destroyed, in fact He was victorious over death and hades. The Lord did not promise us positions as victors as a reward for righteousness, but told us, "In the world you will have tribulation—but be of good cheer, for I have overcome the world" (Jn. 16:33).

The power of God is effective when a person asks for the help from God, acknowledging his own weakness and sinfulness. This is why humility and the striving towards God are the fundamental virtues of a Christian."

The Twenty First Sunday after Pentecost Luke 8:5-15

A sower went out to sow his seed: and as he sowed, some fell by the way side; and it was trodden down, and the fowls of the air devoured it. And some fell upon a rock; and as soon as it was sprung up, it withered away, because it lacked moisture. And some fell among thorns; and the thorns sprang up with it, and choked it. And other fell on good ground, and sprang up, and bare fruit an hundredfold. And when he had said these things, he cried, He that hath ears to hear, let him hear. And his disciples asked him, saying, What might this parable be? And he said, Unto you it is given to know the mysteries of the kingdom of God: but to others in parables; that seeing they might not see, and hearing they might not understand. Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. Those by the way side are they that hear; then cometh the devil, and taketh away the word out of their hearts, lest they should believe and be saved. They on the rock are they, which, when they hear, receive the word with joy; and these have no

root, which for a while believe, and in time of temptation fall away. And that which fell among thorns are they, which, when they have heard, go forth, and are choked with cares and riches and pleasures of this life, and bring no fruit to perfection. But that on the good ground are they, which in an honest and good heart, having heard the word, keep it, and bring forth fruit with patience. (KJV)

Every person coming to the parish church is blessed to hear the Holy Gospel being proclaimed. Hearing the Gospel gives each person the opportunity to learn from and experience the Lord Jesus Christ.

Each person decides whether the Gospel is welcomed and enters a good and honest heart. Persons hearing the Gospel will determine if they experience momentary joy but eventually move away from a life filled with Christ's teachings.

Individuals cherishing Jesus Christ in the Gospel with a good and honest heart will practice patience. Their love and application of Jesus Christ's teachings in the Gospel result in the bringing forth of good and abundant fruit.

Each person decides whether to embrace Jesus Christ's teachings in the Gospel and make the teachings a part of life for the duration of life. Baptized believers commit to following the Lord Jesus Christ as King and as God.

Every day of life the commitment to Jesus Christ is to be renewed in thought, word, and deed. Believers face challenges in a world filled with temptations and attractions having nothing to do with Jesus Christ.

The world offers certain choices that are detrimental to the soul. The Gospel taken to heart fortifies and soundly guides the believer. Christ's teachings in the Gospel empower the believer to exercise discernment and patience.

Believers guided by the Gospel will have eyes to see the perils in life and ears to hear messages that will tarnish the soul. Jesus Christ's teachings in the Gospel enable the believer's heart, mind, and soul to remain pure.

Jesus Christ purifies the believer's heart, mind, and soul when the Gospel teachings are embraced and made a part of daily life. Love of the Gospel requires attention and effort. Believers benefit when firmly focusing on the Gospel.

The Gospel is always new as each moment in life is always new. The Gospel is always relevant. Believers with eyes to see will recognize Jesus Christ's relevance for their daily lives.

The Gospel is an intrinsic part of the Divine Liturgy. Believers experience the Lord Jesus Christ when hearing the Gospel and making the Gospel a part of their lives. The Gospel transforms believers taking the Lord Jesus Christ seriously.

The Church proclaims the present Gospel message every year. Believers are reminded of the different ways listeners respond to the Gospel. Listeners with good and honest hearts, exercising patience, bring forth good fruit.

Thank God for the Church proclaiming the Gospel. Thank God for the repetition of this Gospel message each year. Attentive believers benefit immeasurably from the message.

When the mind functions, it is never too late to embrace and make the Gospel an integral part of life. Repentance and renewal in Jesus Christ are always possible. Conscious individuals can always reach out to Jesus Christ in faith and hope.

Today each person can look deep within the self and determine if Jesus Christ is central to their daily life. Each person can answer for themselves if they are guided and nourished regularly by Jesus Christ as proclaimed in the Gospel.

Each person determines if he or she looks forward with anticipation to the hearing of the Gospel. Daily life is often difficult. Jesus Christ proclaimed in the Gospel helps believers get through the difficulties of life.

The Lord Jesus Christ overcame and trampled down death. The Gospel verifies the Lord Jesus Christ's victory over death. The Gospel very clearly describes God's Kingdom and the path to eternal life.

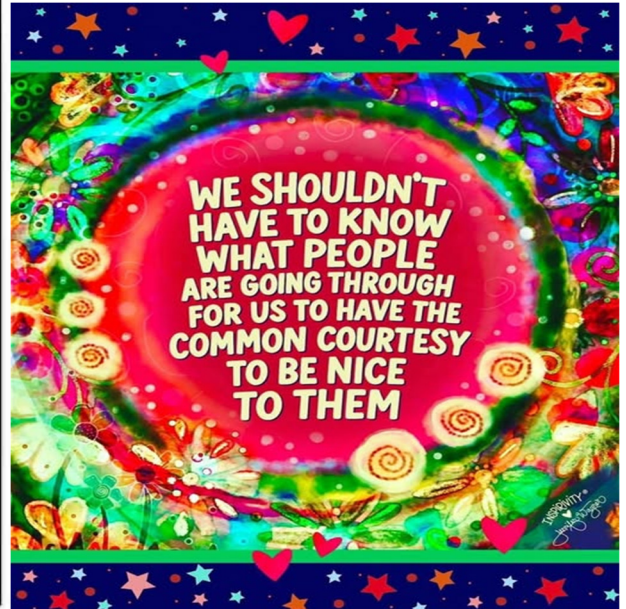
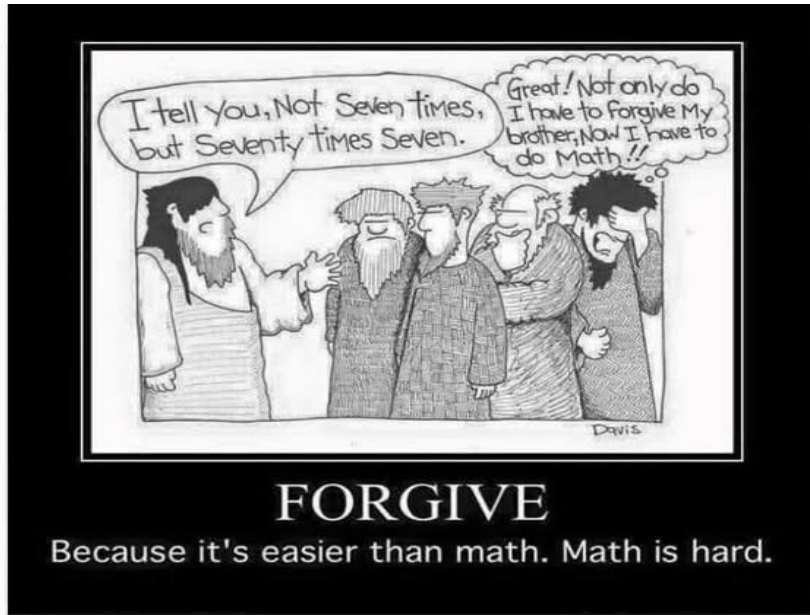
The world is full of paths leading far from God's Kingdom and eternal life. The Gospel tells of the immeasurable value of the soul and the importance of caring for the soul.

Reverent—Awareness of something Greater

Being reverent isn't just about attending church or saying a prayer. It's about recognizing that some things in life are bigger than we are. Having awareness that there's something greater than ourselves, something worth respecting.

To some, Reverence is:

Standing with wonder under a nighttime sky full of stars, listening to the soft wind whispering through the trees, or feeling the first light of dawn warm your skin and your soul.

It may be found in the peaceful prayer you whisper alone and in the group grace recited before a shared moment.

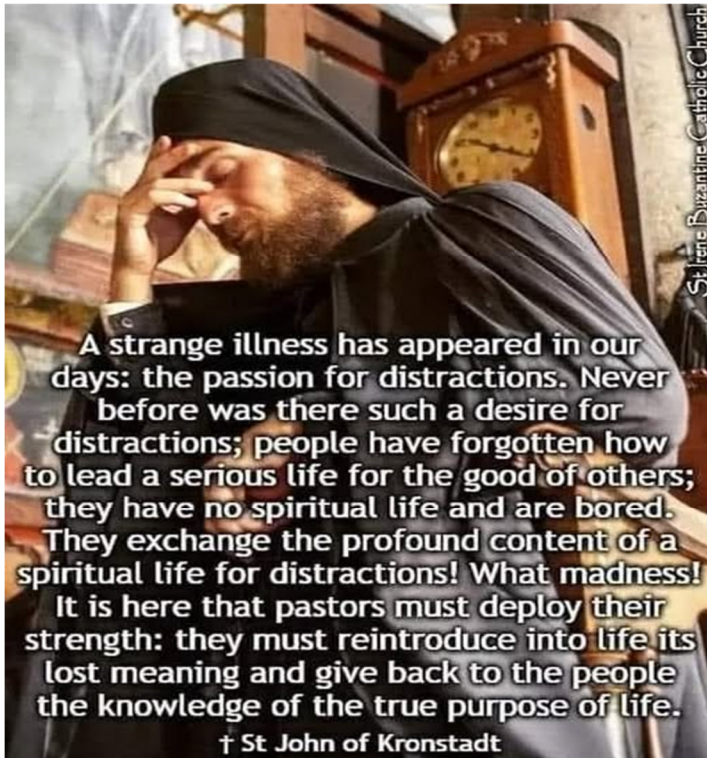
Some feel it in the hush of a forest at dusk, the sunrise at the beach over the vast ocean, or in the glow of a campfire shared with friends.

You might see it in the strength of someone's faith that's different from your own, or when surrounded by familiar faces where you attend church.

Reverence is shown through unconditional respect without complete understanding—whether it's for nature, for faiths that differ from our own, and for each other.

A reverent Scout doesn't need to be told to be quiet at a solemn moment, or to tread lightly in a sacred place. He just feels it.

So whether you find your sense of reverence in prayer, in the outdoors, at church, or in the way you treat others, remember, being reverent means living your life with gratitude, humility, and respect for all that gives it meaning.



Addressing Depression

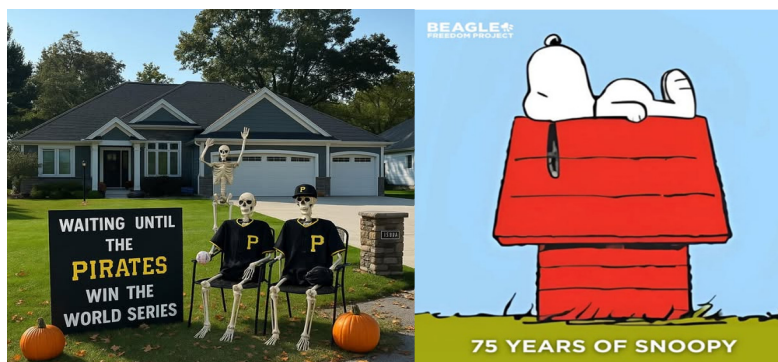
