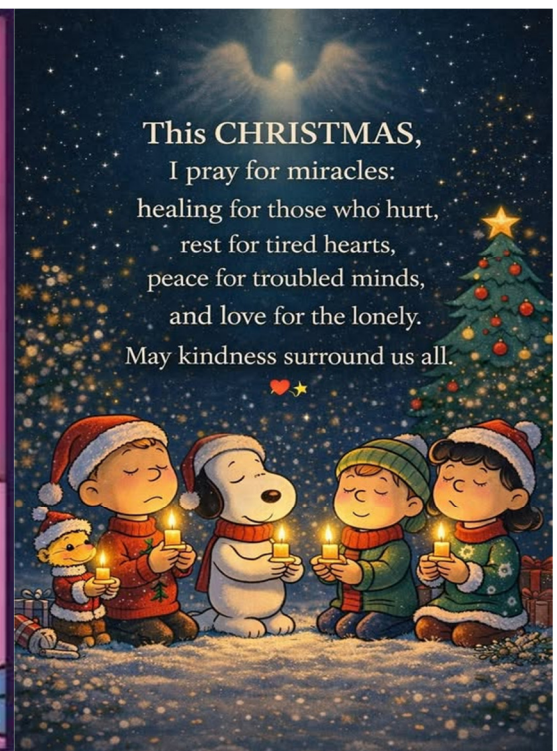
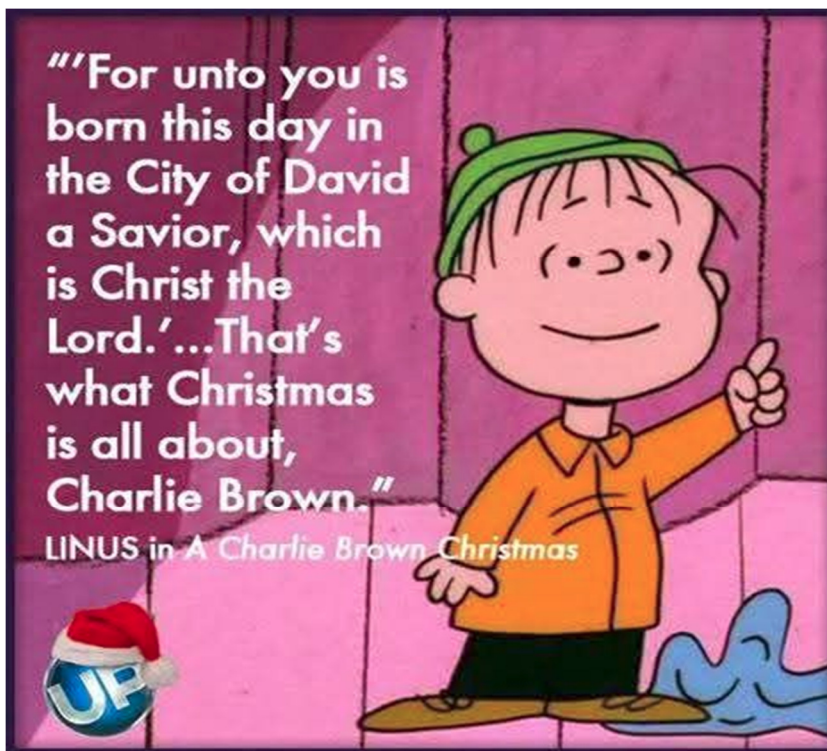

WHY DO ORTHODOX CHRISTIANS CELEBRATE CHRISTMAS ON JANUARY 7? SANTA CLAUS-CHRISTMAS-TREE!?

Every year, many people ask the same question: Why do Orthodox Christians celebrate Christmas on January 7, while most of the world celebrates on December 25? The answer is not about being different or old-fashioned. It is a story about history, faith, and how the Church understands time itself.

Christmas Is More Than a Birthday

For Christians, Christmas is not simply the birthday of Jesus. It is the moment when God enters human history. The birth of Jesus Christ in Bethlehem marks the beginning of the healing of the world. God is born as a child—in humility, poverty, and love—showing that salvation comes not through power, but through self-giving.

The Bible does not tell us the exact date of Christ's birth. What mattered to the early Christians was not when it happened, but what it meant. Christmas proclaims the mystery of God becoming man so that humanity may be restored.

One Feast Became Two

In the earliest centuries of Christianity, believers celebrated Christ's birth and His baptism together on January 6. This feast was called Theophany, meaning "the manifestation of God." Both events revealed who Christ truly is - the Son of God made flesh.

By the fourth century, the Church began to celebrate Christmas separately on December 25. This helped Christians better reflect on the meaning of the Incarnation, while January 6 remained the Feast of Theophany, focused on Christ's baptism and the revelation of the Holy Trinity. The Orthodox Church accepted this separation while keeping the deep spiritual connection between the two feasts.

Julian and Gregorian Calendars - Why Dates Don't Match

The reason Orthodox Christmas appears "late" has to do with calendars. The ancient Church followed the Julian calendar, which was used throughout the Roman world and by the early Church for centuries. Over time, this calendar drifted slightly from the solar year.

In the sixteenth century, the Gregorian calendar was introduced to "correct" this drift and was adopted in Western Christianity. Today, the Julian calendar is thirteen days behind the Gregorian calendar. That is why December 25 on the Julian calendar falls on January 7 on today's civil calendar. In other words, Orthodox Christians who follow the Julian calendar still celebrate Christmas on December 25—according to the Church's ancient way of measuring time.

Why the Orthodox Church Kept the Old Calendar

The Orthodox Church did not keep the Julian calendar out of resistance to change, but out of faithfulness. The Church understands time not just as dates on a calendar, but as something sanctified through fasting, prayer, and worship. Changing the calendar affects the entire spiritual rhythm of the Church, and such changes were never agreed upon by all Orthodox Churches together. Continuity was chosen over convenience.

How the Church Understands Christmas

Orthodox theology teaches that feasts are not random holidays. They are living expressions of faith. Through what theologians call hermeneutics—the interpretation of history through worship—the Church preserves the meaning of each feast. Christmas celebrates the sanctification of the world, the dignity of the human body, and the beginning of salvation.

Santa Claus, Saint Nicholas, and Christian Tradition

Many modern Christmas customs have Christian roots. Santa Claus is based on Saint Nicholas, a fourth-century bishop known for his generosity and care for the poor. While popular culture transformed his image, the Church remembers the real saint—a man who lived the Gospel through love and charity.

The Christmas Tree and Its Meaning

The Christmas tree comes from the Christianization of Germanic peoples in Europe. The evergreen tree symbolized eternal life, while its triangular shape came to represent the Holy Trinity. It also reminded Christians of the Tree of Life, restored to humanity through Christ. Christianity did not erase older cultures—it transformed them.

An Ancient Faith in the Modern World

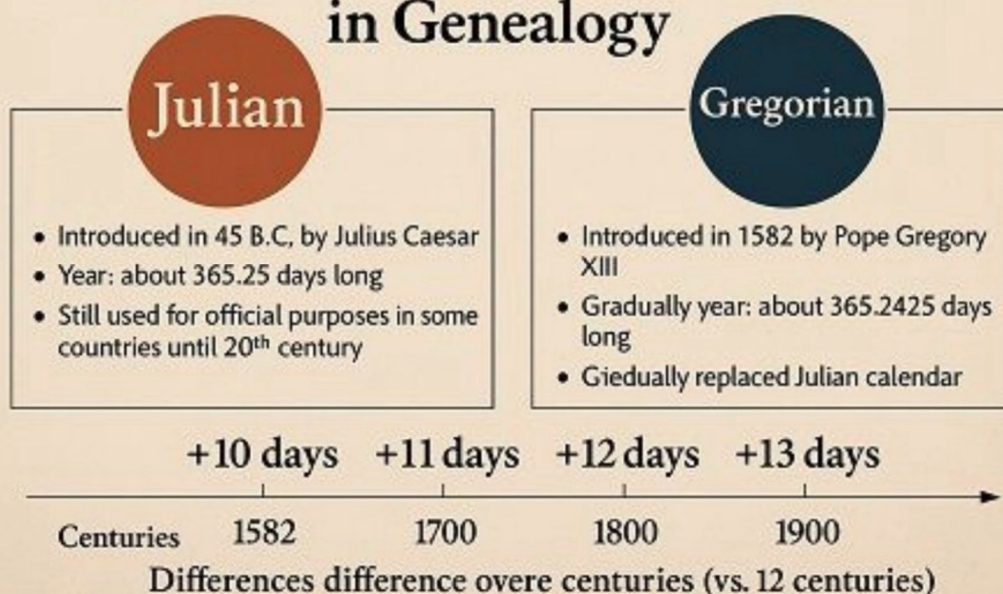
Orthodox Christianity is ancient, but not outdated. Christmas on January 7 is not a different Christmas—it is the same feast preserved through centuries of unbroken worship. The Orthodox Church continues to celebrate Christmas as it always has, rooted in history, theology, and lived faith.

In the end, Christmas is not about the date on the calendar. It is about light overcoming darkness, hope entering the world, and God drawing near to humanity.

Julian vs. Gregorian Calendars in Genealogy

St. Nikolaj Velimirovich writes to the teacher Nikola C.:

On Why Christ Had to Be Born, and Not Just Appear?

You have asked: why did the Lord Christ have to be born, then grow, then suffer?

Why did he not, immediately, appear from heaven in the guise of a mature man as, according to hellenic mythology, Apollo appeared to men? It is an entirely inappropriate comparison! How can a real man be equated with a phantom, and the true God with an imagined monstrosity?

As high as Heaven is above the Earth, so exalted is the wisdom of God above the reason of men. By the wisdom of The All-Exalted, Christ had to come into the world as a child, then a youth and finally as a mature man, that He be apprehensible to all, and acquire all. Had He never been a child, pale and cold would be His word: "allow the children and do not forbid them to come to me, for to such belongs the Kingdom of Heaven; and again: "Truly, I say unto you, if you do not repent and become as children, you will not enter into the Kingdom of Heaven." You are a teacher of children; as a teacher consider—how completely different would be the relationship between yourself and the children if you, let us assume, had never been a child?

Christ could have, undoubtedly, appeared to the world as He would have wished. But had He done so, He could not have been to humanity that which He wished to be: The Teacher and Savior of all, and the ideal for all generations. You are tormented by the thought: the Lord, by His wondrous incarnation increased our understanding of the mystery of His

being. But would not the mystery of His being be all the more greater and incomprehensible, if He had unexpectedly descended amongst men, and had no relational ties to humanity? Would not the world, in that case, speak of Him as of some sort of phantom? In such a case His person, along with His doctrine and sacrifice, would lose all true basis and true meaning. For if a phantom were in question, who of us would listen to and support a phantom?

Further, The Lord had to be born precisely as He was born that, in doing so, He demonstrate the possibility and emphasize the importance of our spiritual (re)birth, which stands at the center of His teaching about man. According to His words: "If you are not born again, you cannot see the Kingdom of God. As He was incarnate of the Holy Spirit, and from the All-Pure body of the Virgin Mary, so we also can be spiritually (re)born of the Holy Spirit and in the purity of our souls. The great spiritual fathers of Orthodoxy always have taught—the new birth of a person is contingent upon the virginal purity of their soul. In other words: the soul which is entirely cleansed, of even sinful thoughts, becomes similar to the holy Virgin, and becomes worthy by God's benevolence to become an abode of Christ. If the birth of Christ from the Virgin Mary is difficult for the ordinary mind to contemplate, it is exceptionally beneficial and encouraging for all who desire the spiritual, moral transformation of their being.

Thus, be comforted and give thanks to the eternal Wisdom that the Savior of the human race appeared as He found to be most expedient. And exclaim with the Apostle Paul: O the depths of the riches and wisdom and understanding of God!

And greet the children of your school with childish joy: Christ is born, children!

Our Rock

Psalm 17/18:2-The Lord is my rock and my fortress, and my deliverer; my God, my strength, in whom I will trust; my buckler, and the horn of my salvation, and my high tower. (KJV)

The Lord is life's rock providing sure footing to travel the path to the Kingdom. The rock-solid foundation in the Lord remains unyielding during storms in life. Believers are always prepared when secured in the Lord on the rock of salvation. No greater protection exists than to rest on the rock of salvation all of life's days. The rock of salvation exists within and protects the believer's heart, mind, and soul.

Psalm 27/28:1-Unto thee will I cry, O Lord my rock; be not silent to me: lest, if thou be silent to me, I become like them that go down into the pit. (KJV)

Life's perspective is precise when the believer focuses on the rock of salvation. Challenges in life are overcome when the believer relies on the Lord for protection. Being perceptive is essential to fully embrace the Lord as the rock of salvation. Willingness to trust in the Lord as one's rock is central to moving forward in life. Failure to place full trust in the Lord as one's rock is perilous to the believer's soul.

Psalm 30/31:3-For thou art my rock and my fortress; therefore for thy name's sake lead me, and guide me. (KJV)

Embracing the Lord as rock and fortress is clearly necessary in seeking salvation. Believer's choices made each day determine if the Lord is the rock guiding life. Guidance for life's path is resolute when the believer looks to God as the rock. The Psalmist attests to the value of believers choosing the Lord as the rock for life. The foundation the person chooses for life determines the ultimate outcome.

Psalm 41/42:9-I will say unto God my rock, Why hast thou forgotten me? why go I mourning because of the oppression of the enemy? (KJV)

Believers will at times feel alone and very separated from the Lord as their rock. Often believers take wrong paths that seem like quicksand and endanger the soul. Holding onto the Lord as rock during the days of life leads to the Eternal Kingdom. Benefit exists in considering the Psalmist's thoughts on the Lord as their rock. Reading the Psalms faithfully keeps the believer united and grounded in the Lord.

Psalm 60/61:2-From the end of the earth will I cry unto thee, when my heart is overwhelmed: lead me to the rock that is higher than I. (KJV)

When the believer has departed far from the Lord, return is always very possible. Hope is constantly present to return to the firm foundation existing in the Lord. Believers need not languish in circumstances that are damaging to the soul. The Lord hearkens to the voice of individuals crying out for their salvation. The Lord's outstretched hand grasps and leads the believer to heavenly heights.
